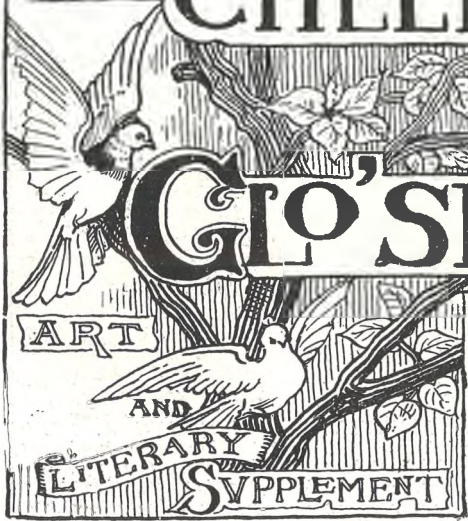

ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



SECOND-LIEUT. EDWARD WALKER-COREN, R.F.A., died of wounds received in Flanders June 15, aged 22 years. Only son of the late Mr. John Wm. Coren, of Gloucester, and grandson of the late Mr. Edward Walker-Coren, Coroner for North Gloucestershire.



PRIVATE PERCY CHARLES JAYNES, 7th Battalion British Columbians (Canadians), reported missing, now prisoner of war at Geissen, Germany. Son of Mr. W. P. Jaynes, formerly of Gloucester, and nephew of Mr. F. C. A. Jaynes, Fernbank, Churchdown; brother of J. N. Jaynes (adjoining).



PRIVATE JOHN NEVIL JAYNES, 7th Battalion British Columbians (Canadians), reported missing, now prisoner of war at Geissen, Germany. Son of Mr. W. P. Jaynes, formerly of Gloucester, and nephew of Mr. F. C. A. Jaynes, Fernbank, Churchdown, brother of P. C. Jaynes (adjoining).



PRIVATE A. STEPHENS, 1st Gloucester Regiment, missing since Oct. 28th in France. He is a native of Gretton, near Winchcombe, and his mother lives in Cheltenham. His wife lives at 5 Brynhy-fryd, Tylorstown, S. Wales, and would be grateful for any information of him.



PTE. GEORGE E. CLAYTON, 2nd Royal Berks, officially announced wounded on May 9th in Flanders, since when nothing has been heard of him. Son of Mrs. Walter Leighton, 11 Sidney-street, Cheltenham, who would be grateful for any information. He was an old Parish School boy.



LANCE-CORPL. G. BURLOW, 2nd Gloucester Regiment, died of wounds received in action on May 9th in France, aged 18 years. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Burlow, Pool Hill, Newent.



PRIVATE H. STONE, 2nd Gloucester Regiment, wounded at Ypres in action on May 5th, and now in Leckhampton Hospital. His home is 28 Grove-street, Cheltenham.



SERGEANT B. W. TAYLOR, 3rd King's Own Hussars, wounded in hand, May 26th, and since then mentioned in despatches. Son of Mrs. Dodwell, Cheltenham, and husband of Mrs. Taylor, Cotswold View, Prestbury.



Mr. Joseph Coopey, Of Mountain Ash, who died there and was buried in the Old Cemetery of that town on June 19th. He was a native of Brockworth, near Gloucester, and was 70 years of age.

