





A COMBINATION HARVESTER AT WORK IN GLOUCESTERSHIRE
A combined cutting and threshing machine—the first to be used on the Cotswolds—is at work on the farm of Mr. A. Henly at Harnhill Manor, near Cirencester. The combination harvester is hauled by a motor tractor. It cuts and threshes the wheat, filling sacks as it goes along with the grain, which is conveyed immediately by motor-lorry to the farm, where it is dried by machinery. (See article in 'Chronicle").
