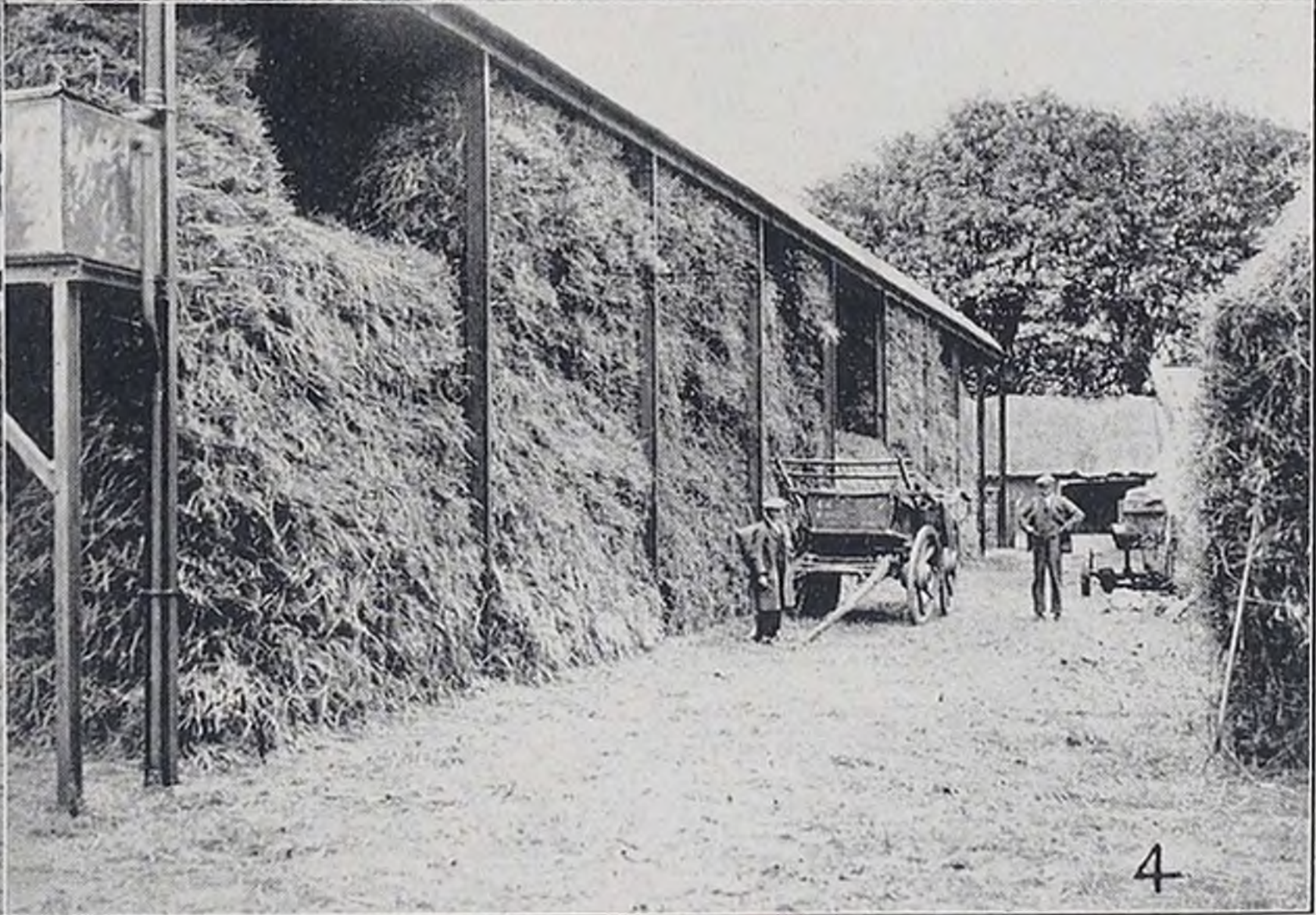


AUXILIARY FIRE