7th Gloucester Regt., died on August 13 from wounds received in action at the Dardanelles on August 8. He leaves a wife and two children at 1 Robinhood-street, Gloucester, where he resided. He worked at Tuffley Brick Works prior to the war.



PTE. HENRY FIELD,
7th Gloucester Regt., missing since going into action August 8 at the Dardanelles. Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Field, and brother of Mr. F. Field, of 43 Sherborne-street, Cheltenham, who would be grateful for any information of him.



TROOPER CHARLES S. FREEMAN,

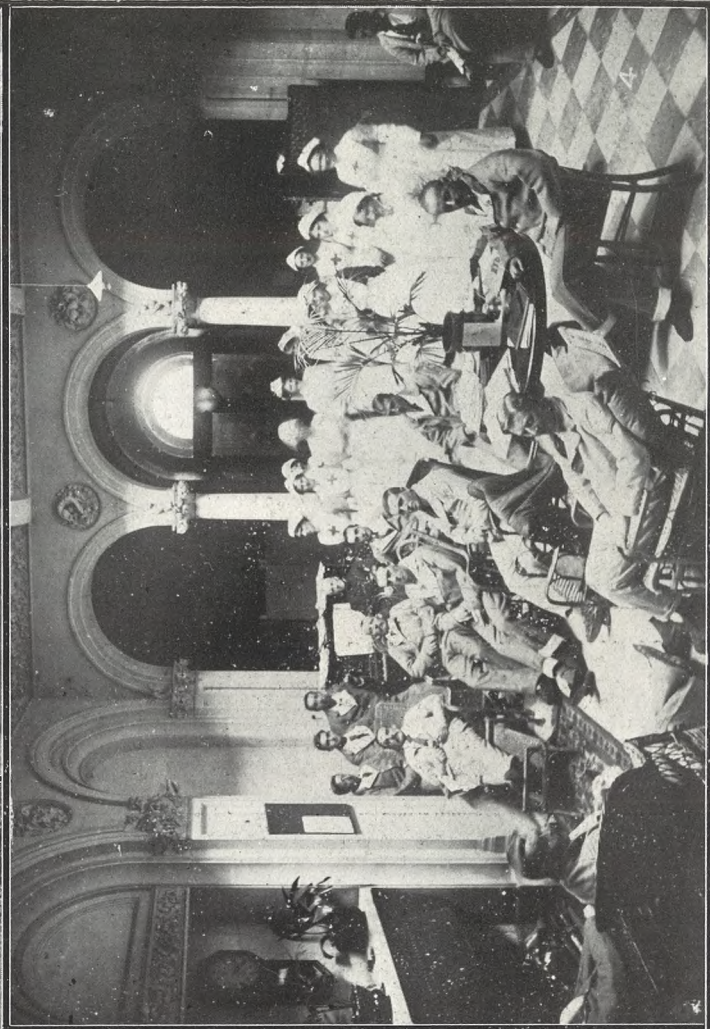
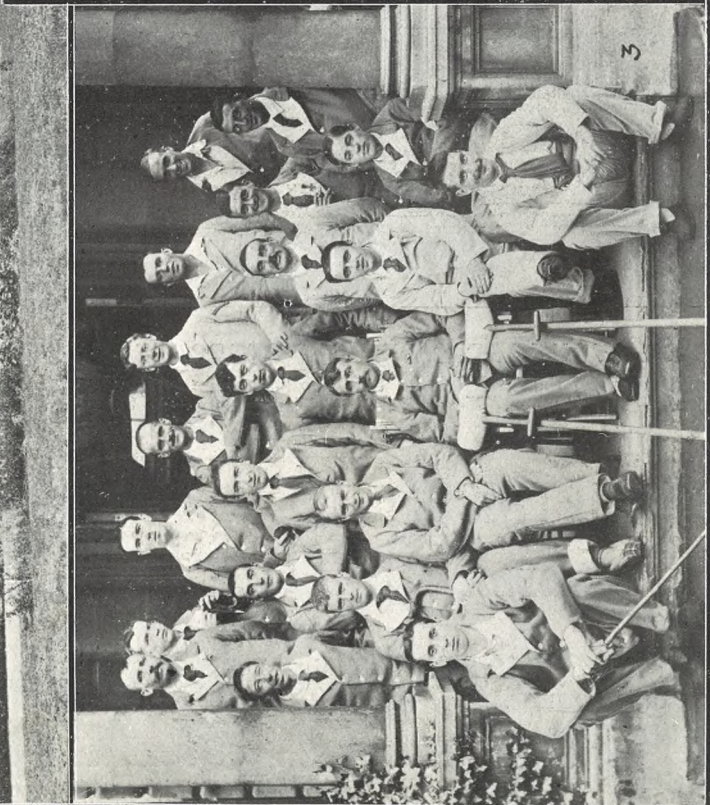
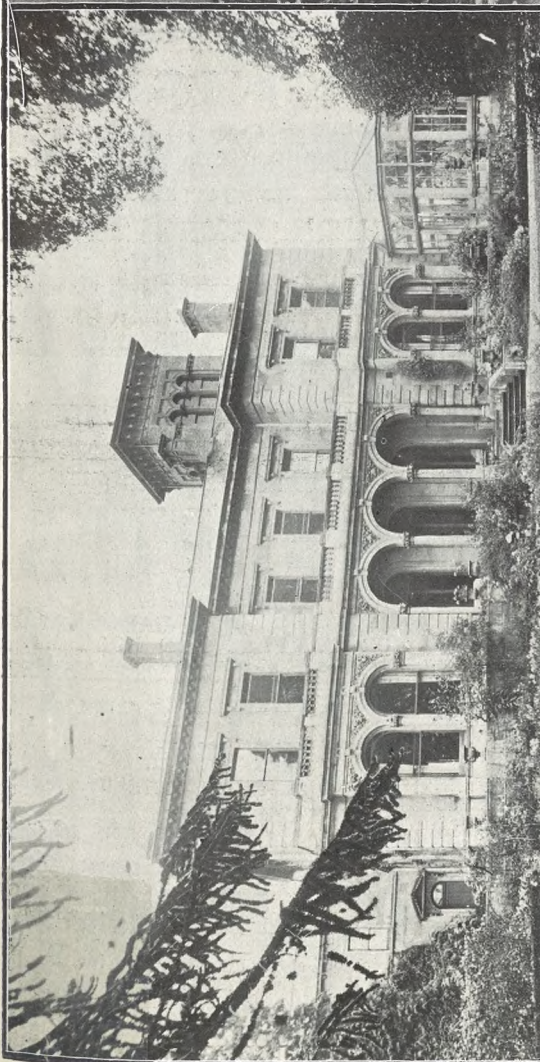

