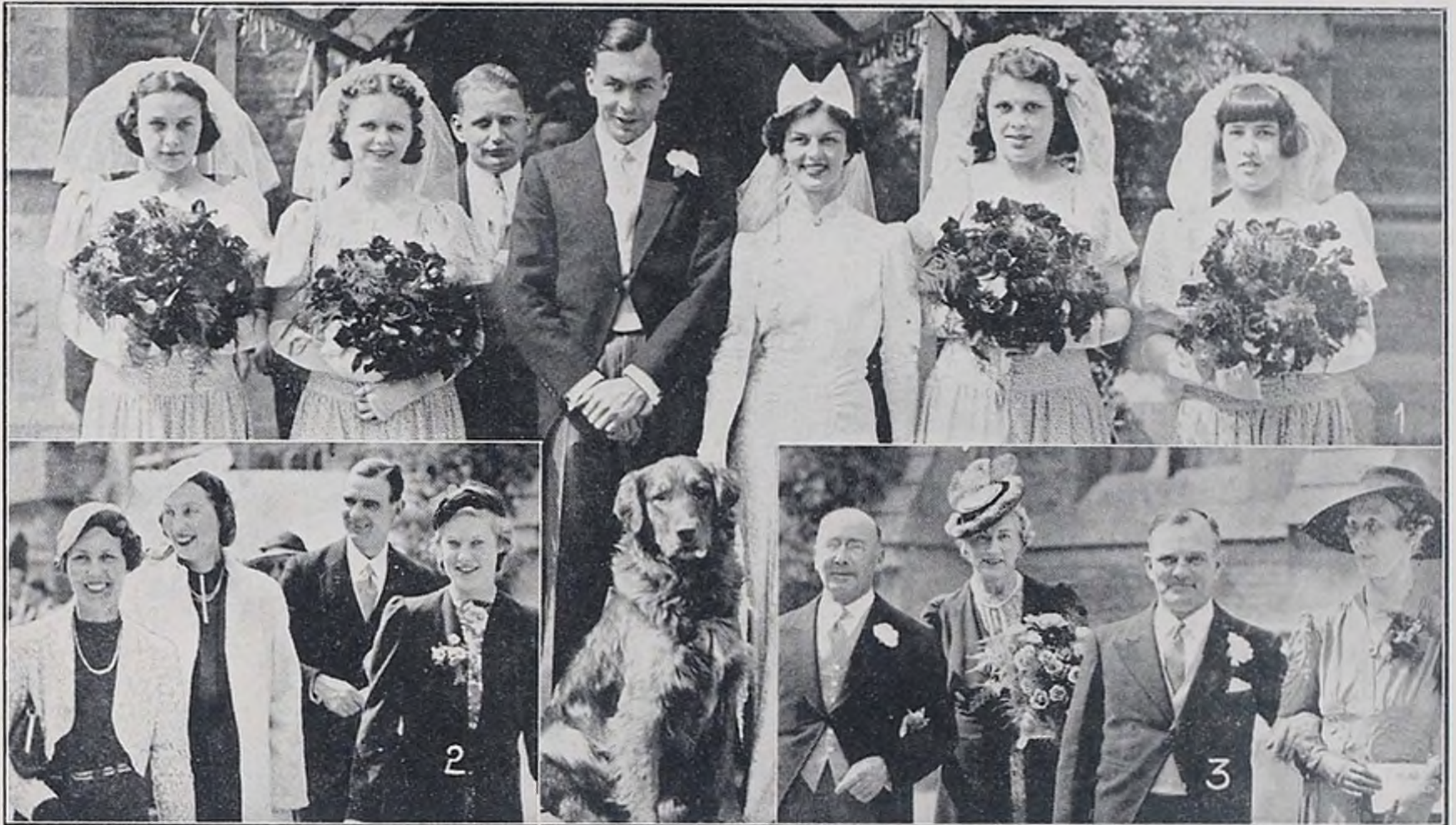

WHADDON-ROAD