SERVICE IN CHELTENHAM

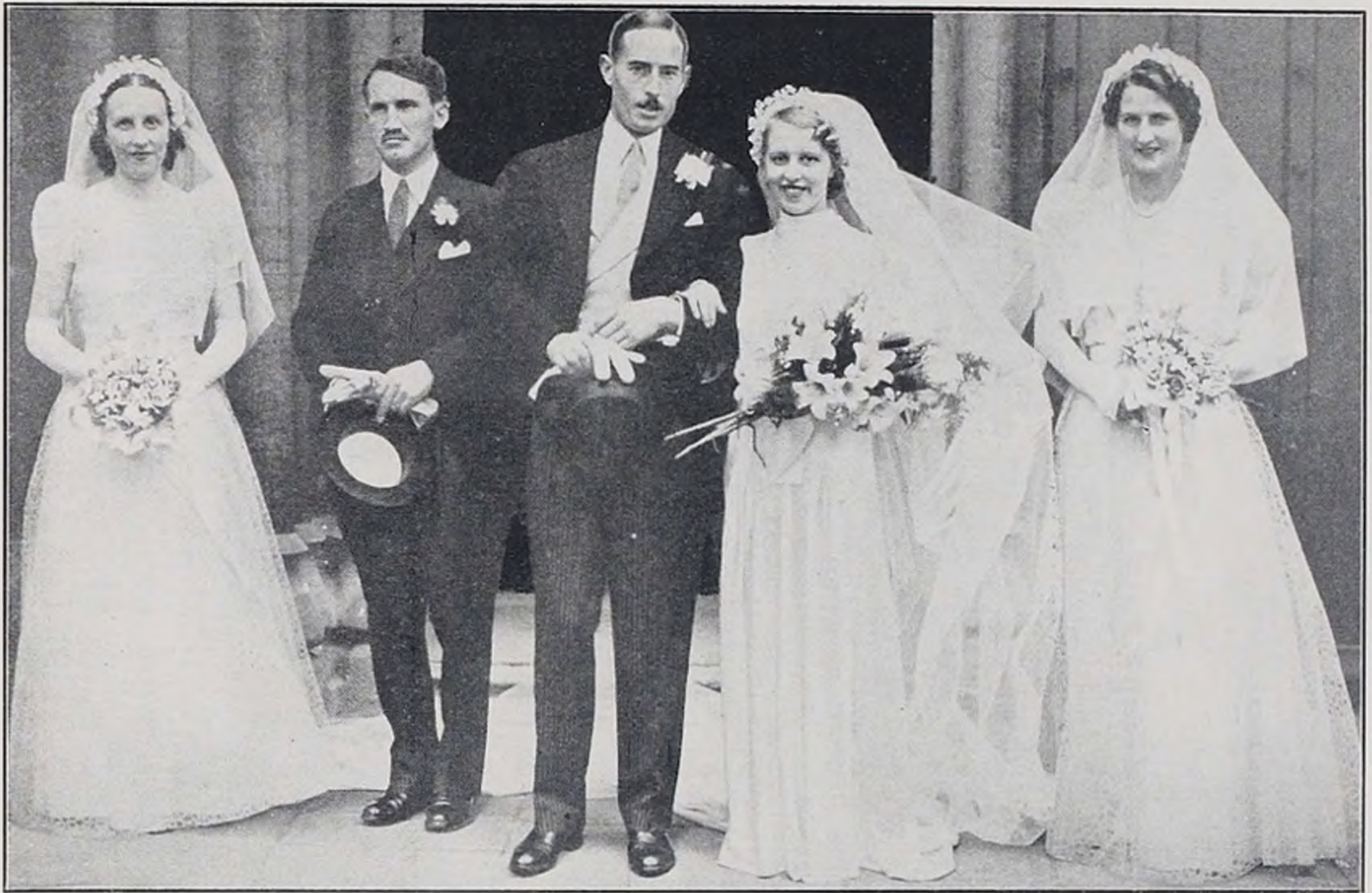

