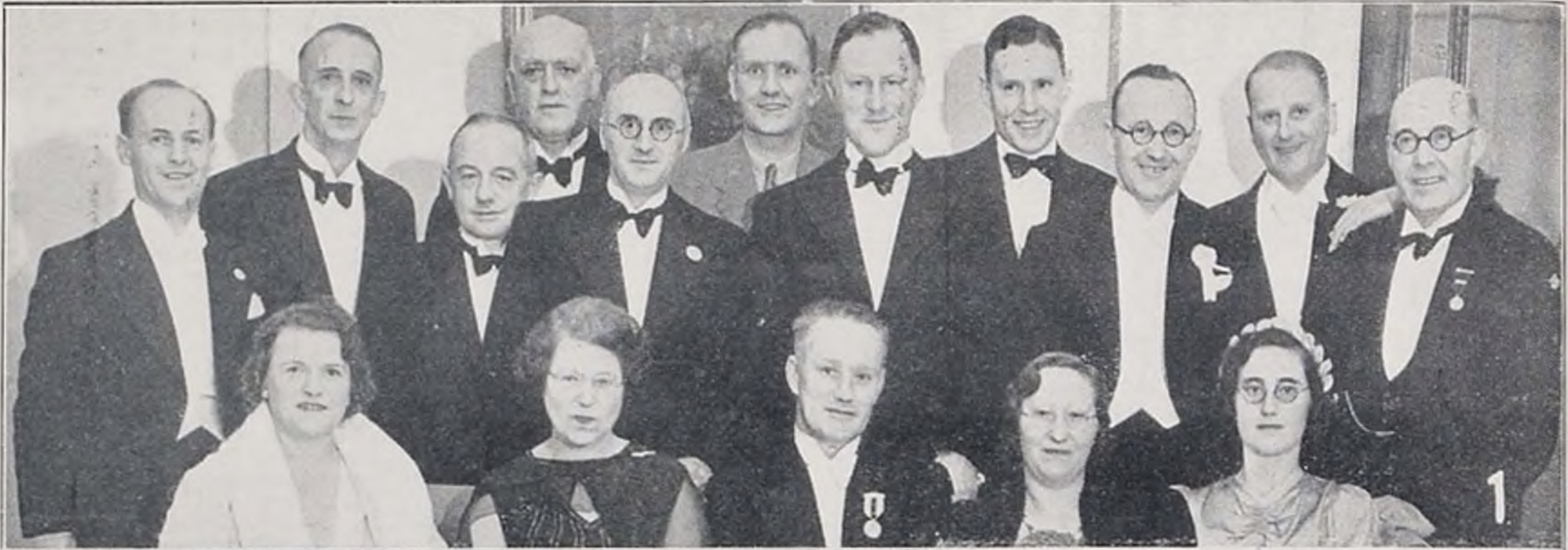

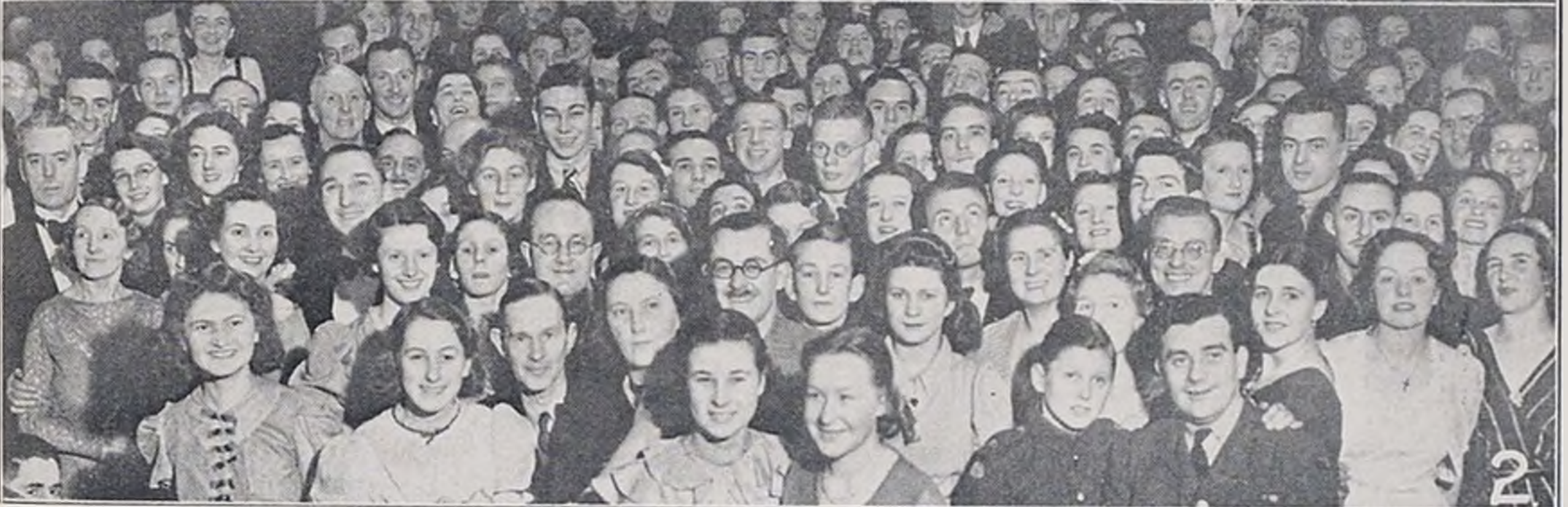

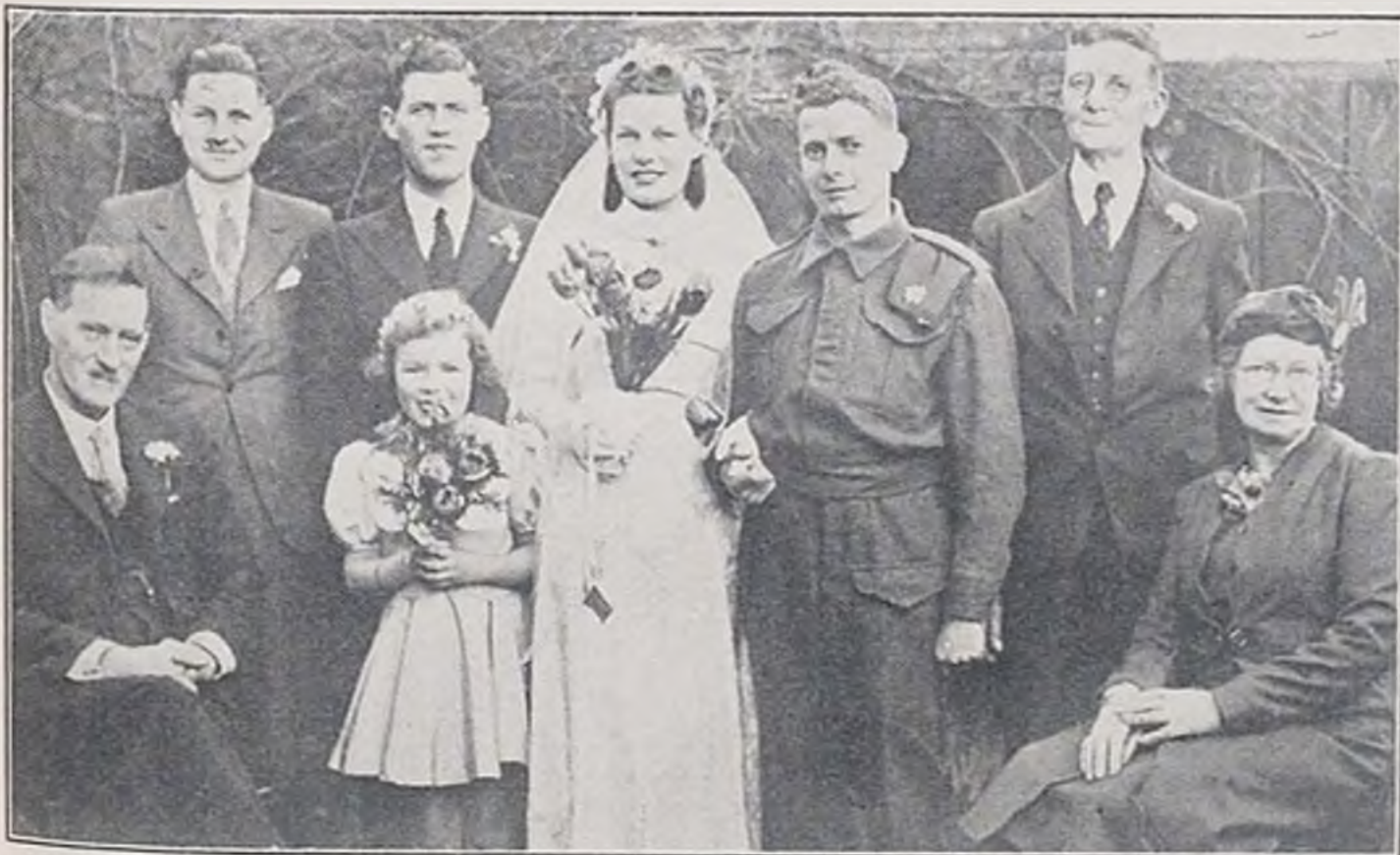

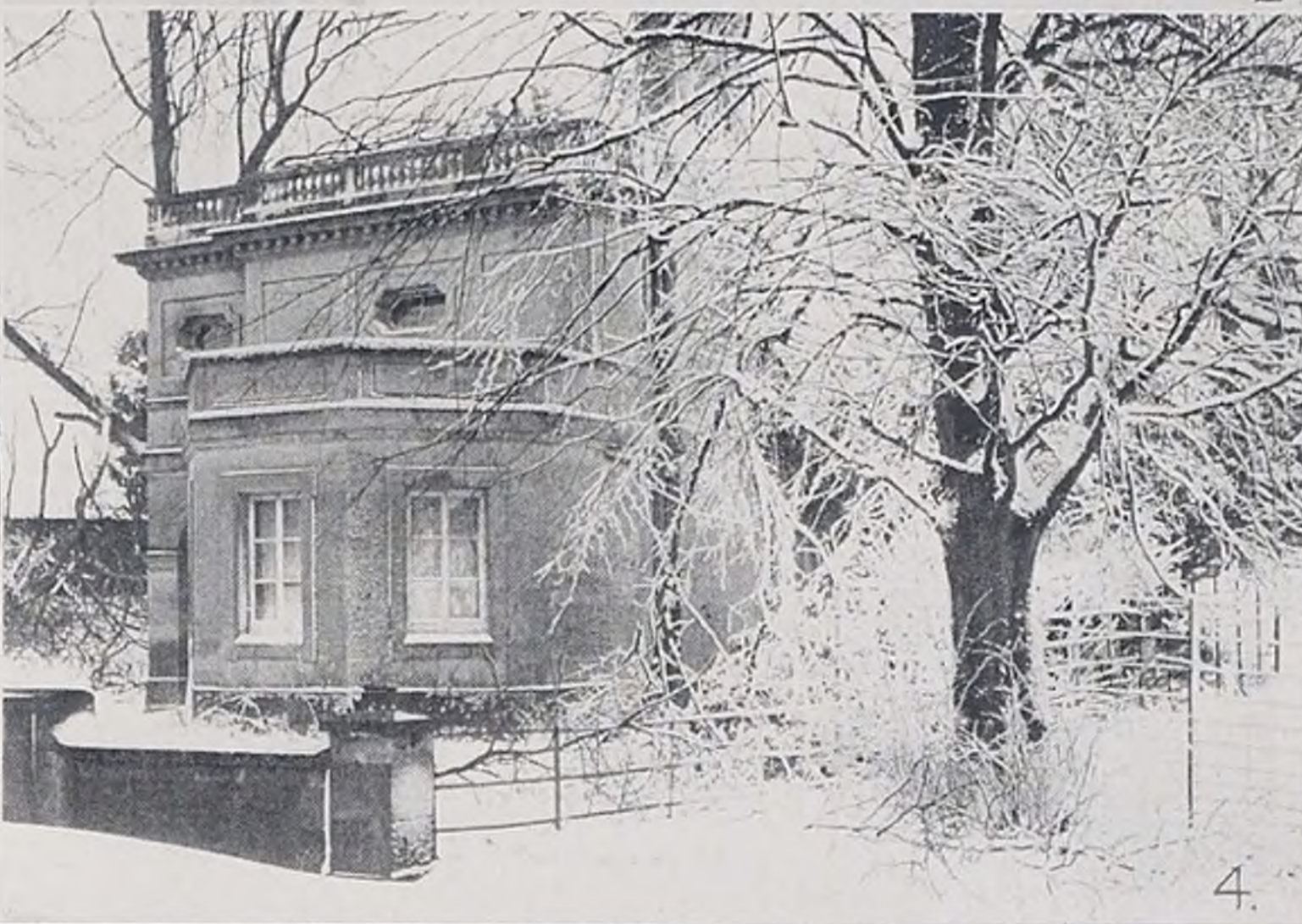

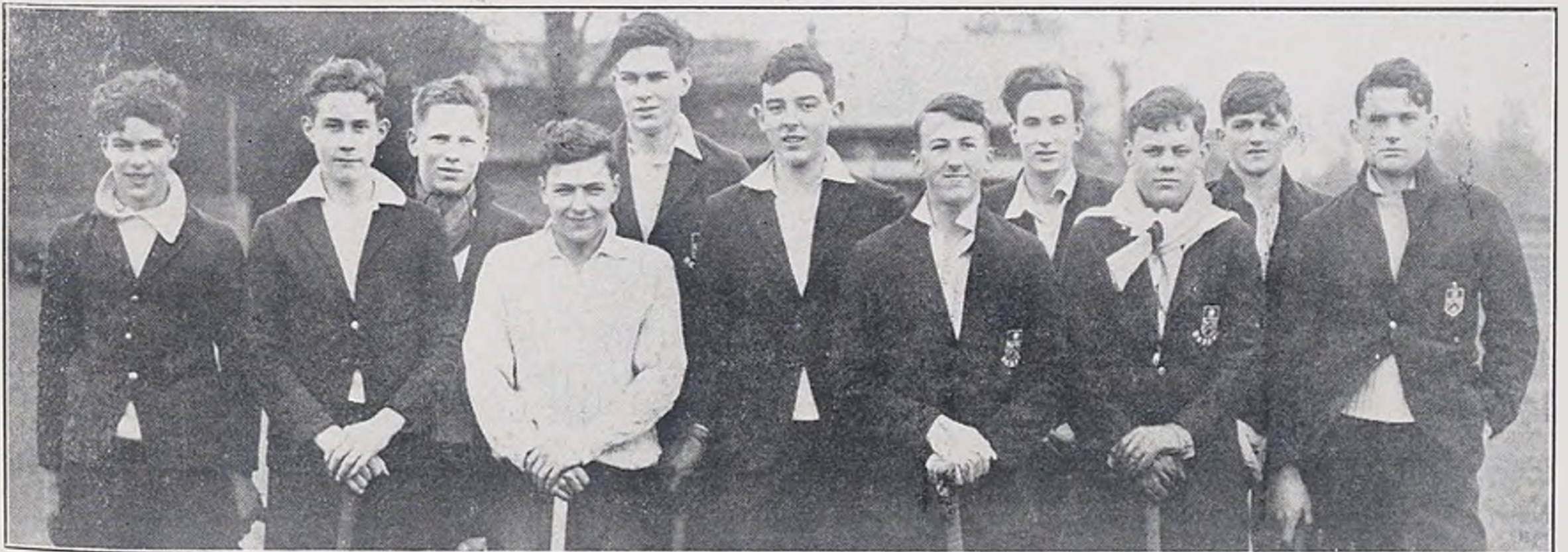

WAR WORK IN LOCAL INDUSTRIES.—No. 1: AIRCRAFT COMPONENTS

Once a country mansion, now the centre of an important war industry, Arle Court, Cheltenham, is the home of Aircraft Components, Ltd., a local firm which has a national importance on account of the ingenious and finely made components for modern aircraft chiefly landing gear. The house is used as offices, but great workshops and a big drawing-office stand in the grounds and hundreds of men are employed. Aircraft Components is making a splendid contribution to the national war effort. Our photographs help to show what this contribution involves.

THE RECENT FLOODS IN GLOUCESTERSHIRE

The worst floods for 16 years occurred in Tewkesbury early in February, and in Northleach the main road through the town was impassable for some days. The Northleach photographs were taken on February 5 and the Tewkesbury ones on February 9. They have just been released for publication

