





CHELTENHAM FIRMS AND THEIR STAFFS .- No. 6: MESSRS, MARK WILLIAMS AND CO., LTD. The firm of Mark Williams and Co., Ltd., was founded in 1868 by the late Mr. Mark Williams, who was succeeded in 1899 by his grandson, the late Mr. Harry T. F. Towell. Mr. Towell carried on the business as a sole proprietor until 1928, when he formed it into a private limited company, with himself as the first managing-director, a position which he held until the time of his death, which occurred at sea on May 9th, 1936.

Mr. Towell was succeeded by his co-director, Councillor P. P. Davis (son-in-law), who has been associated with the firm for 24 years, and another director was appointed in Mrs. P. P. Davis (daughter).

The business is one of public works contractors, general transport, coal, sand and gravel merchants. Many large contracts have been successfully carried through by this firm, such as the sewage bed extensions at Hayden, 24in. cast iron pumping main from Coombe Hill to Tewkesbury (including laying of the pipe mains under the bed of the River Avon), storm water overflows to the Chelt for Cheltenham Corporation, and also the making of roads and general layout to private housing estates.

The total number of employees is now about 120, many of whom have been with the firm for upwards of 30 years.









A SPLENDID TWO-PURPOSE CAR





CHELTENHAM FIRMS AND THEIR STAFFS .-- No. 7, MESSRS, W. HOPWOOD & SON.

About 125 years ago William Hopwood, senior, who had been head gardener to Earl Bathurst, established the famous firm of W. Hopwood and Son, Horticulturalists. The original premises were on the corner of Leighton-road and Hewlett-street and the nurseries extended behind the land, part of which is now occupied by Leighton-road. As the business grew, Tudor House, Hewlett-street (now occupied by Messrs, W. T. Pates and Sons, Builders) was erected as a seed warehouse; but with further progress still, the present premises- 58 High-street- were acquired, and also the nurseries in Prestburyroad. After the death of the founder, William Hopwood the younger continued the business until 1893, when it passed to Mr. W. P. Hume, who had married a daughter of William Hopwood, senior. On the death of Mr. Hume in 1911, Mr. Percy Wiggall, who had managed the business for the previous eleven years, then became the purchaser, and from that time the concern from being purely local became international, and there is now no clime or country where growth is possible that Hopwoods' specialities have not reached. Recent developments have been the rebuilding of all the glasshouses and, of course, the establishment of the extensive new nursery on the Gloucester-road. It is interesting to note that the avenue of trees in the Lansdown-road and many of those in the Pittville area, the stately cedars in the Cemetery, and the coniferea so beautifully reflected in the waters of Dowdeswell reservoir, all came from Hopwoods' nurseries. The employees at present number about 80, and it was not possible to include all, as many were on outside work away from the nurseries.



Paragon Laundries (Glos.) Ltd. came into being in July, 1925, when it acquired the Hatherley Laundry, Cheltenham, and the Tewkesbury Hygienic Laundry. The Hatherley Laundry had been established about thirty-eight years, three of the original directors being Col. N. B. Thoyts, General Bainbridge and Mr. Thomas Wilkins, and when taken over by the Paragon Laundries the chairman was the late Mr. Richard Minett, Borough Treasurer of Cheltenham, the other directors being the late Dr. Boyd Cardew and the late Mr. W. CHELTENHAM FIRMS AND THEIR STAFFS. No. 9: CHELTENHAM BOROUGH ELECTRICITY DEPARTMENT

Cheltenham was one of the pioneer towns to arrange a public supply of electricity, and this was inaugurated in May, 1895. At that time only the larger towns and cities had an electric supply, and in many cases this was in the hands of private companies. For many years the use of electricity in Cheltenham was confined to lighting. Then it was extended to driving electric motors and later its use for cooking, heating and a multitude of other purposes became general. The development of the Cheltenham Electricity Undertaking, slow in its early years, increased rapidly after the war, and particularly during the last seven years, during which the output has been nearly doubled. The staff and employees have increased and at the present time the undertaking finds regular employment for about 103 persons, though this number is largely increased when extensions are in progress. In recent years the frequency of the supply has been changed from 100 to 50 cycles per second in order to enable the undertaking to link up with the national scheme. This resulted in the closing of the Cheltenham generating station in 1932, and since then the town's supply has been obtained from the Shropshire Power Co.


