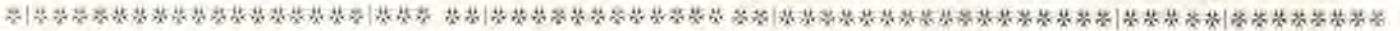




**OUTING TO WAINLODE HILL.**

**FUNERAL OF A SOLDIER IN CHELTENHAM.**

THE FIRST SOLDIER TO DIE OF WOUNDS IN THE ST. JOHN HOSPITAL, GLOUCESTER ROAD, CHELTENHAM, WAS PRIVATE W. E. BROTHERS, 4th MIDDLESEX REGIMENT, WHO WAS VERY ILL ON ARRIVAL, AND DIED A FEW DAYS LATER. HE WAS BURIED WITH MILITARY HONOURS AT CHELTENHAM CEMETERY ON SATURDAY, JULY 31. HE WAS A NATIVE OF LONDON. ANOTHER OF HIS BROTHERS HAD DIED FROM WOUNDS, WHILE ANOTHER HAS JUST BEEN INVALIDED OUT OF THE SERVICE.

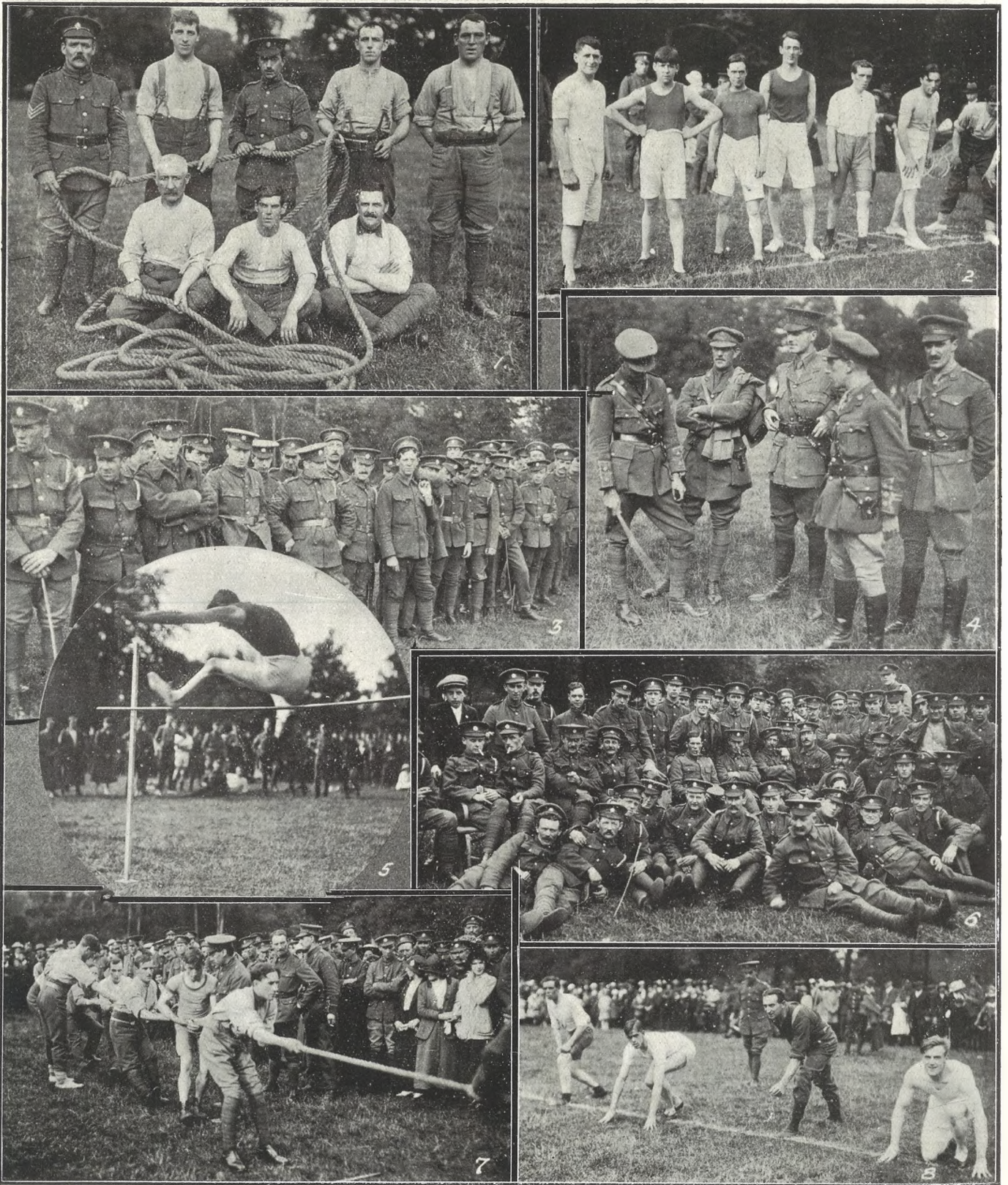
**A MARATHON RACE AND RECRUITING MEETING ON BANK HOLIDAY IN CHELTENHAM.**

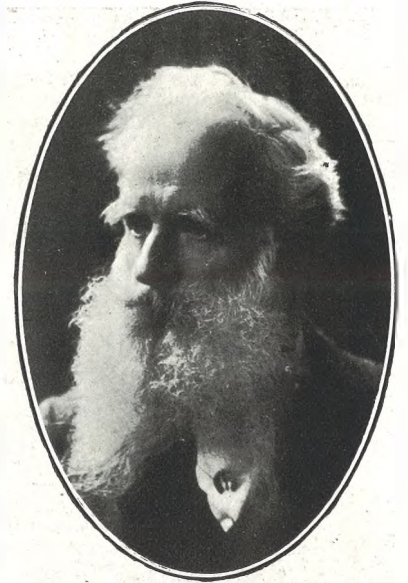

