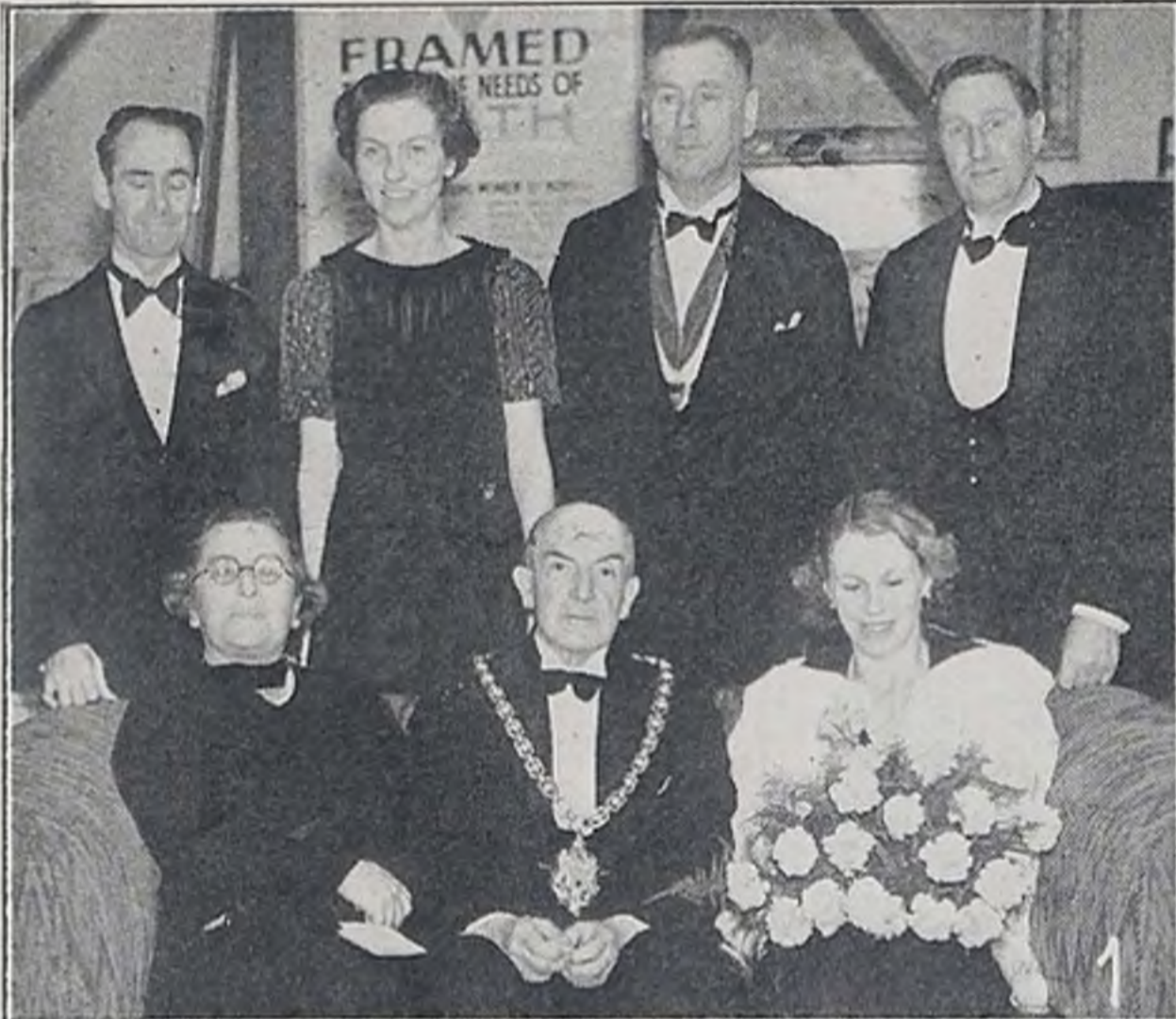

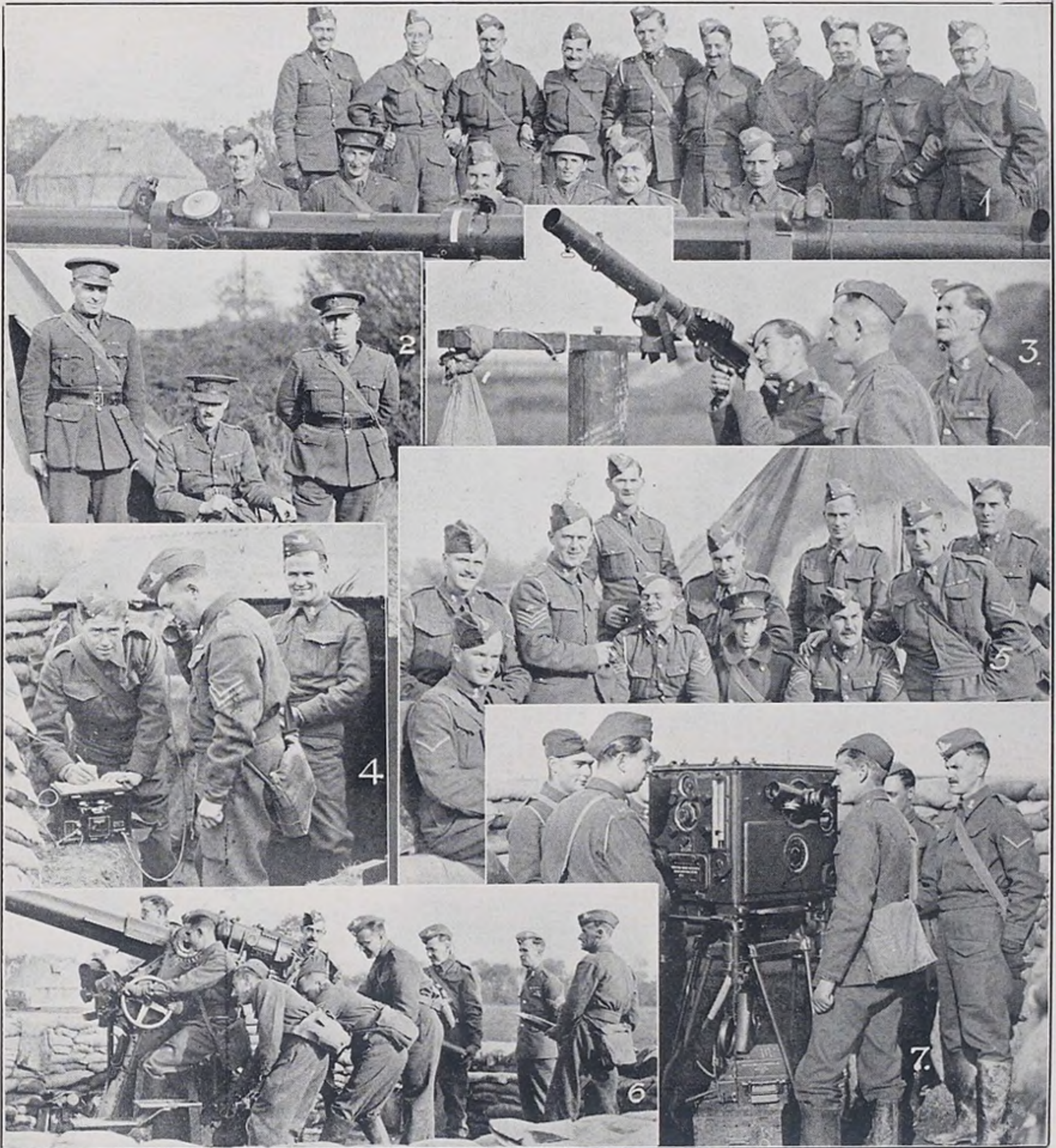

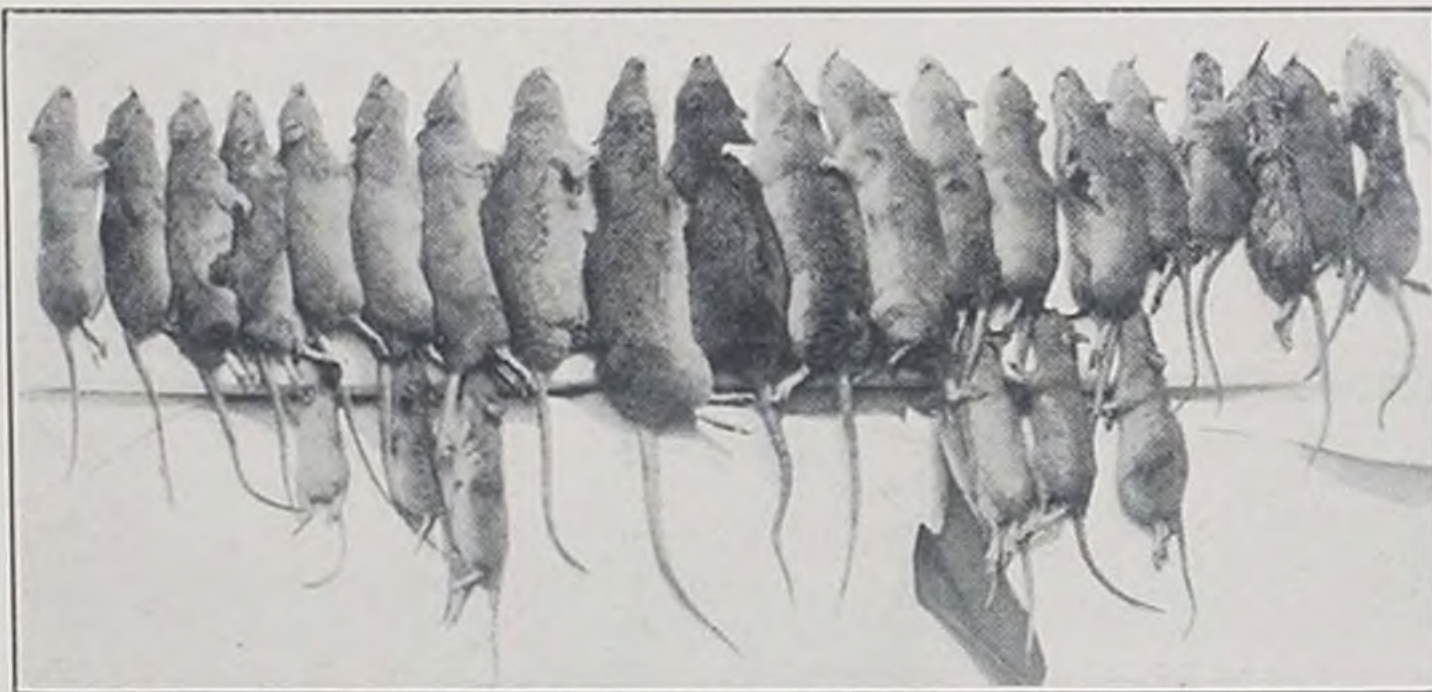