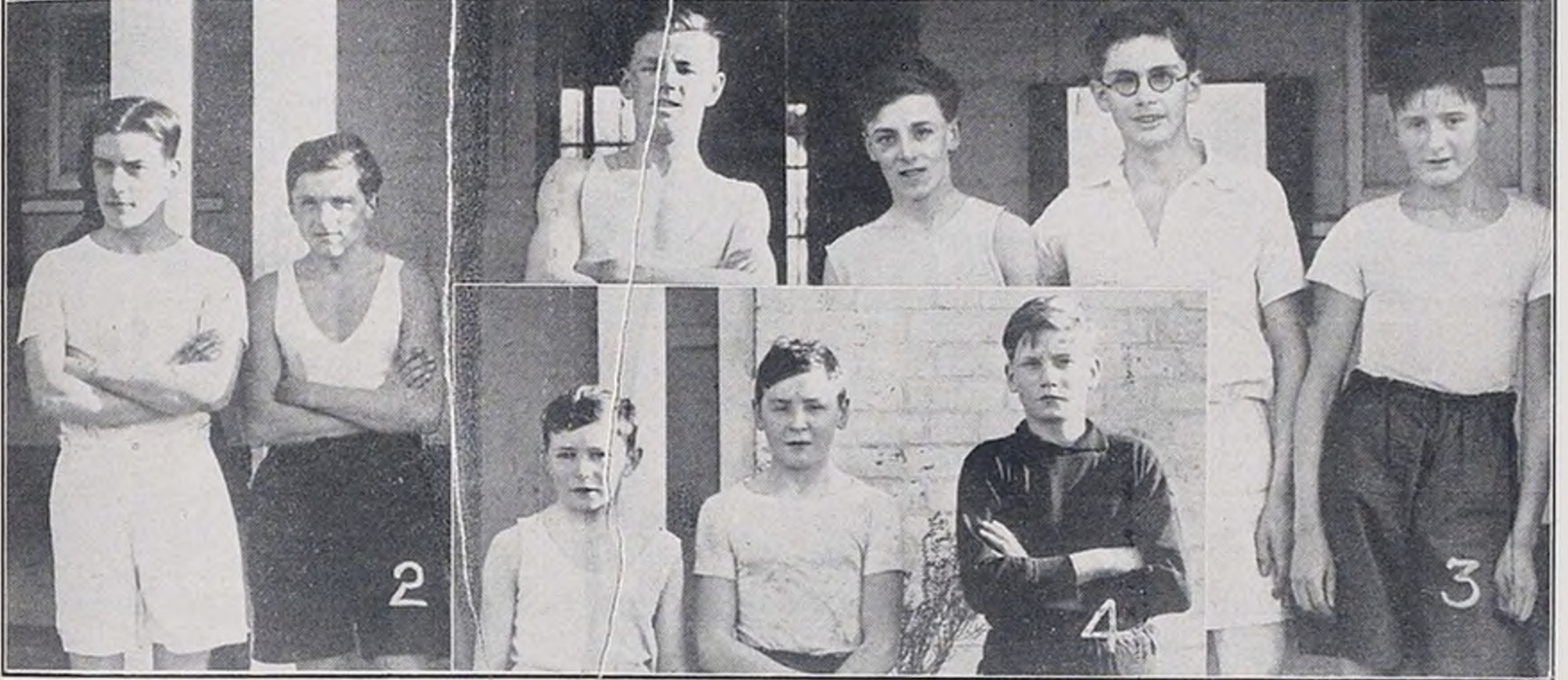

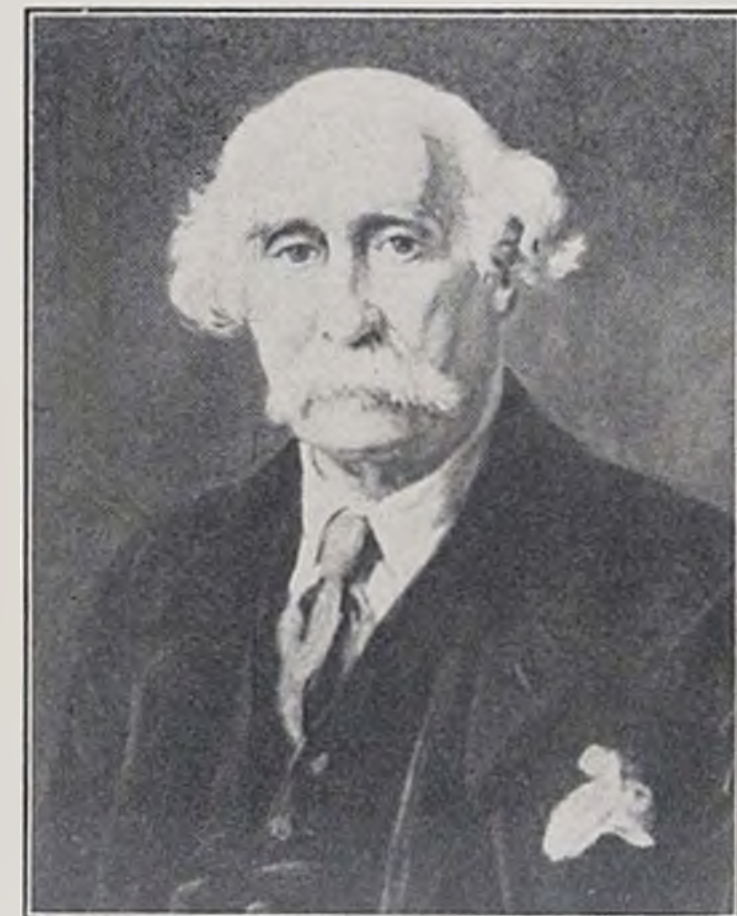