COUNCIL SCHOOL CELEBRATES EMPIRE DAY

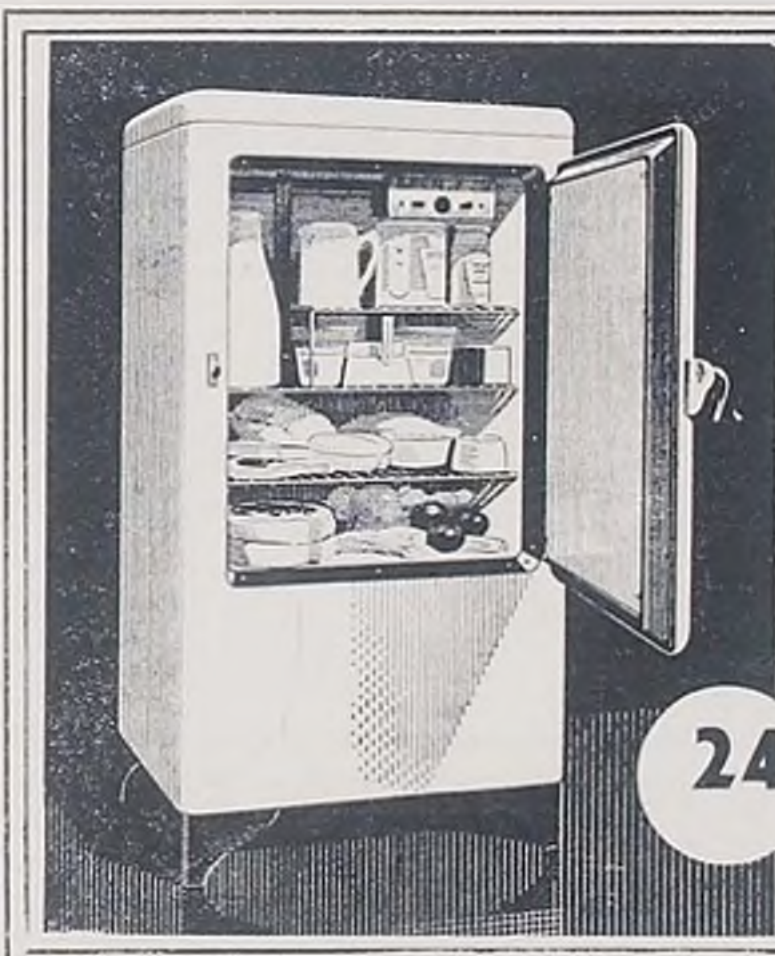