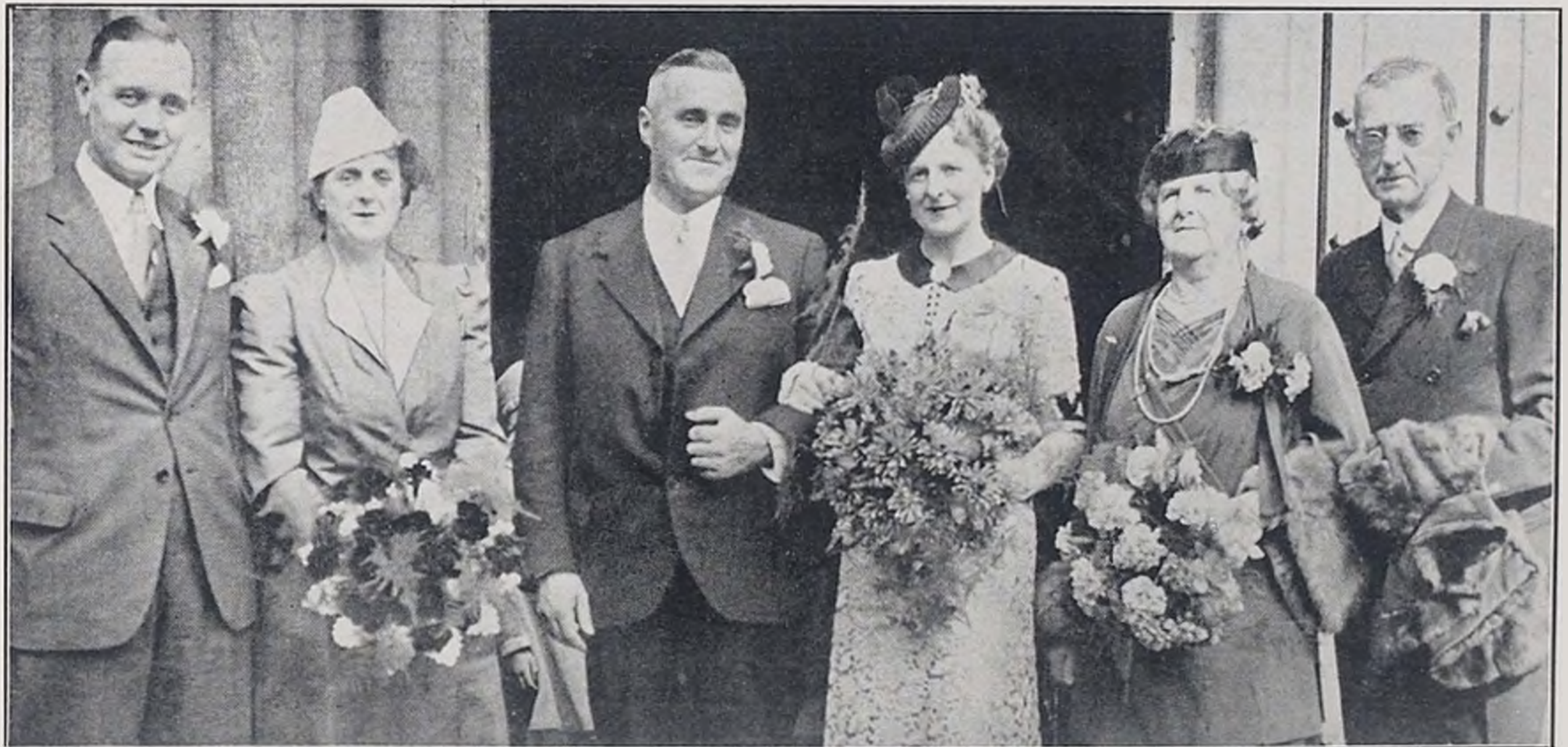

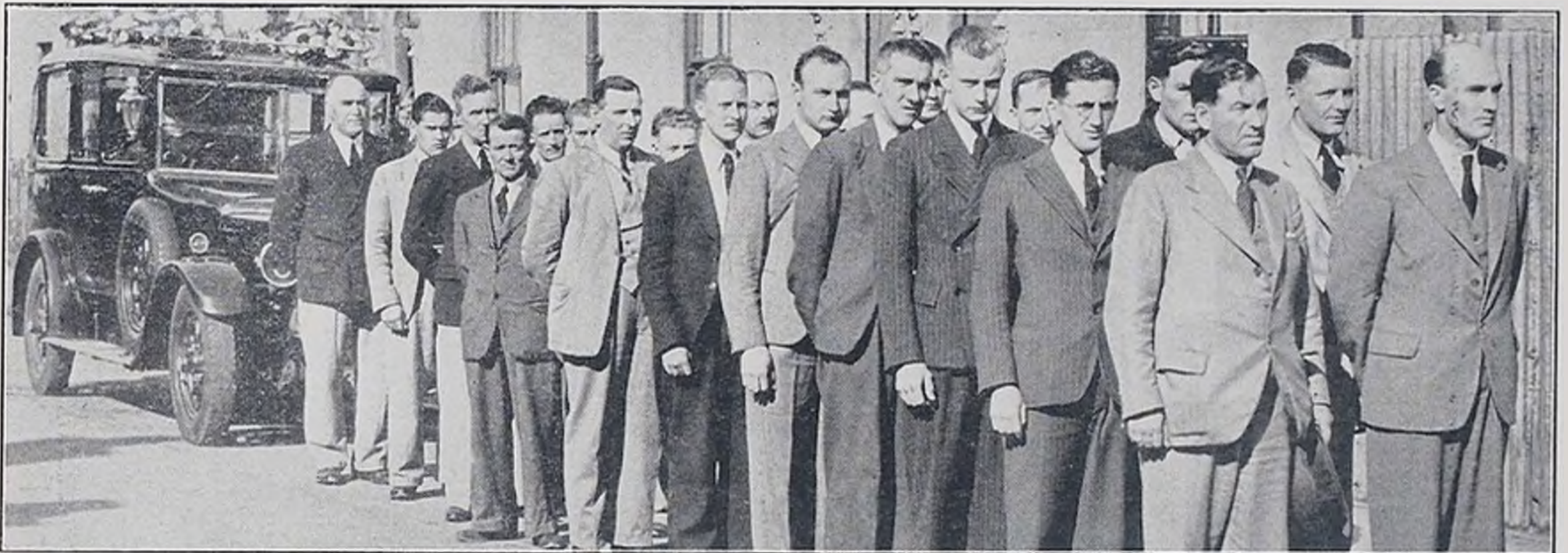