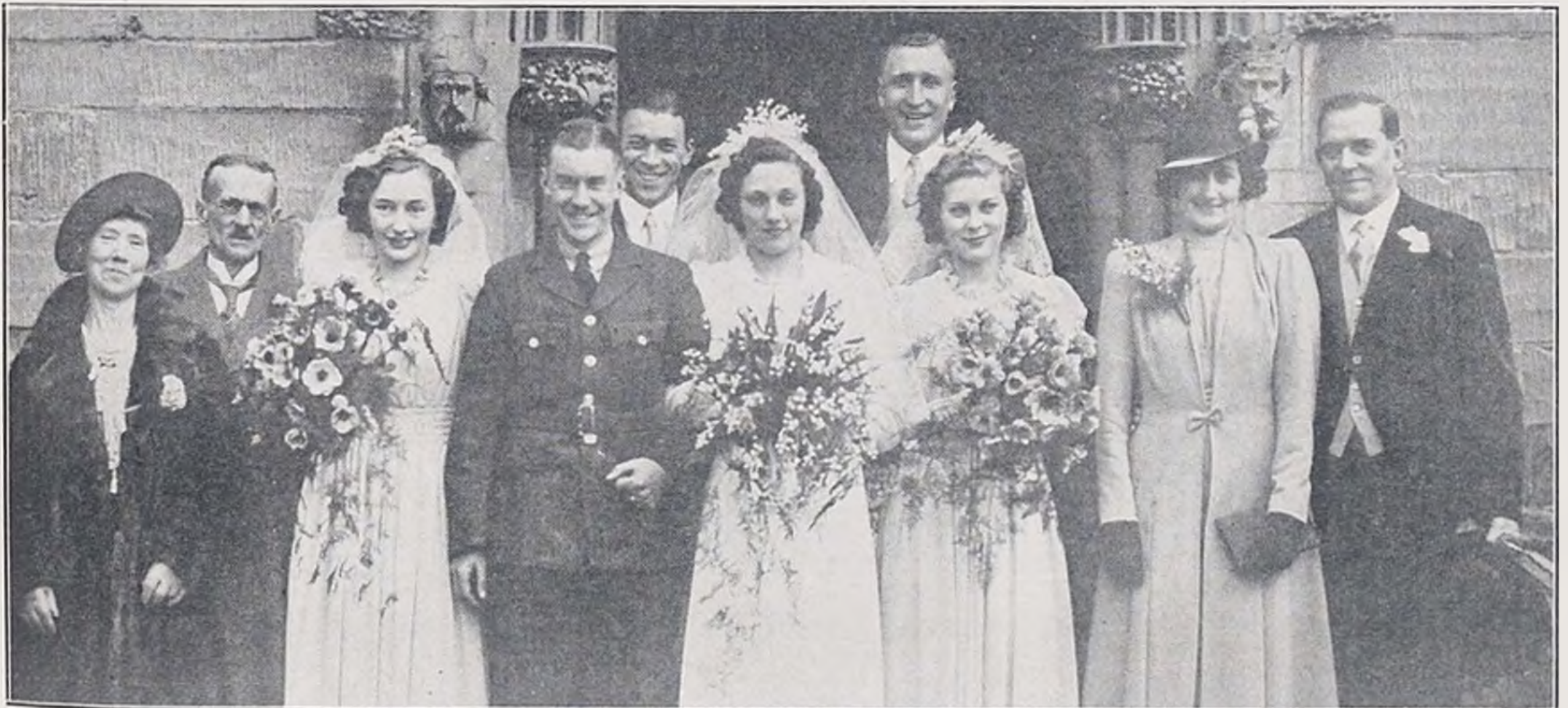

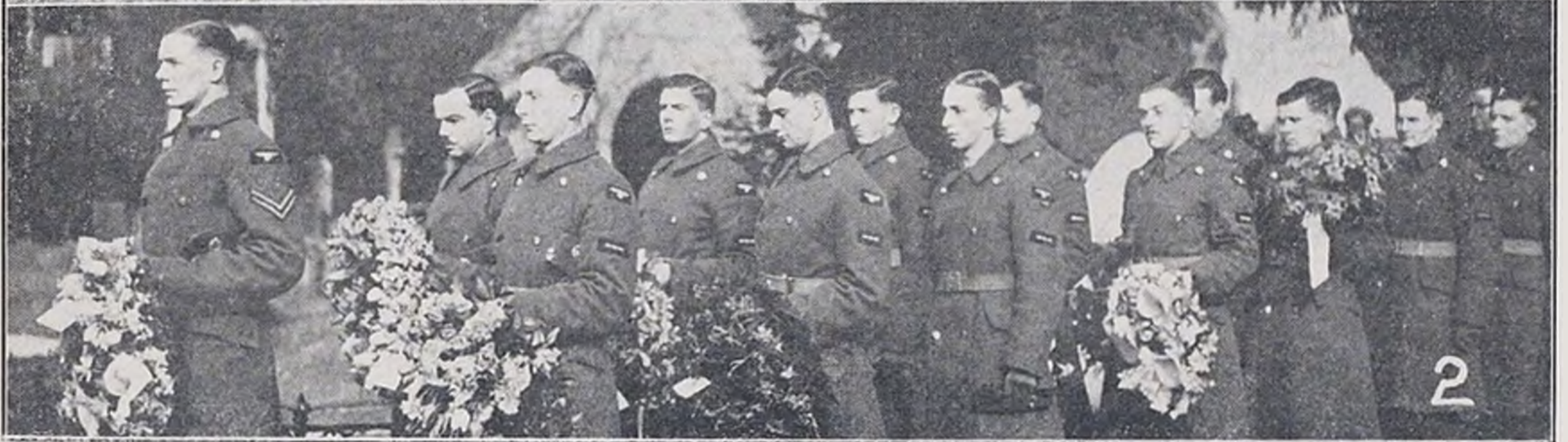
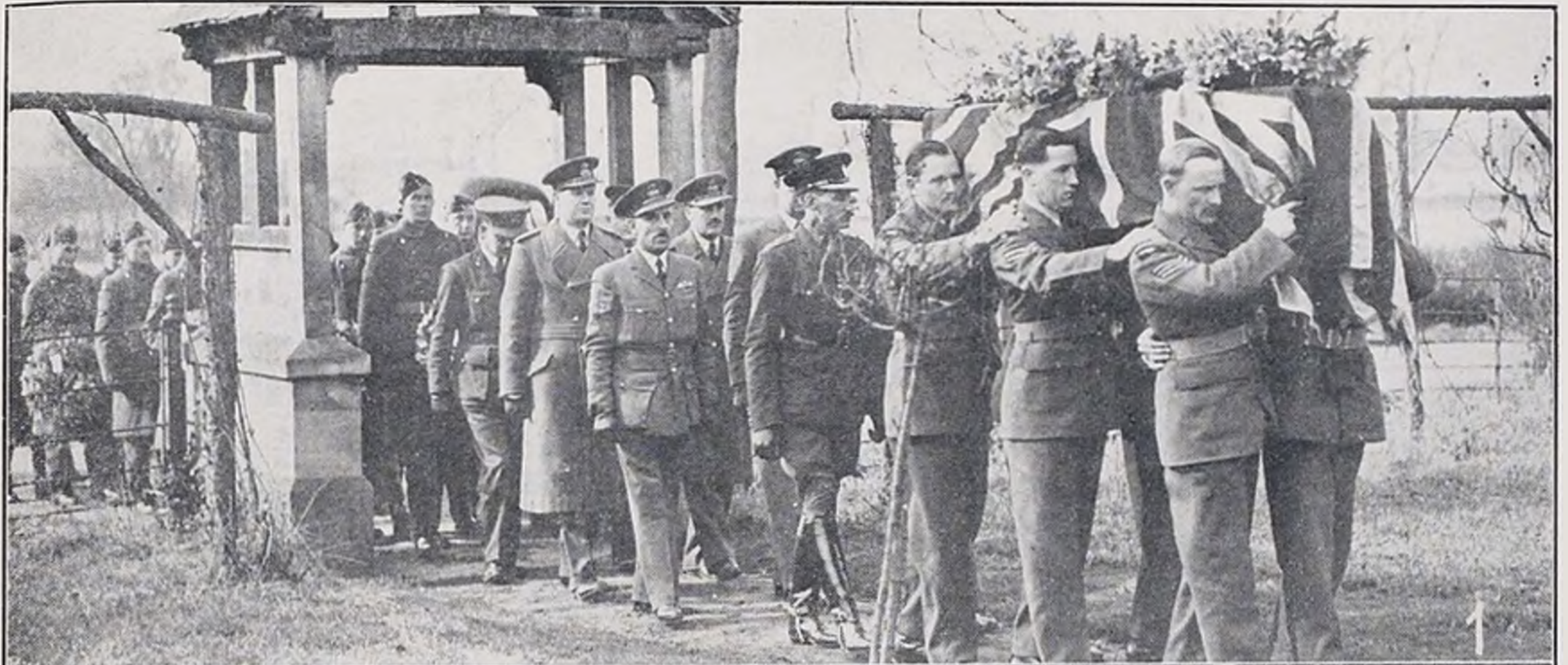

