A FINE HARVEST ON THE COTSWOLDS

The corn harvest on the Cotswolds this year is a very fine one, and reports of splendid crops of wheat, oats and barley from many districts are to hand. Above we illustrate a wonderful crop of wheat being gathered by Mr. Geo. Wood on his Glebe Farm at Haselton. The field had been used for many years for growing wild white clover, but Mr. Wood ploughed it two years ago, and this year has had a phenomenal crop of wheat; which he thinks is due to the enriching qualities of wild white clover on the soil. The huge rick he is constructing is not to be thatched, but will be covered with corrugated iron.

CHELTENHAM TOWN A.F.C. FIRST MATCH OF THE SEASON

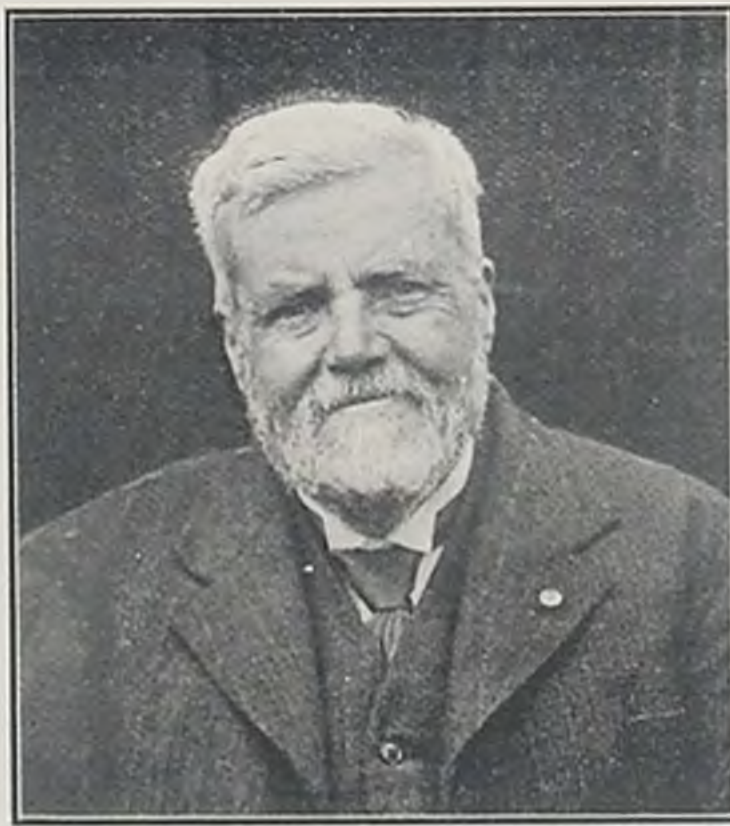
Cheltenham lost their first match on Saturday in the Southern League to Newport County Reserves by 5 goals to 2.