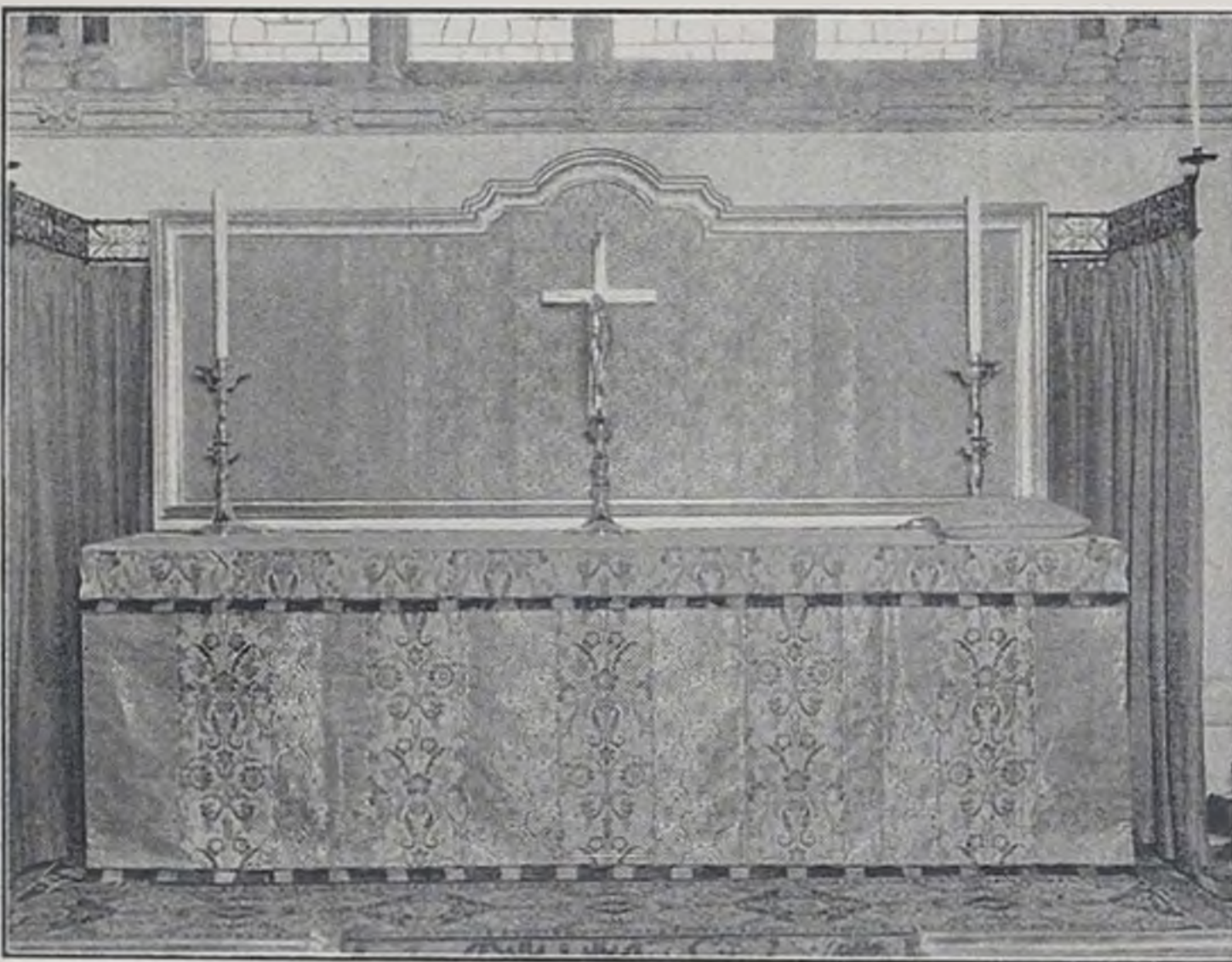