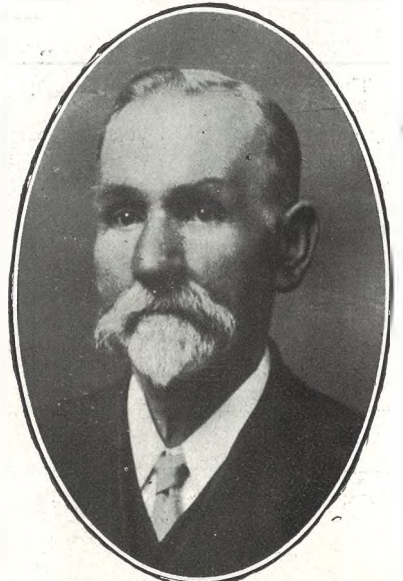

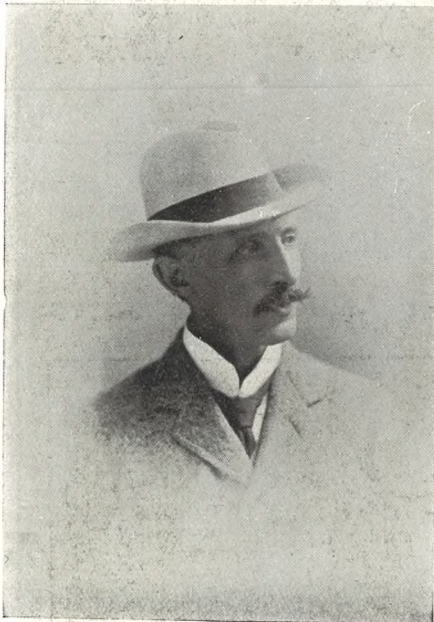

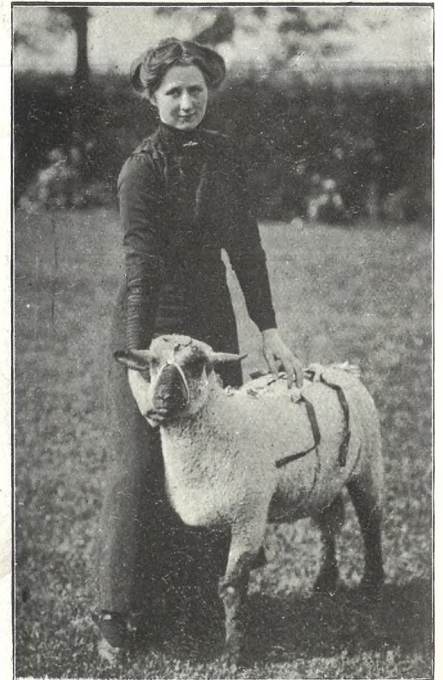
**Mr. Edwin Greene,**

Of Buckingham House, Wellington-street, Cheltenham, who died at his residence on Sunday, August 8th, aged 58 years. He was the composer of the famous song "Sing me to Sleep," which achieved such popularity that its sale has easily eclipsed that of any song that has ever been written. He also composed many others which have also become popular. He was a great sufferer, and had been an invalid for the last 20 years.