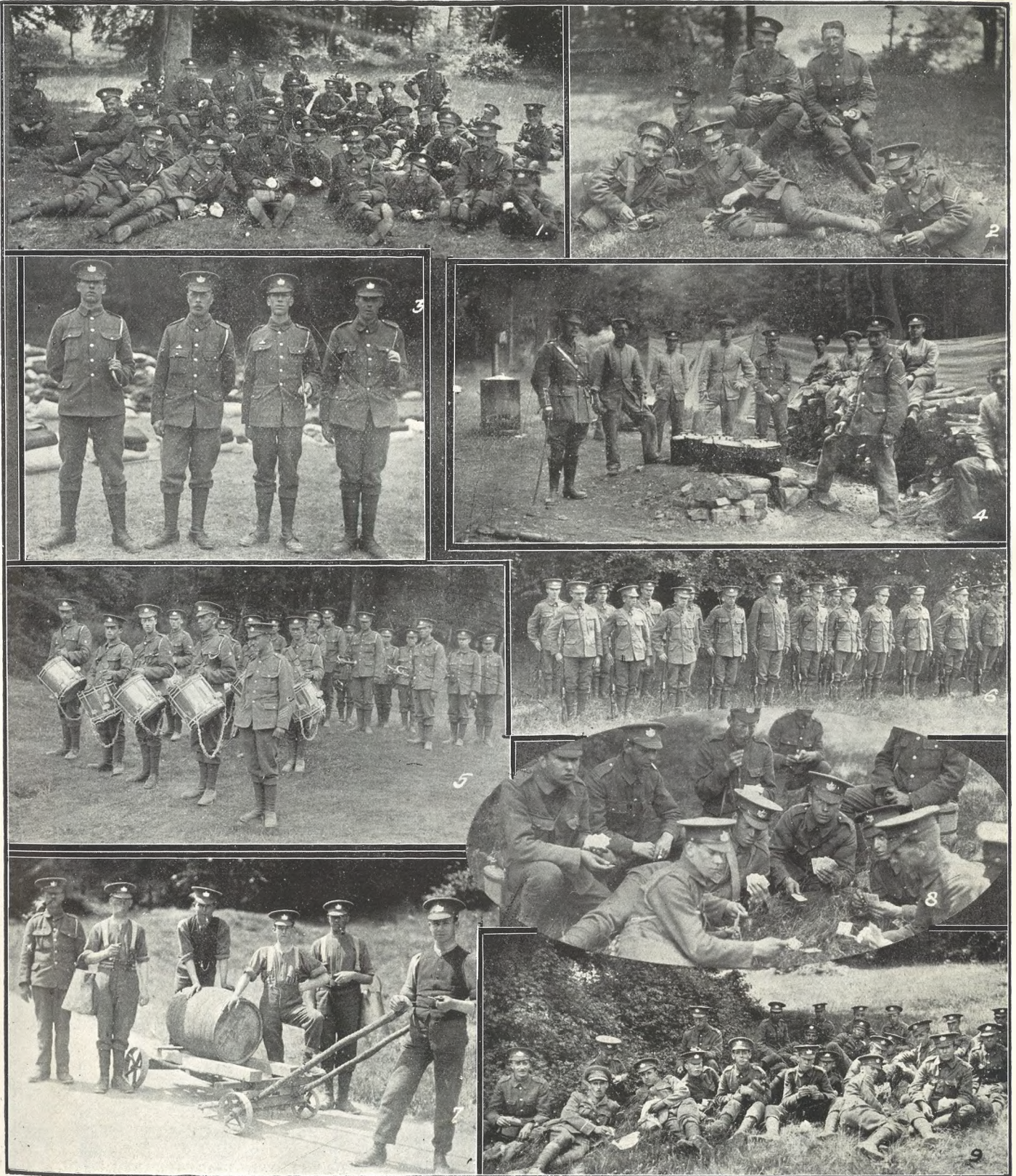

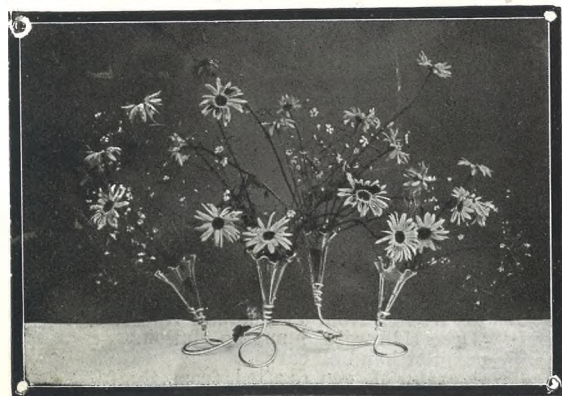

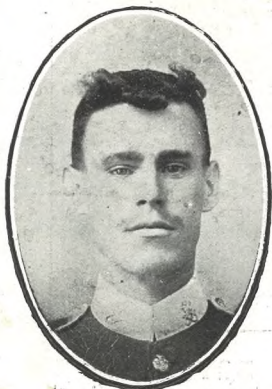

sons in the Service.