IMPROVEMENTS AT ST. STEPHEN'S CHURCH

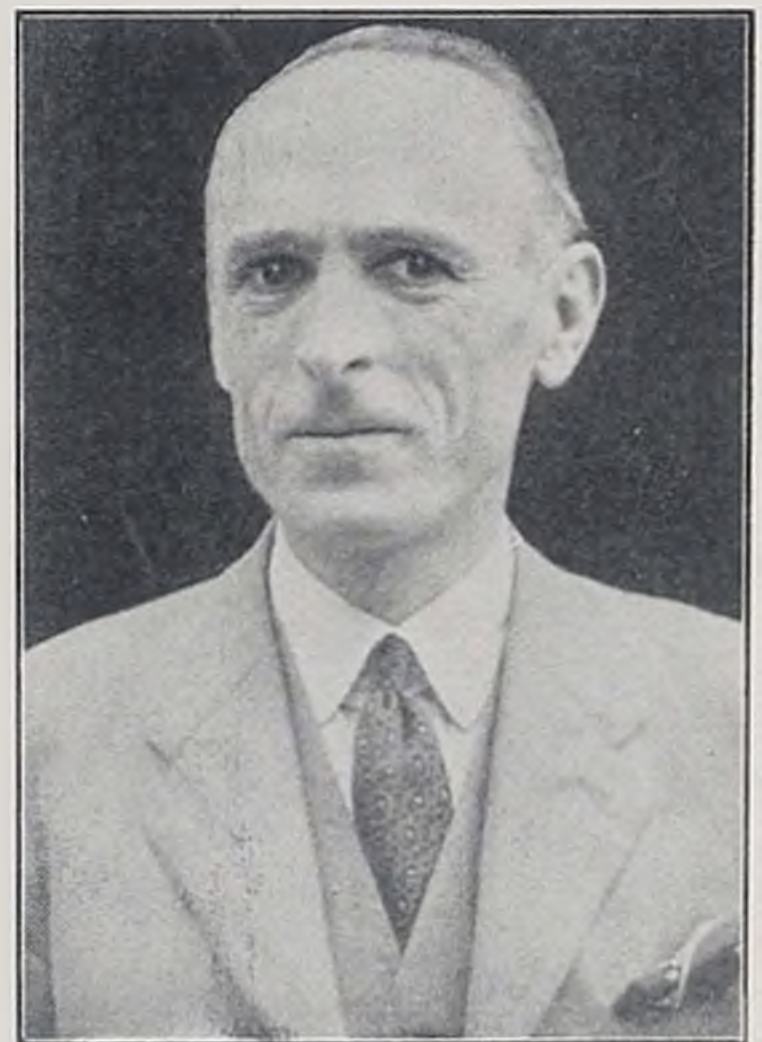