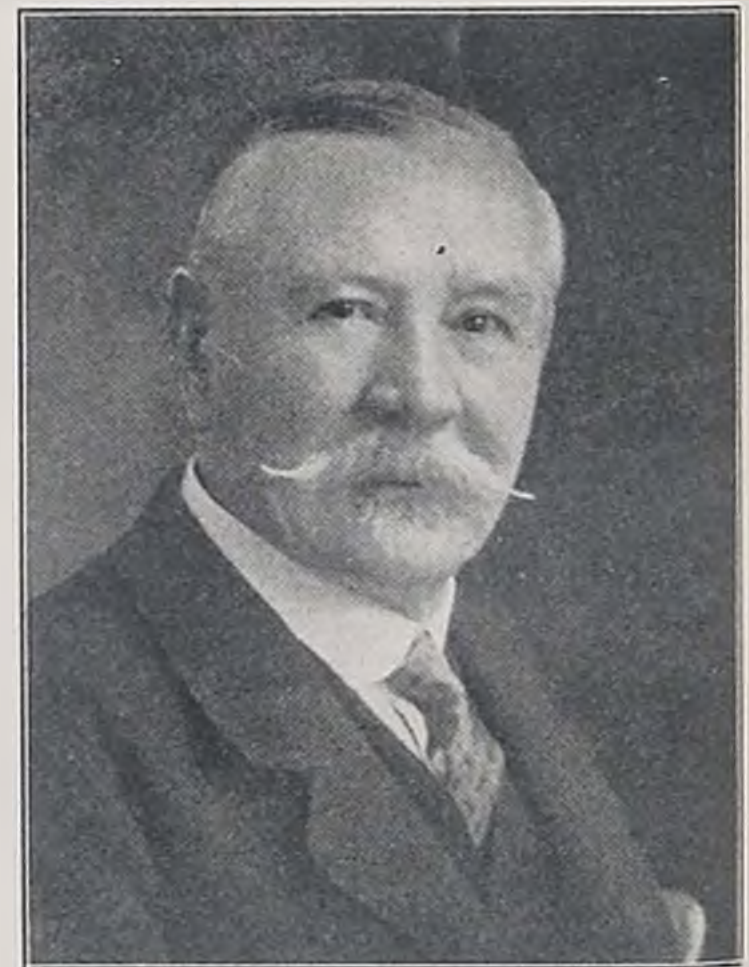

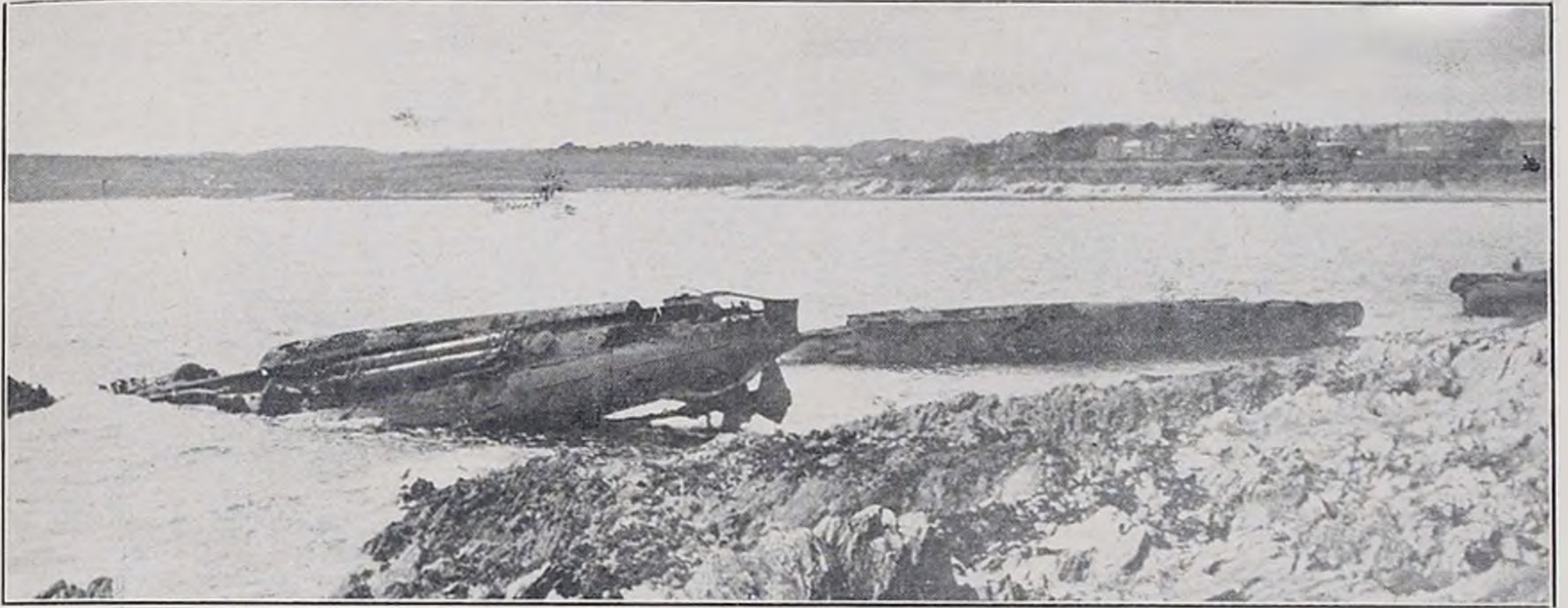