A NEW RED CROSS HOSPITAL WAS OPENED IN GLOUCESTER LAST WEEK, ALTHOUGH IT HAD BEEN EQUIPPED AND WAITING FOR SOME MONTHS. IT IS AT HILLFIELD HOUSE, LONDON ROAD, ONE OF THE LARGEST AND HANDSOMEST HOUSES IN THE CITY, AND IT MAKES AN IDEAL HOSPITAL. IT HAS NOW ABOUT FIFTY PATIENTS, MOSTLY WOUNDED AT THE DARDANELLES. DR. E. D. FOWER IS MEDICAL OFFICER AND MRS. NIGEL HAINES COMMANDANT.

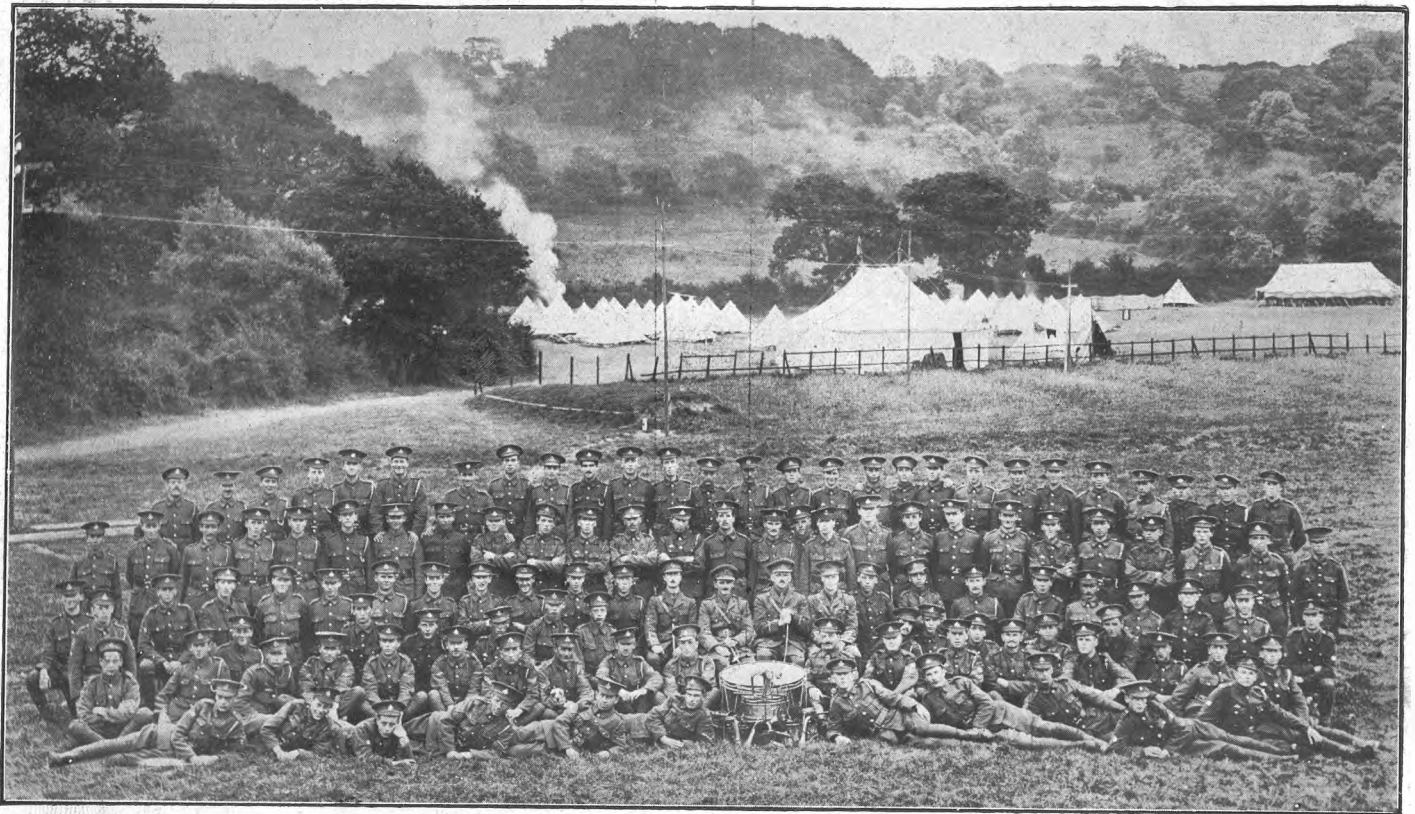

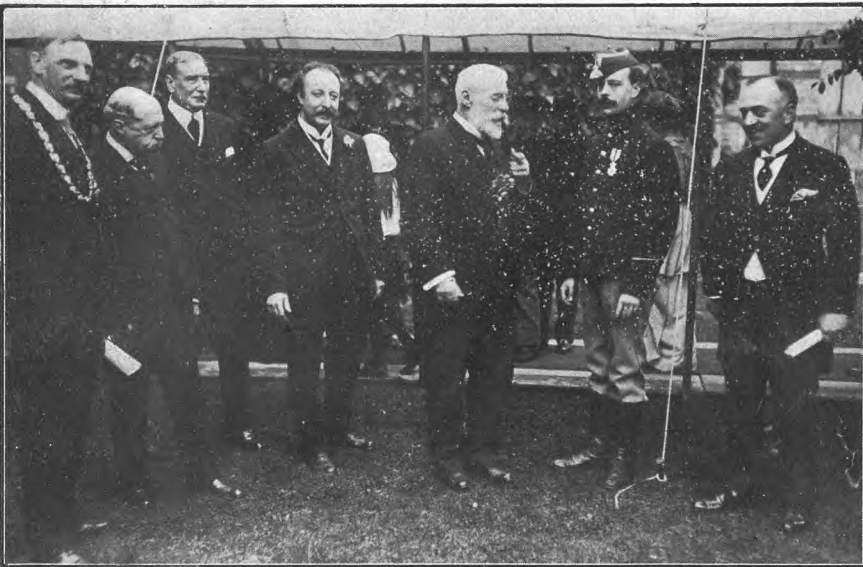

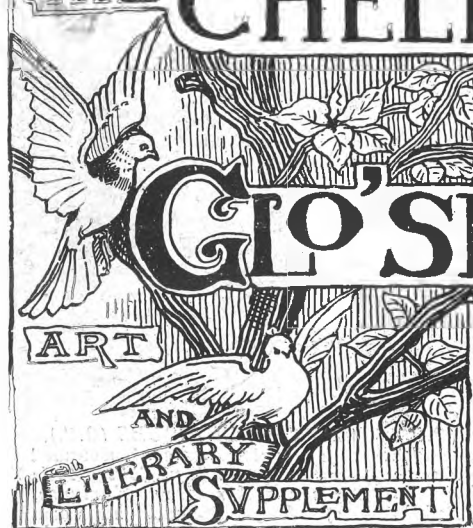

His home is in South Africa, and he went through the Boer War. He was second in command of the regiment, and was one of the most popular and capable officers.