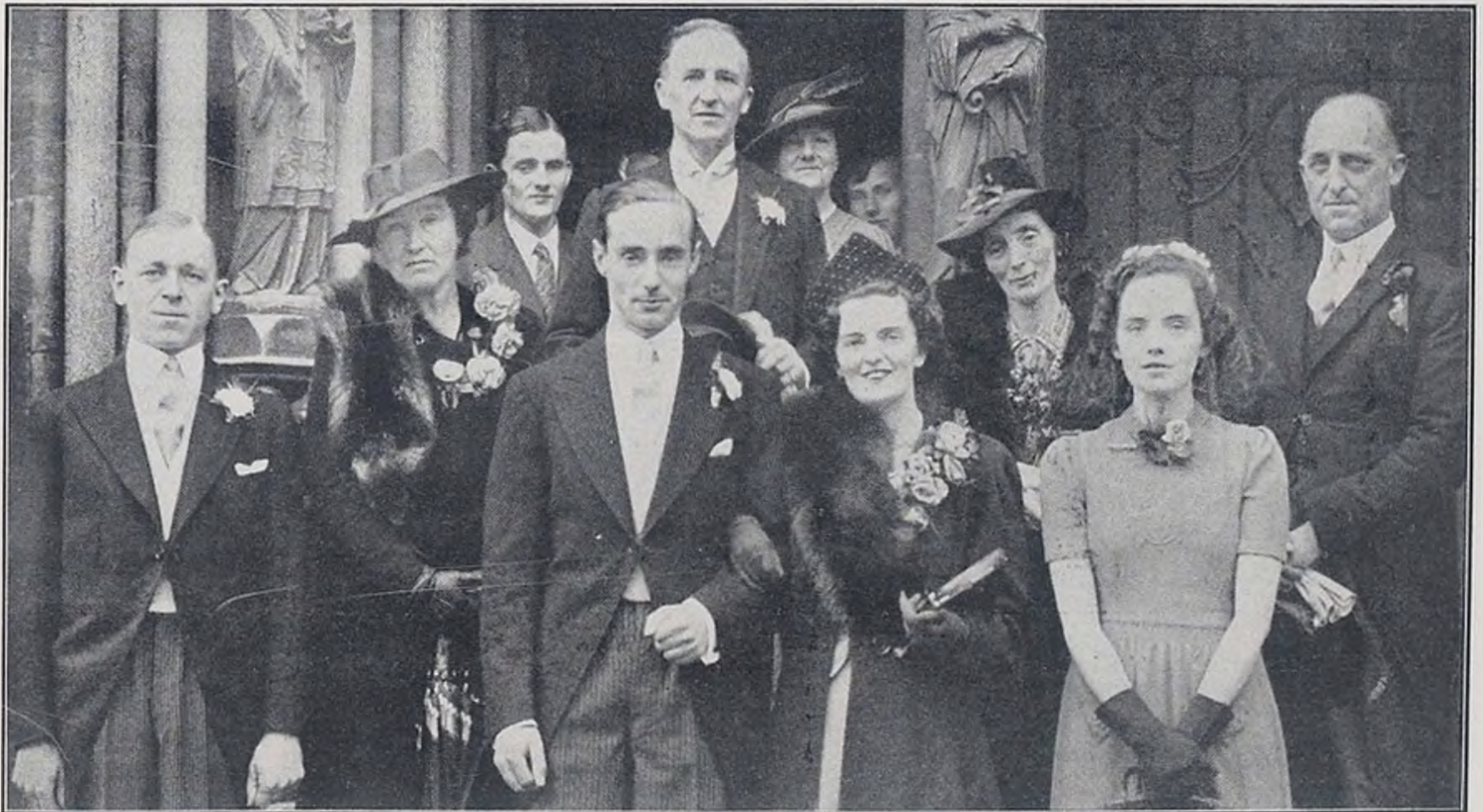