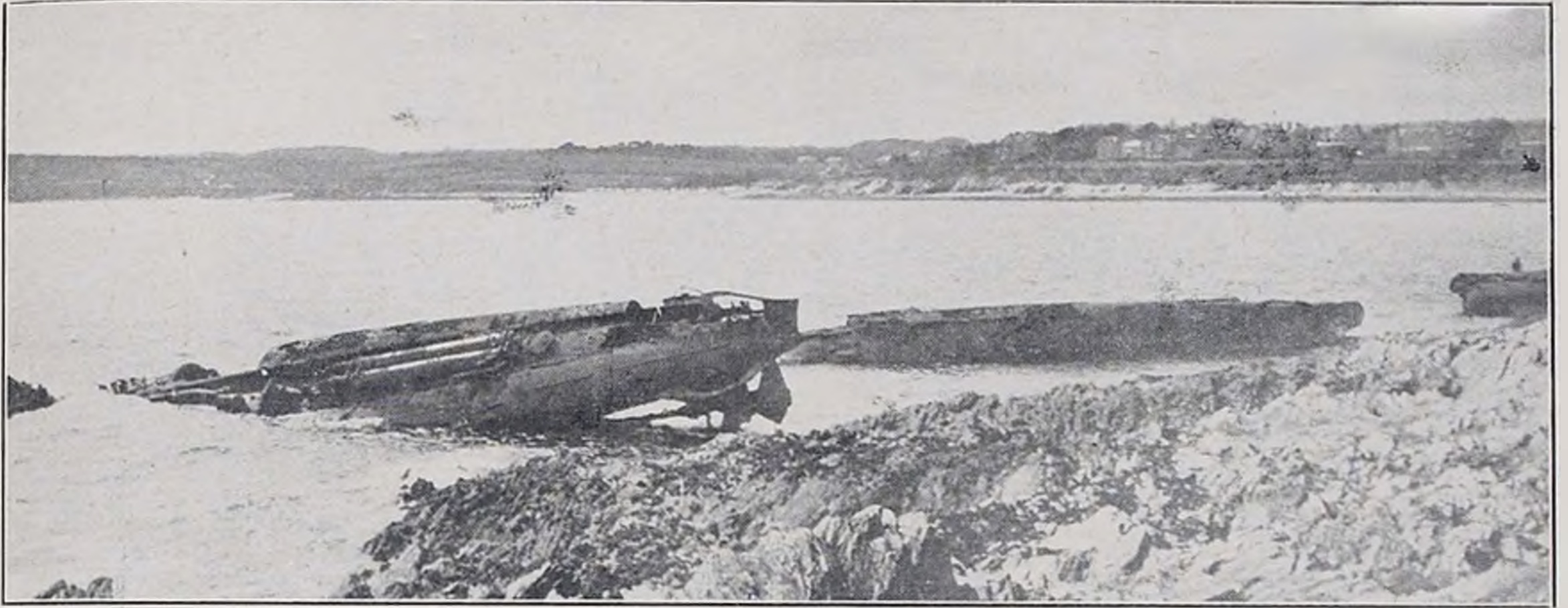

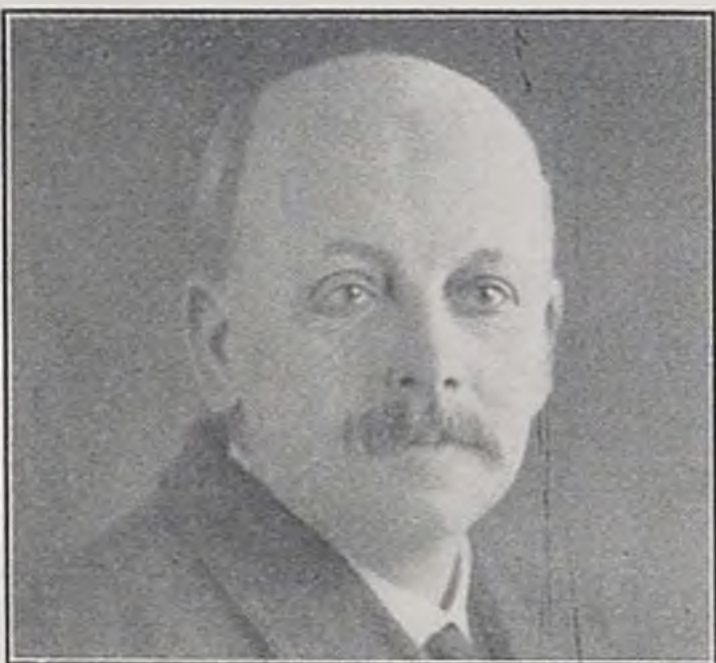