MAJ. W. R. PATERSON (O.C.), 10th Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action on Sept. 25th in the recent heavy fighting in France, and now in a Dublin hospital. He is a son of Mrs. Paterson, of Wendover, Christ Church-road, and his promotion has been extremely rapid, he getting his commission as 2nd-lieut. in Sept., 1914.



CAPT. H. ENRIQUEZ (O.C.), 10th Gloucester Regiment, wounded in France on Sept. 25th. He is a son of Mr. Isaac Enriquez, of Smyrna, and his own address is 136 Fenchurch-street, London. 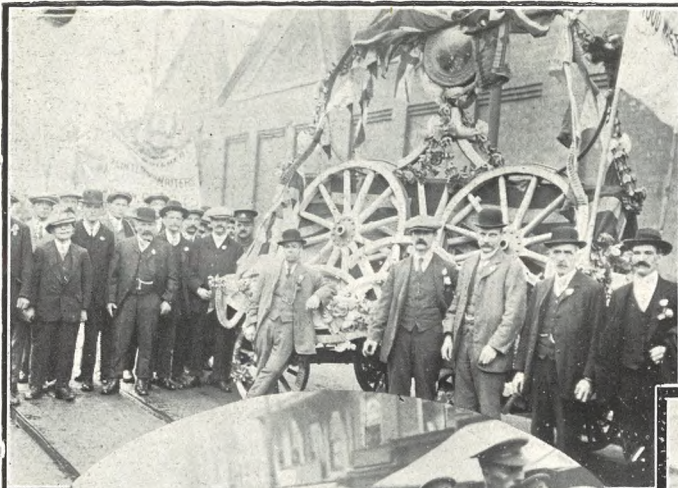