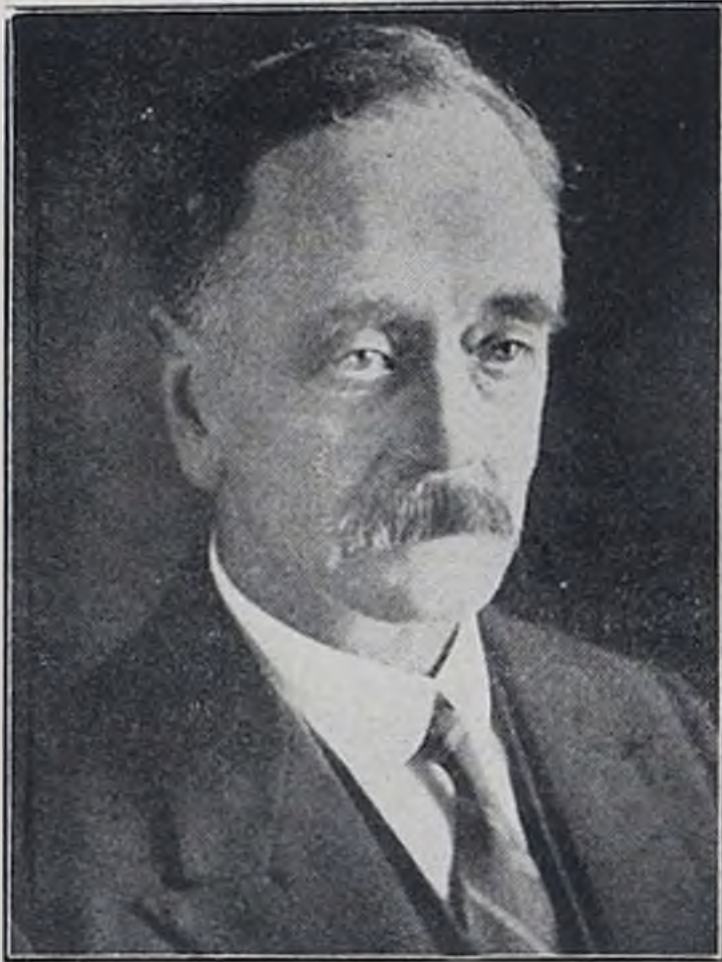

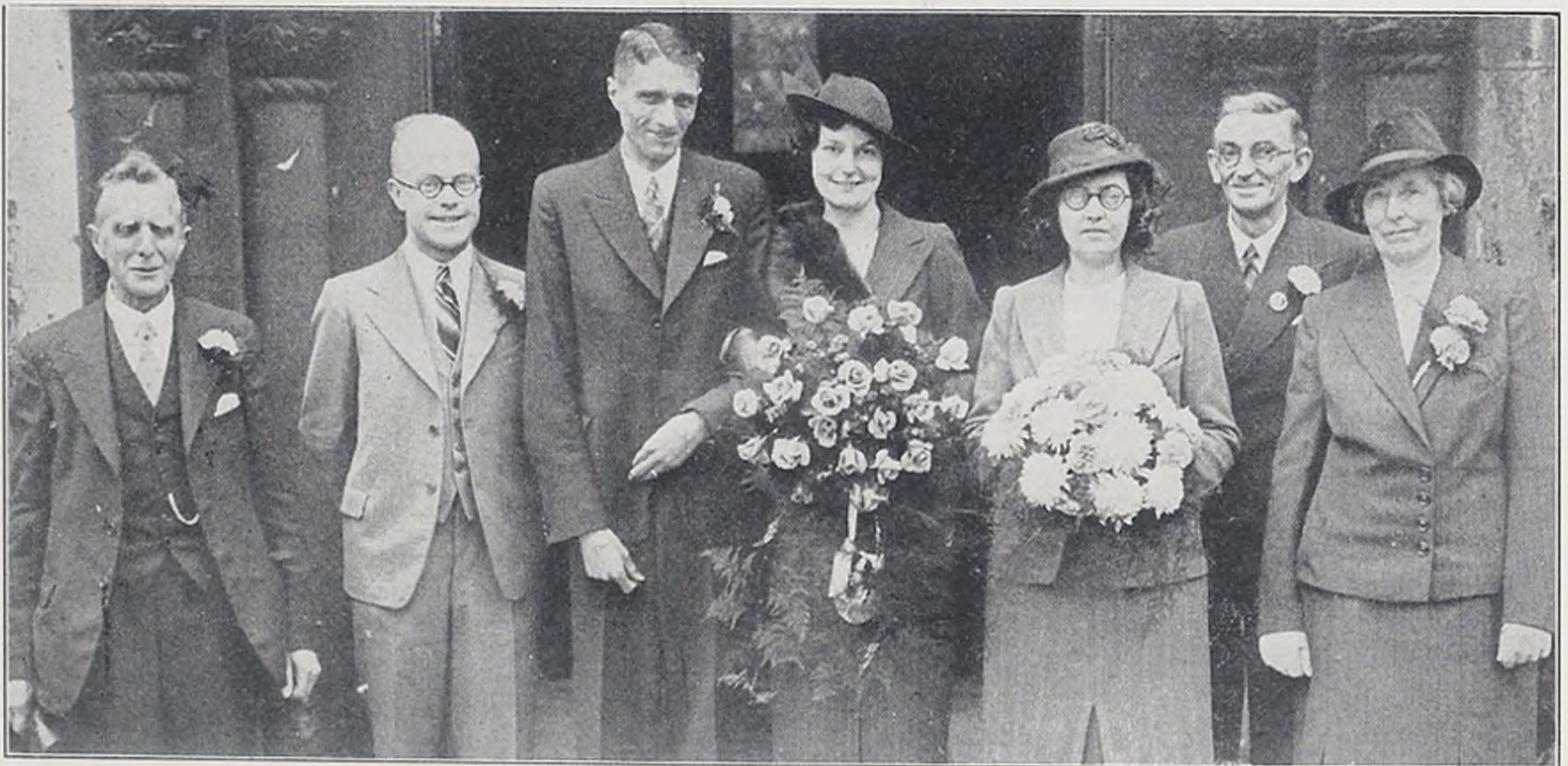