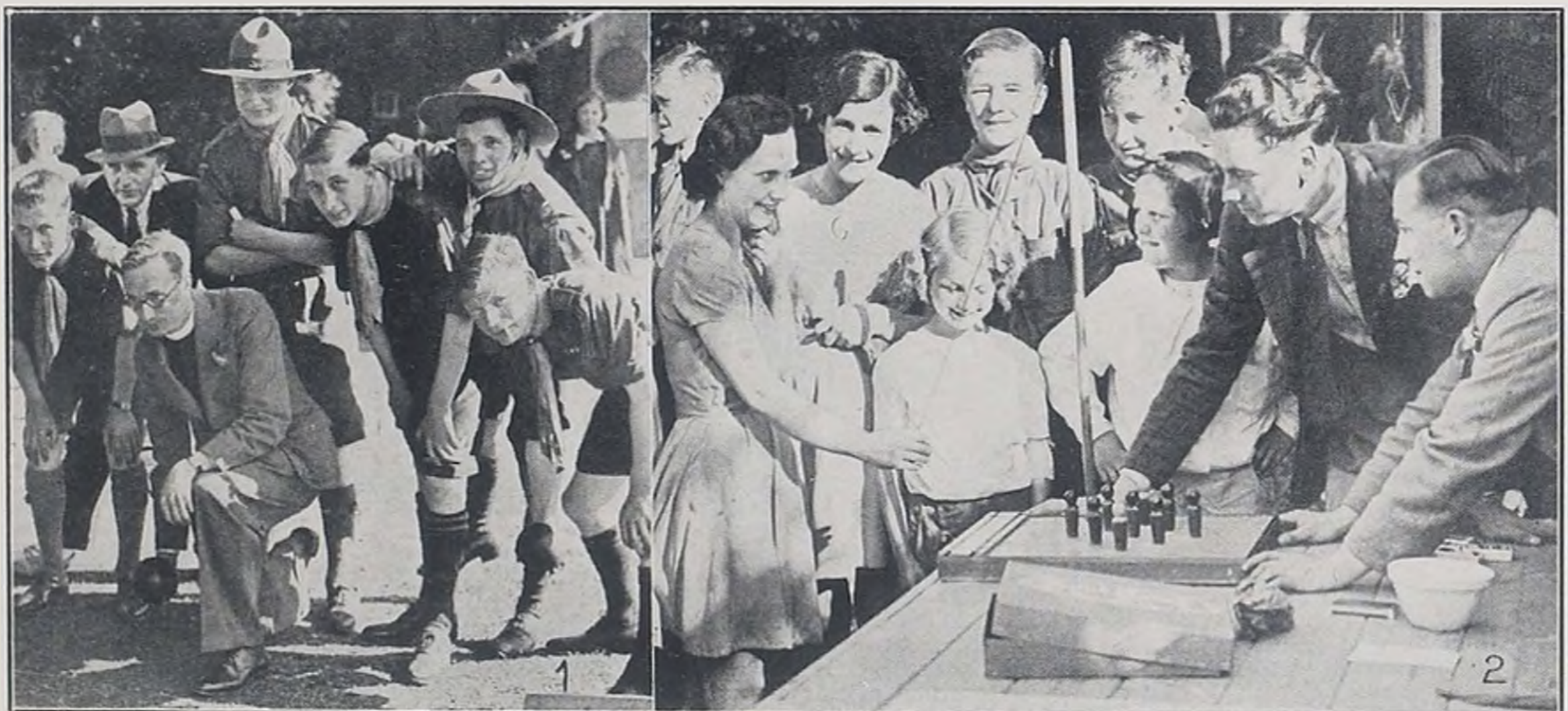