**Britain's Youngest V.C.**

Second-Lieut. G. R. Dallas Moor, V.C., 3rd Batt. Hampshire Regiment, who has gained the Victoria Cross for a most gallant action in the Dardanelles. He only left Cheltenham College in July, 1914, and is but 18 years of age. This is the official description of his deed. He receives the V.C. for "most conspicuous bravery and resource on 5th June, 1915, during operations south of Krithia, Dardanelles. When a detachment of a battalion on his left, which had lost all its officers, was rapidly retiring before a heavy Turkish attack, Second-Lieut. Moor, immediately grasping the danger to the remainder of the line, dashed back some 200 yards, stemmed the retirement, led back the men, and recaptured the lost trench. This young officer, who only joined the army in October, 1914, by his personal bravery and presence of mind, saved a dangerous situation." He is the son of Mr. William Henry Moor, who at the close of the Boer War was transferred from the Ceylon Civil Service to South Africa, and in 1907 became Auditor-General of the Transvaal. He came to Cheltenham College in 1910.

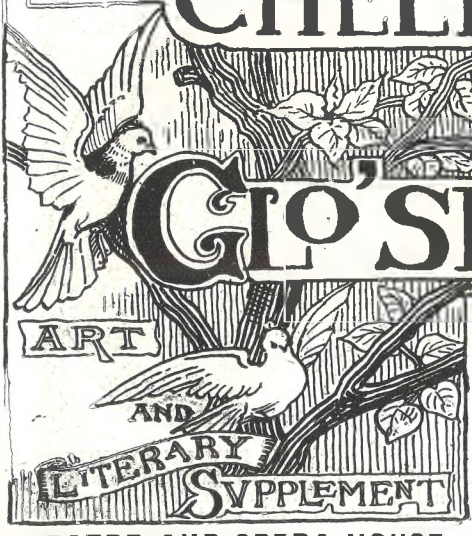

Commander Edward Unwin, R.N., of Charlton Lodge, Charlton Kings, who rejoined the Navy on the outbreak of war and was posted to H.M.S. Iron Duke (Admiral Jellicoe's flagship). He was afterwards selected for the landing operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula and was in command of the River Clyde, a converted collier specially prepared by himself for landing troops without recourse to boats. The ship was purposely run ashore under a murderous fire to link up with lighters and form a bridge and breakwater to the shore. He has now been awarded the Victoria Cross for exceptional bravery during landing operations.

**PTE. R. J. SMITH,**  
 7th Gloucester Regiment, killed in action in the Dardanelles in the recent fighting, in which the regiment suffered severely. Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Smith, Brooklyn, Saintbridge, Gloucester.



**PTE. STANLEY B. MORRIS,**  
 2nd Grenadier Guards, killed in action in France, July 9th, aged 27 years. Son of Private Morris, A.S.C., of 3 Elm-villas, Barton-street, Gloucester. His widow resides at Leeds.