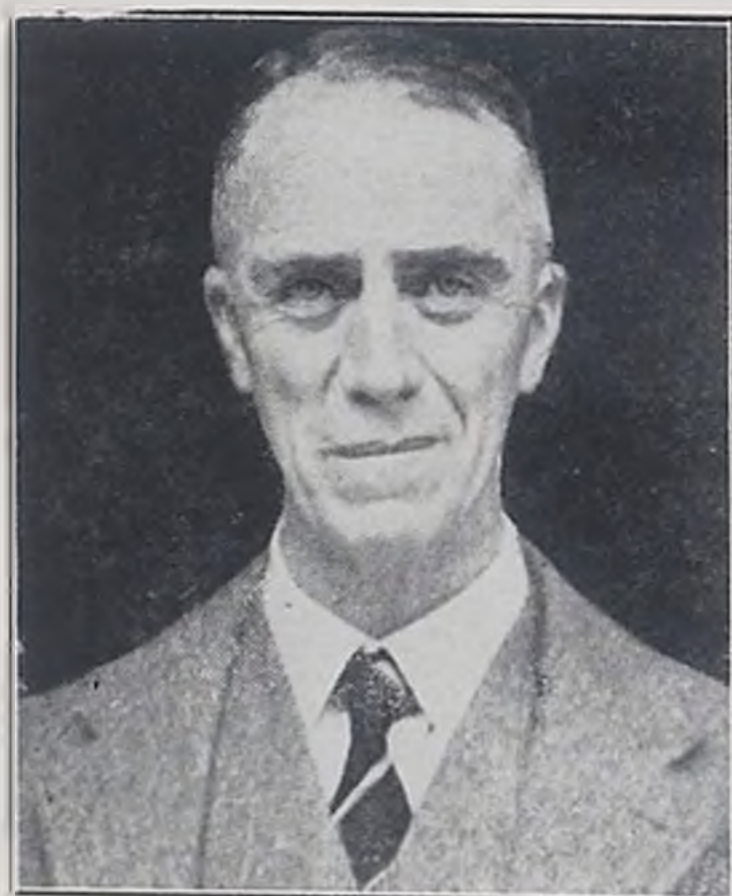