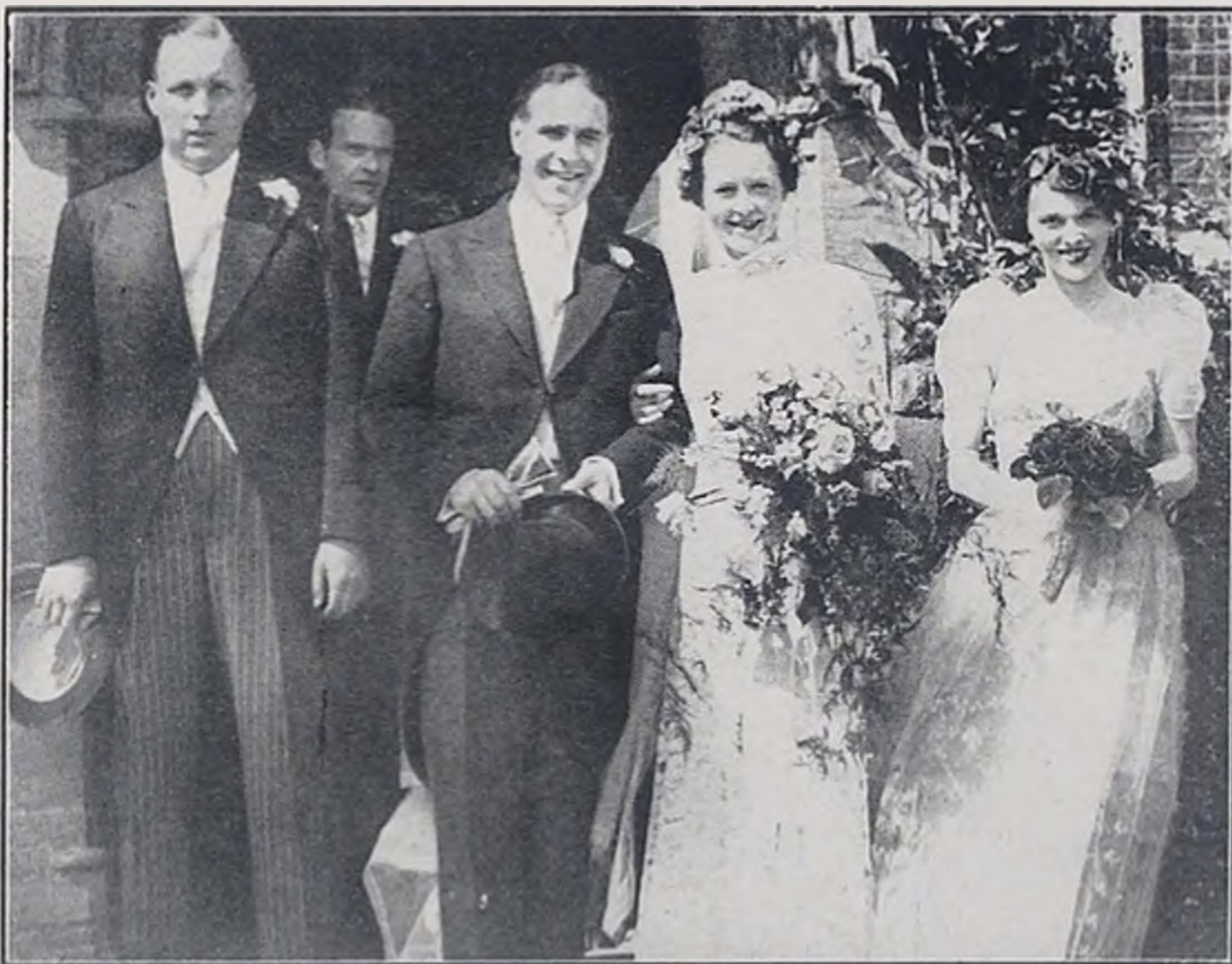