CHELTENHAM A.T.S. DETACHMENT PLAYS ITS PART

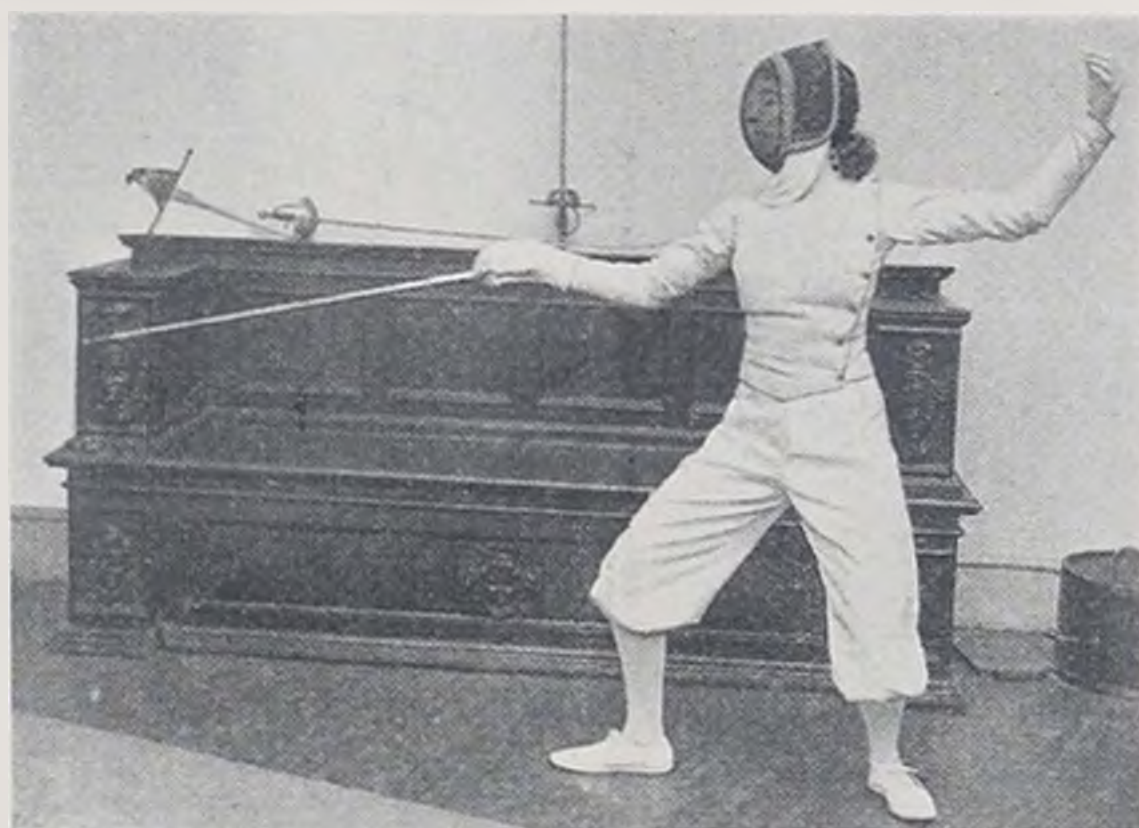

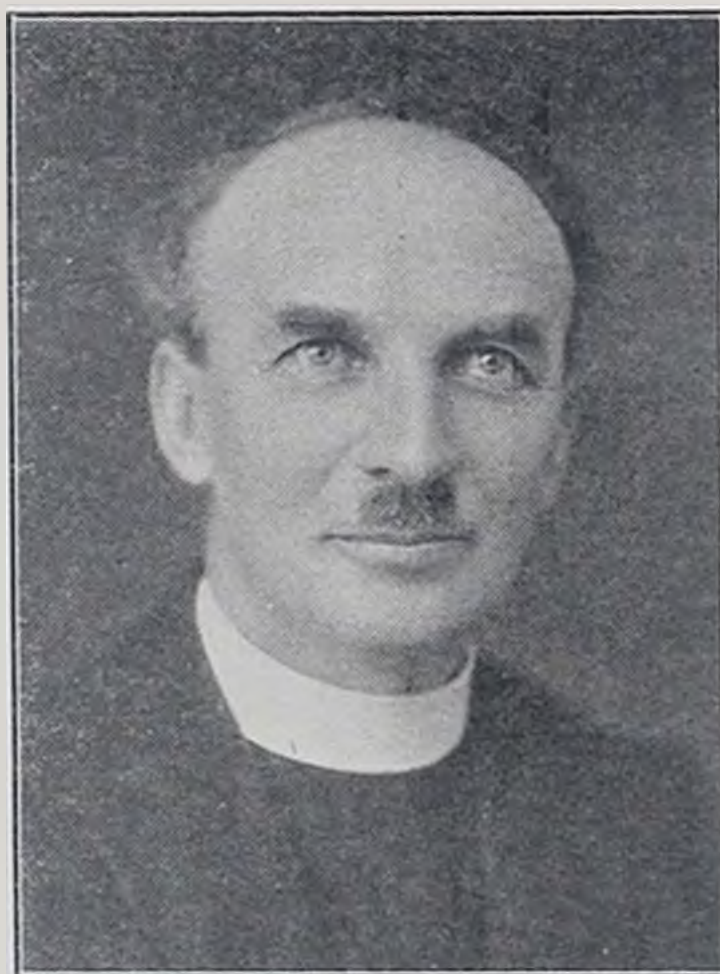

TRAINING LOCAL UNITS OF THE NEW ARMY

