

#### CHELTENHAM FIRMS AND THEIR STAFFS No. 2.—GLOUCESTERSHIRE DAIRY CO., LTD.

The business of the Gloucestershire Dairy Co., Ltd., was first established in the Promenade, Cheltenham, by Mr. and Mrs. John Holborow, senr., about 1880, and was carried on by them up to Mr. Holborow's death in 1901. Their eldest son, Mr. J. P. Holborow, then joined his mother in the firm. The importance of clean milk was then beginning to be realised and their smart turnouts and clean-smocked deliverers contrasted so forcibly with some of the delivery methods in vogue at that time, that the business made considerable strides, and was in 1914 turned into a family limited liability company. Some three years ago the principal interest in the Cheltenham Creamery, Ltd., was purchased, and the business was amalgamated with that of the Gloucestershire Dairy Co. From one or two carts in 1880 to the present staff of over 100, furnished with the latest machinery for ensuring perfect cleanliness, is a far cry, and the firm has been rewarded for its enterprise by constantly increasing business. Another asset has been the fact that all the family have been practical farmers. Whaddon, Bafford, and Northfield being their centres. Owing to the nature of the business it is never possible to gather all the staff together at once, consequently only rather more than half are in the photographs above. The Company have branches at Cirencester, Stroud and Painswick Certified milk is produced on their Bafford Farm, and tuberculin-tested milk at Northfield Farm.