**PTE. ALBERT D. LAKE,**

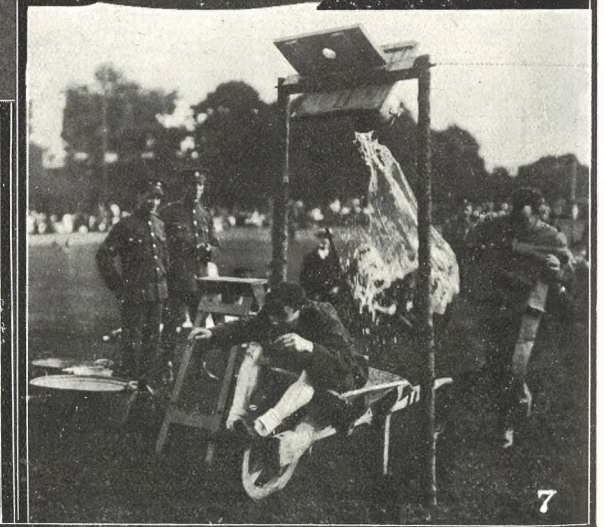

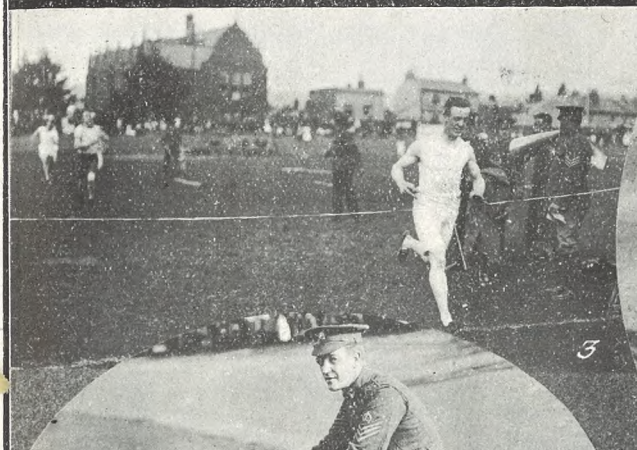

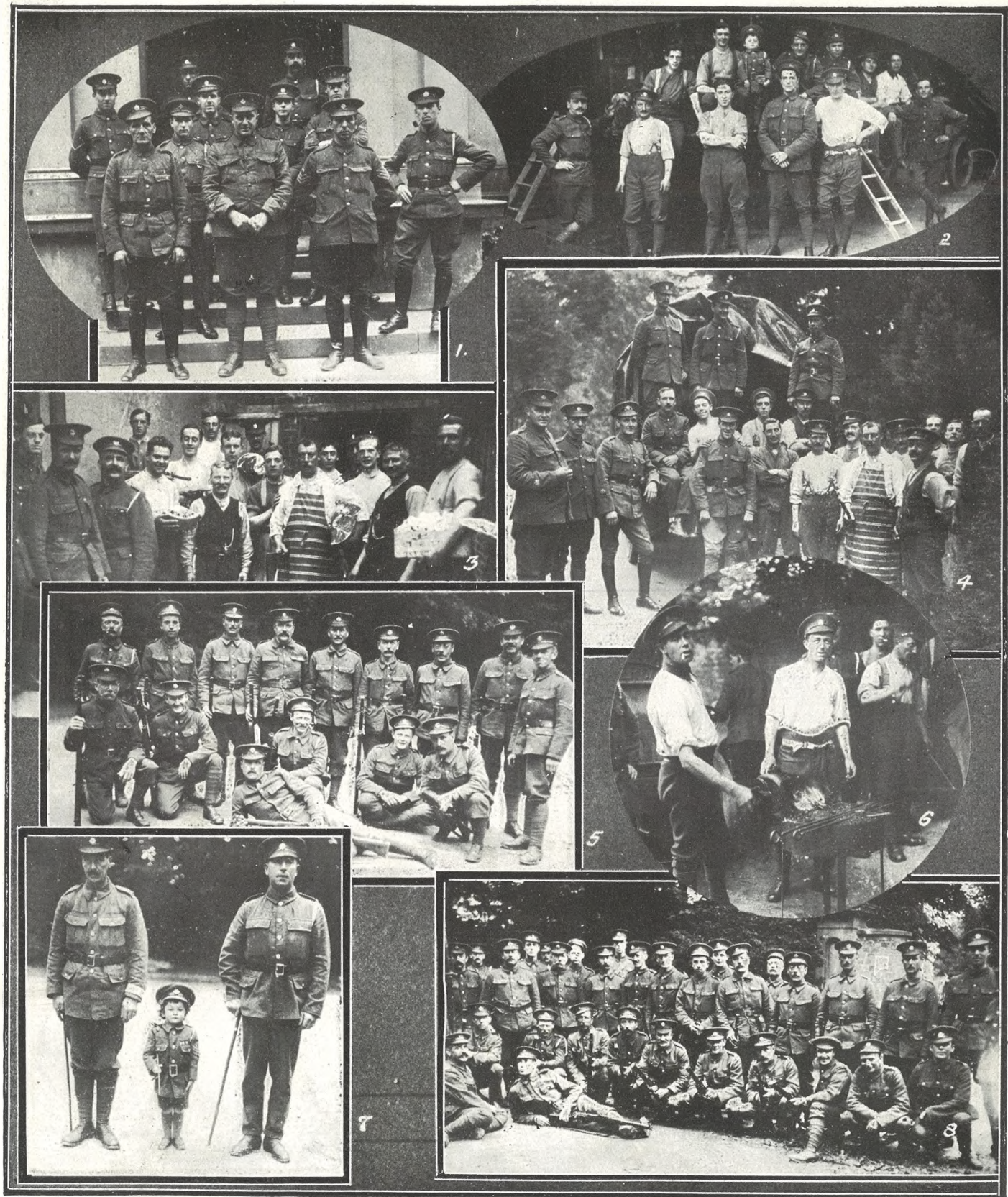