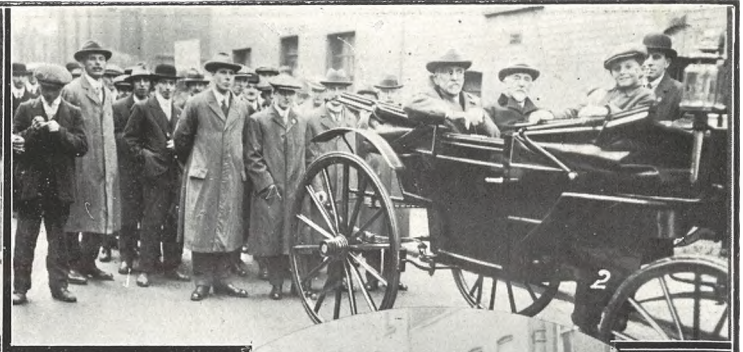

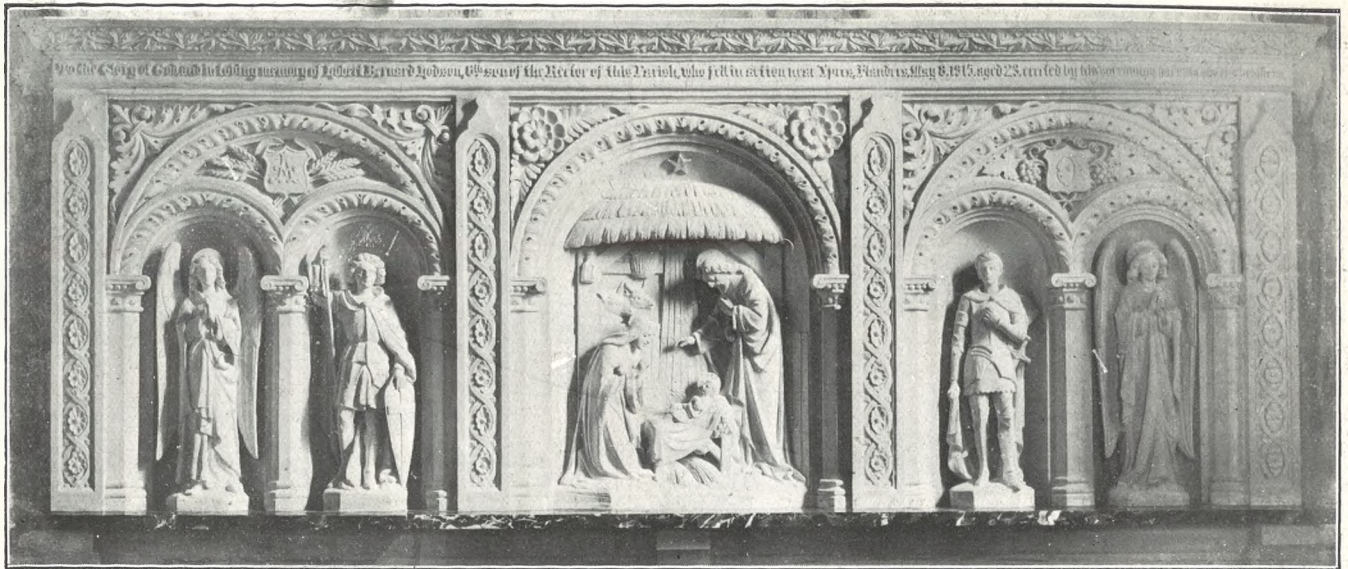

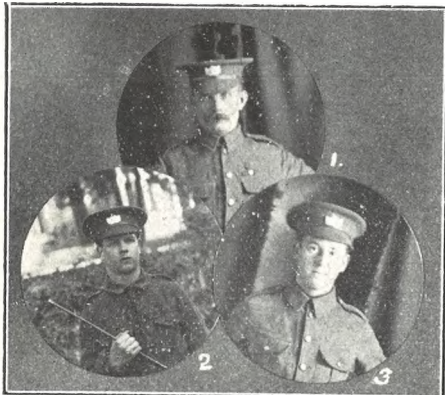