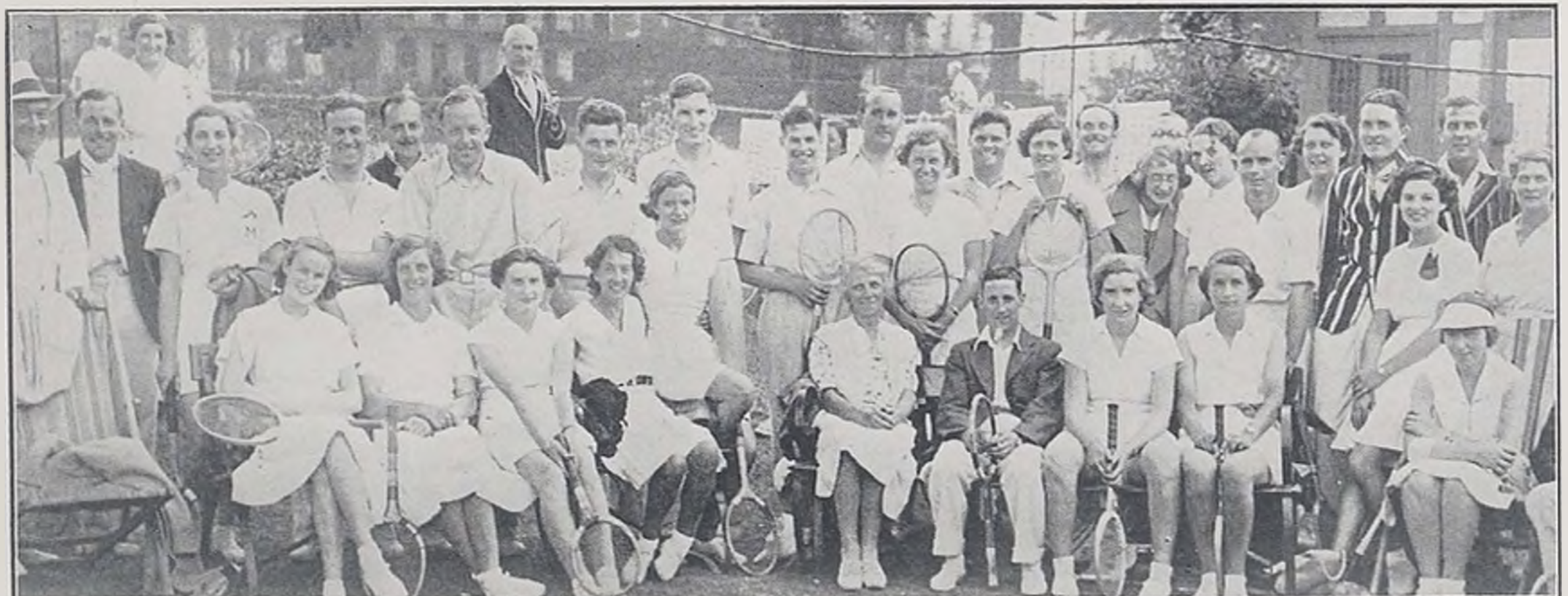

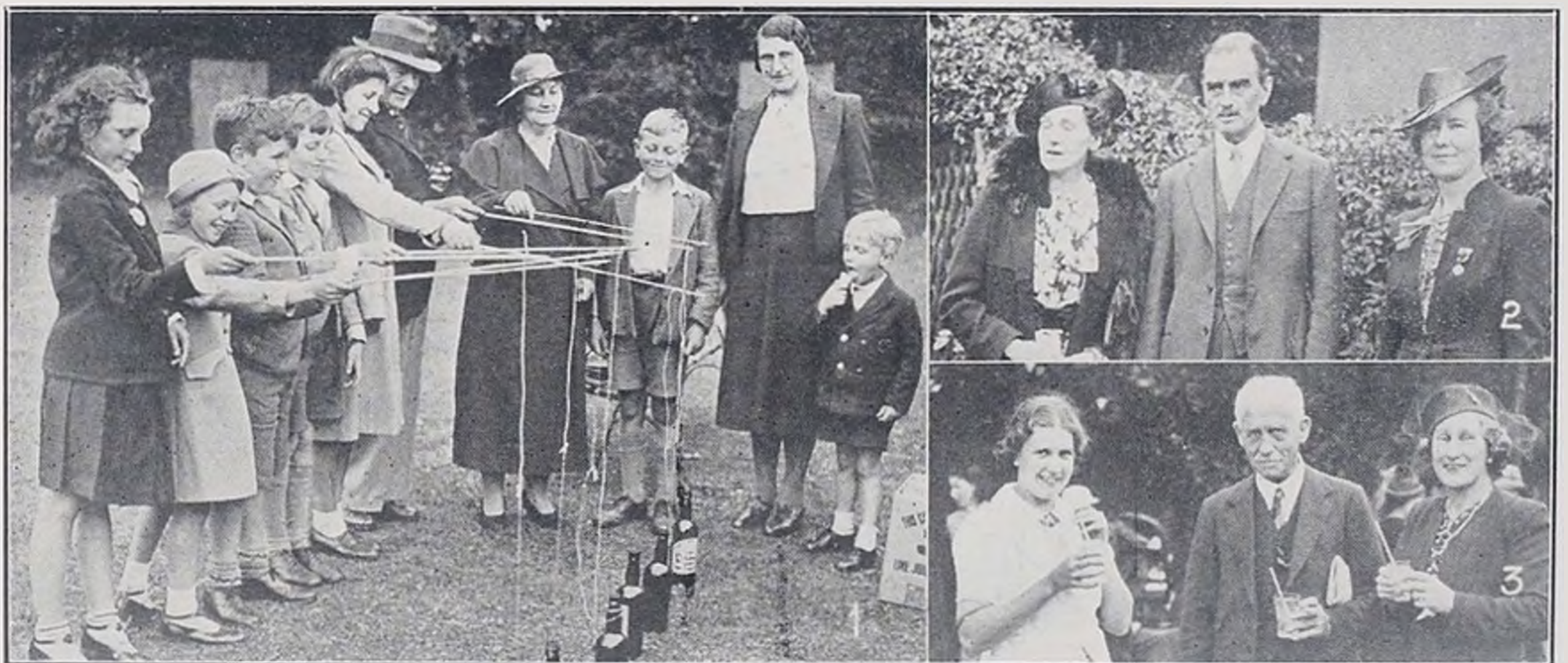