Our photographer paid a visit to a regimental depot "Somewhere in the West" and saw many local men cheerfully and enthusiastically undergoing training in the up-to-date arts of war. With expert instructors, Militiamen are so well trained in eight weeks that they can be drafted to the battalions for advanced training.

1. A lecture by a N.C.O. on the construction and working of the Bren gun.

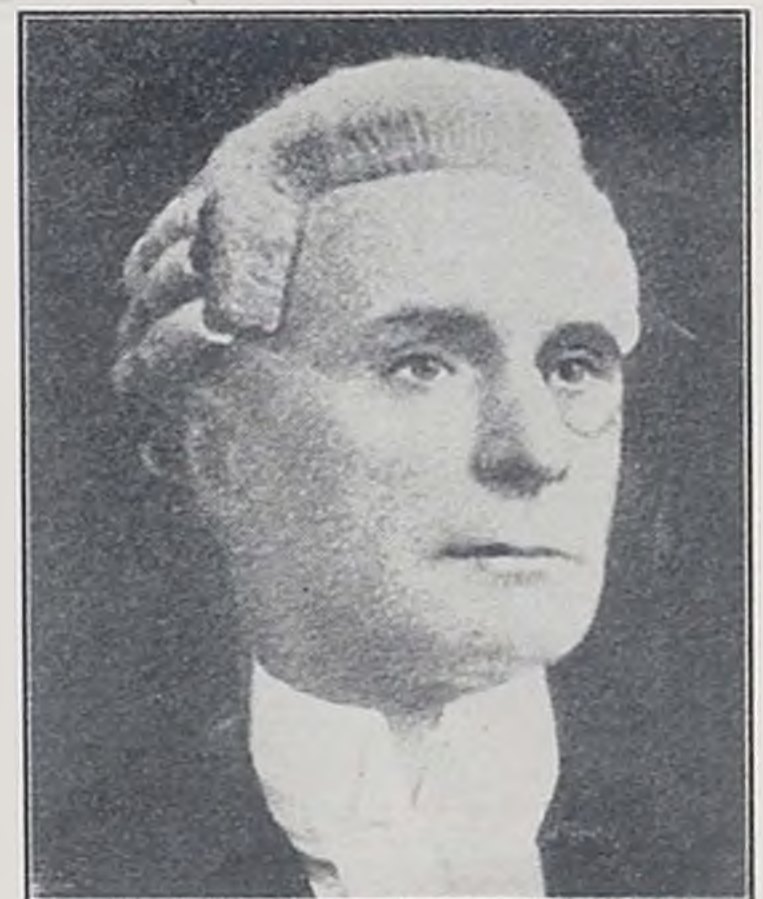
