The business of Drake and Co., Drapers and Furnishers, of Winchcombe-street, was founded by the late Mr. F. G. Drake, in 1887, when he took over an old established drapery establishment consisting of two shops in this street. Later a third shop was acquired and a furnishing department added, and the growth of this section particularly has necessitated the addition, in recent years, of extensive workshops, stores and showrooms at Gloucester-place. The present Winch-combe-street premises are more than double the size of the original store established 49 years ago. The founder was in active control of the business until his death in 1934, and the firm's activities are now under the personal supervision of Mr. L. G. 