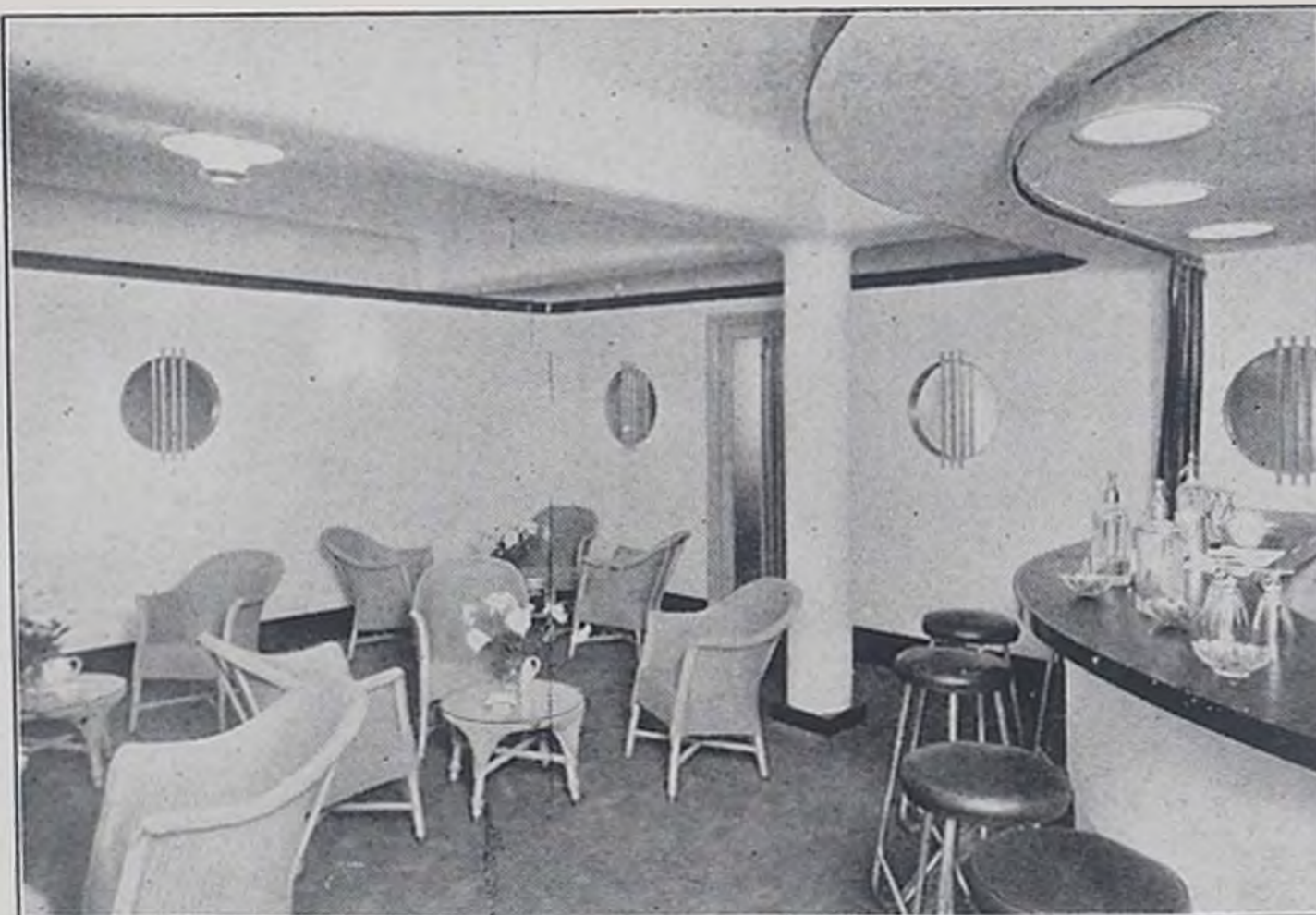