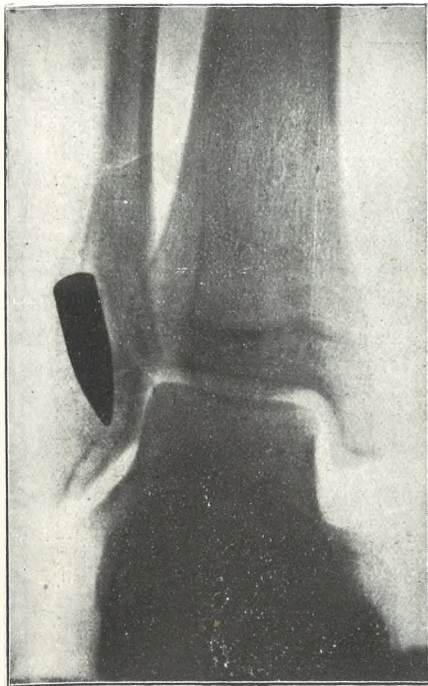

**A Bullet in a Soldier's Ankle.**

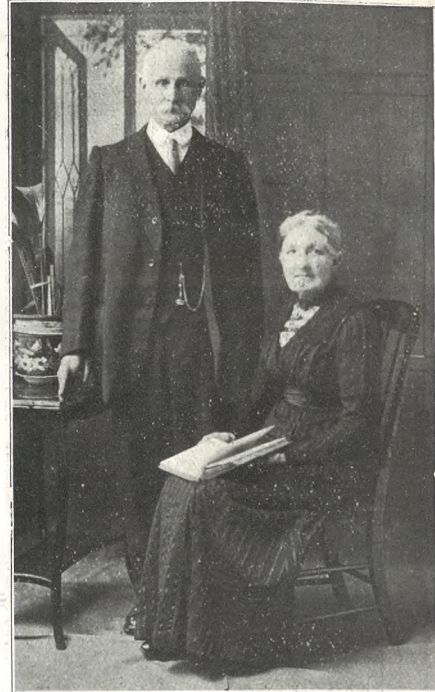

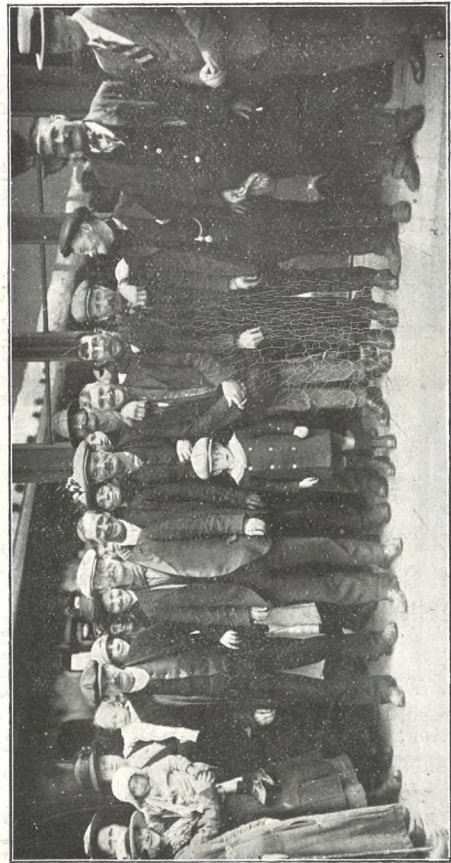