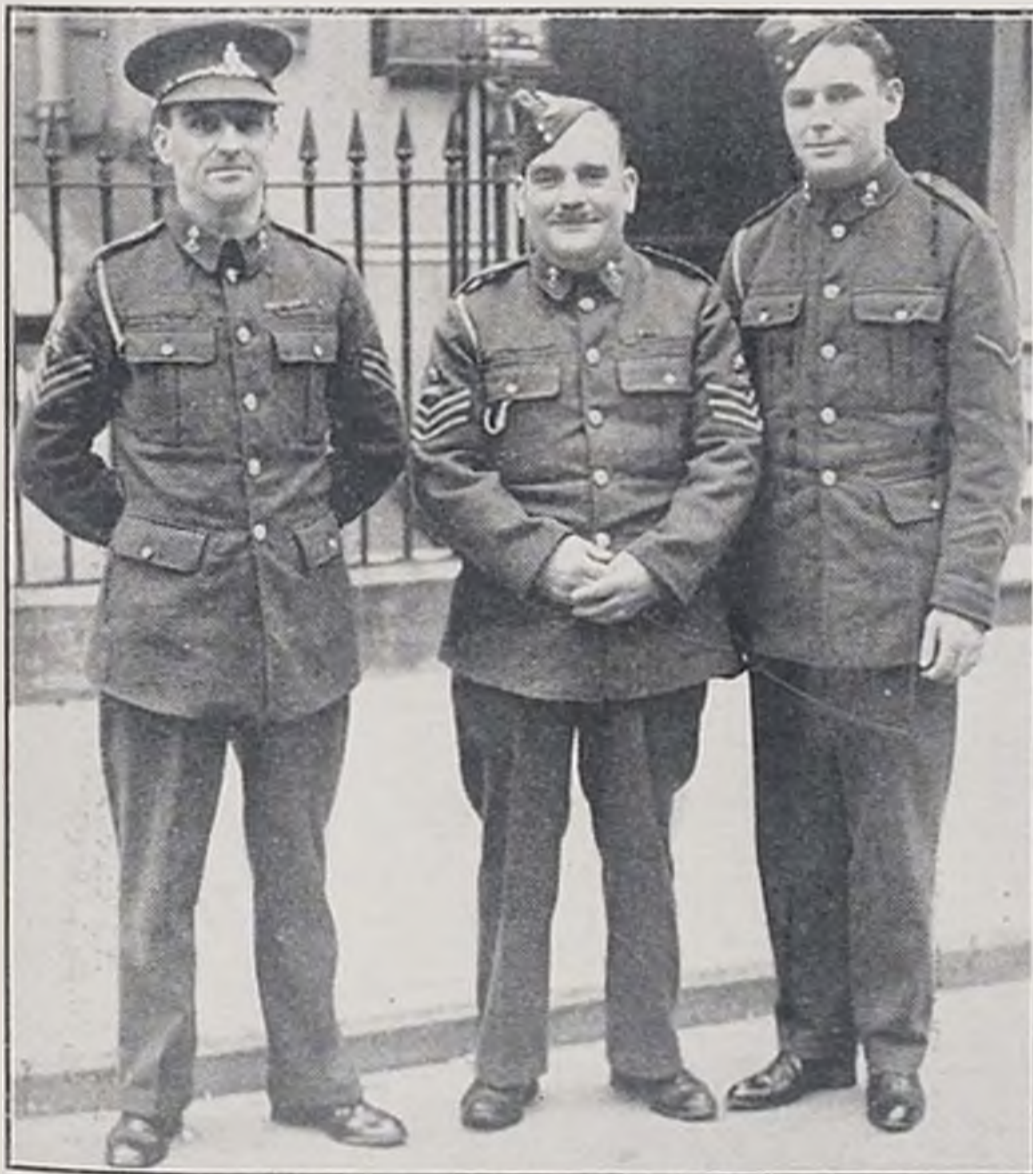

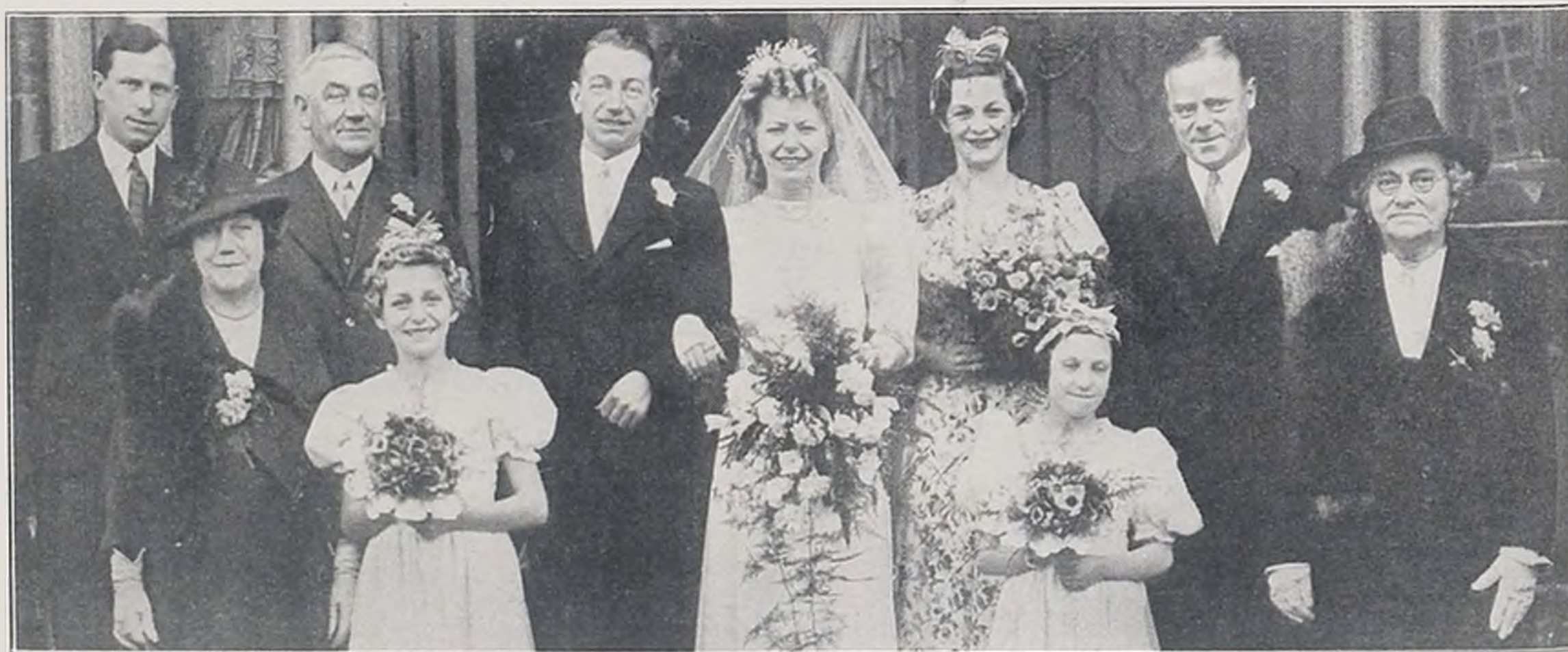