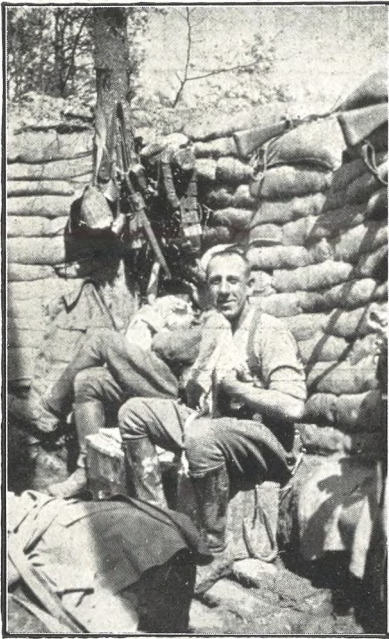
PTE. JOHN BOWERY,

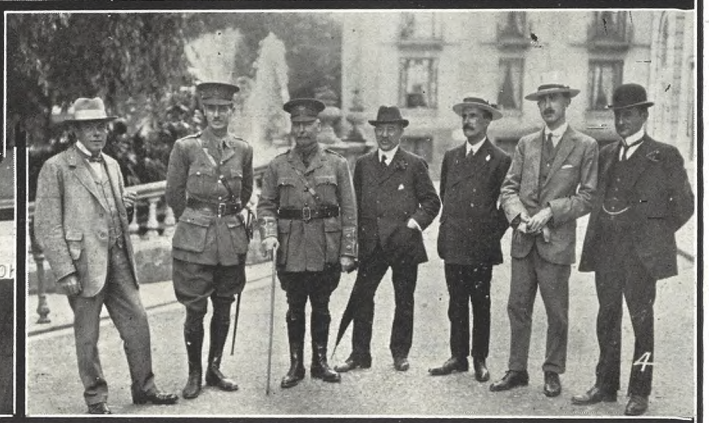

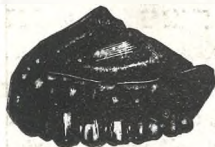

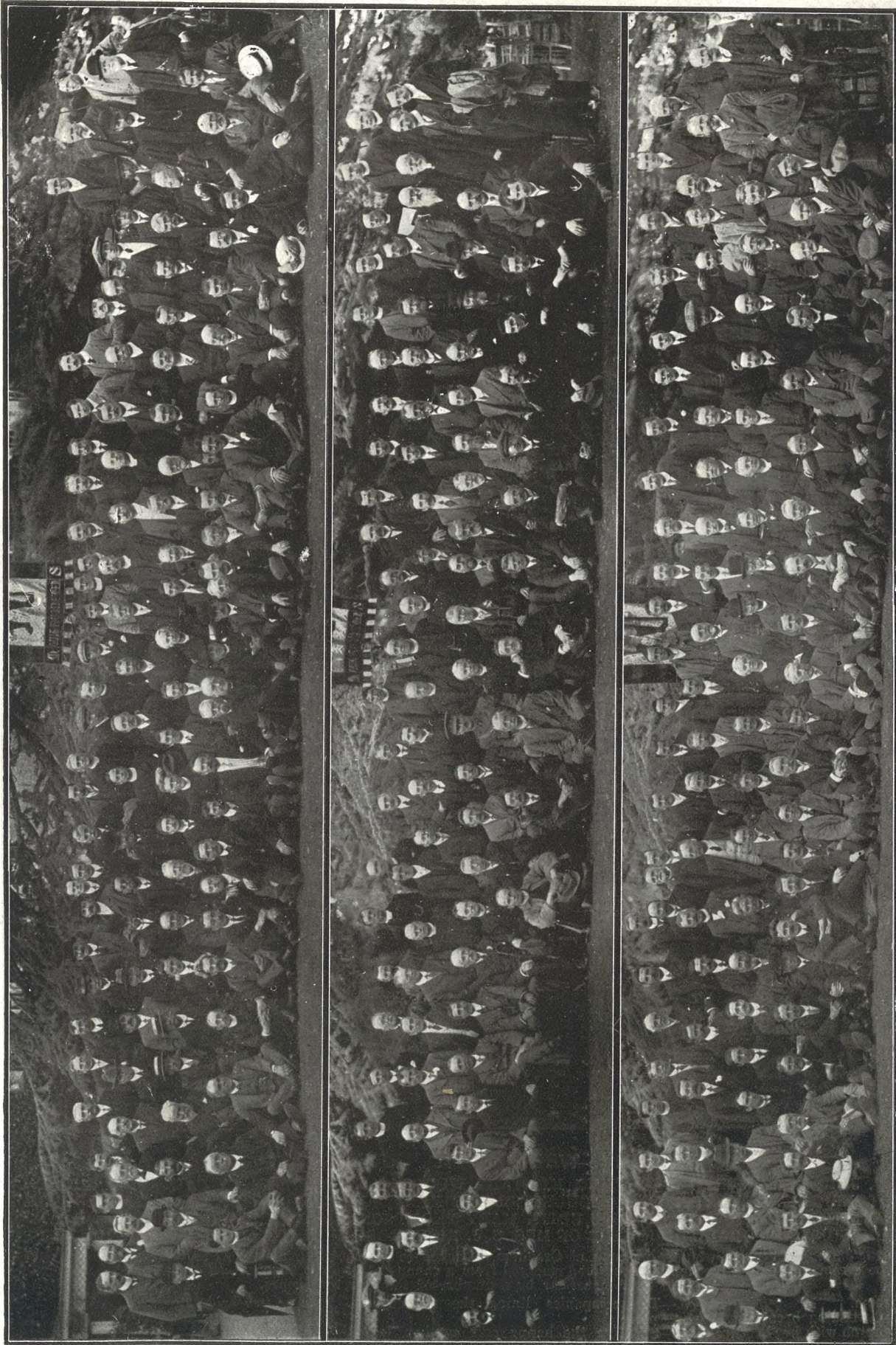


BIG MILITARY WEDDING AT PAINSWICK.



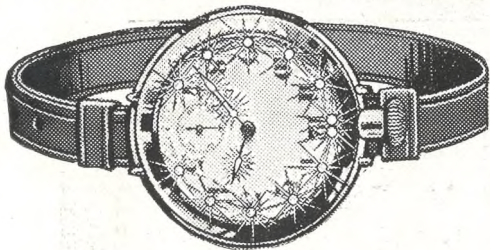
