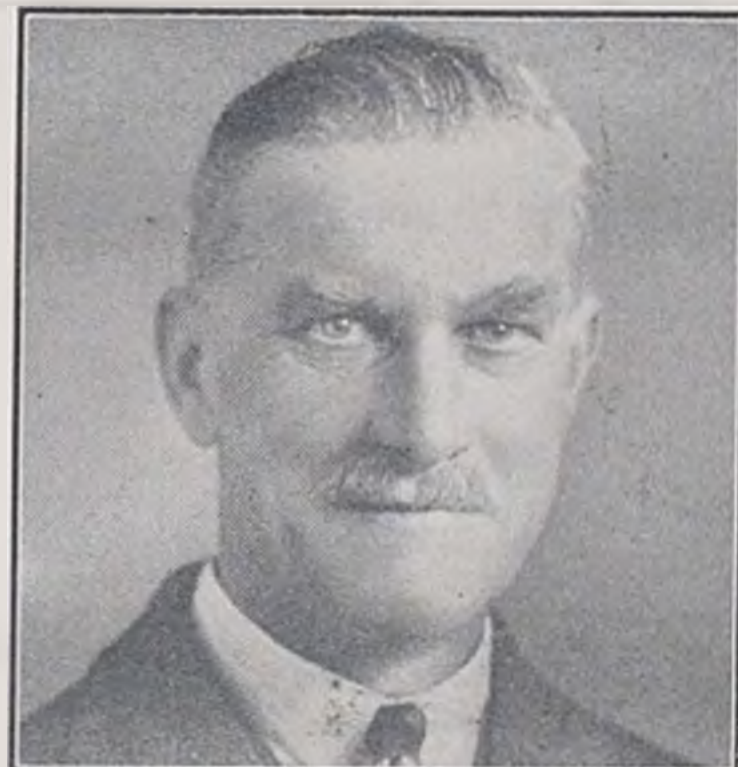

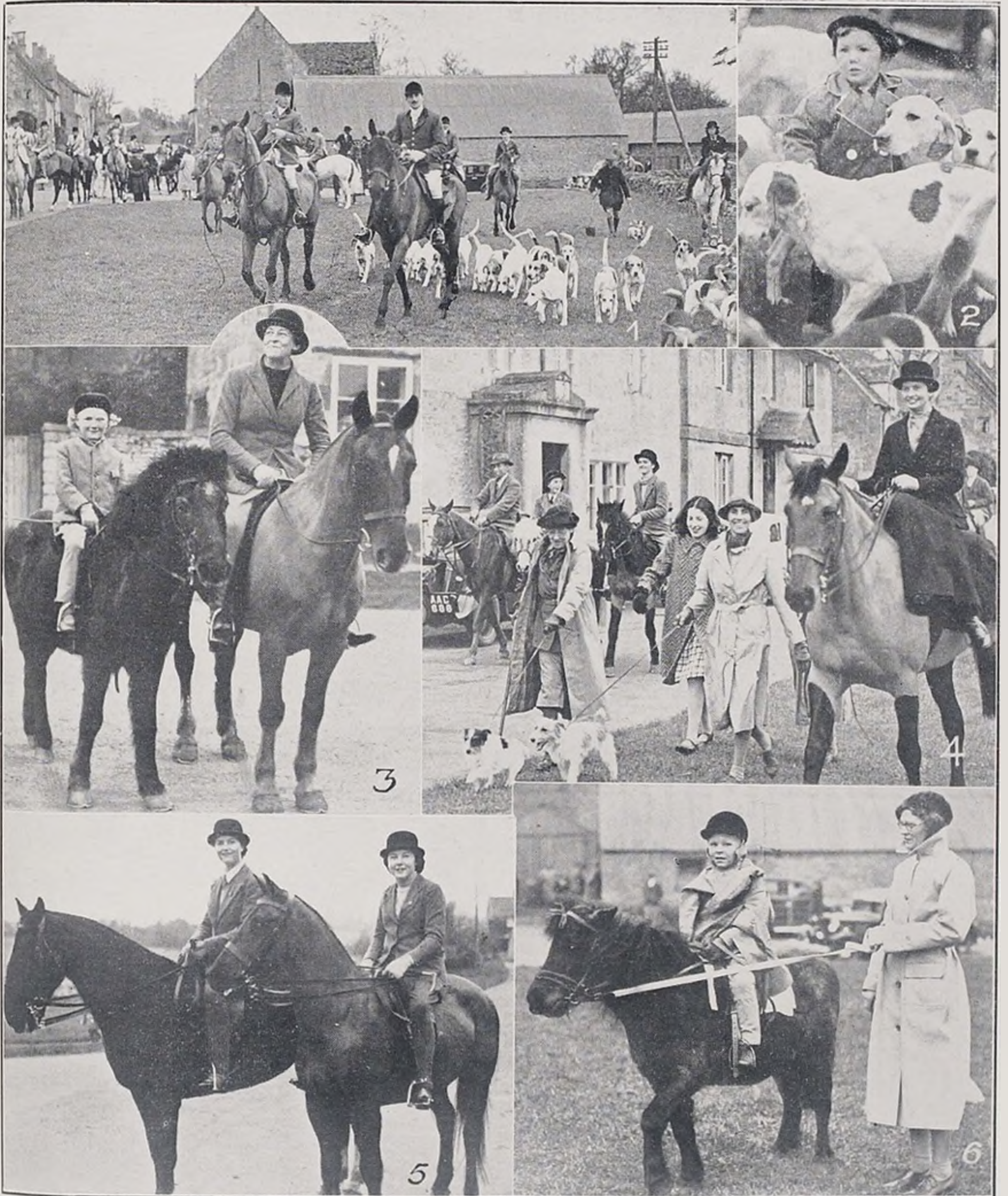

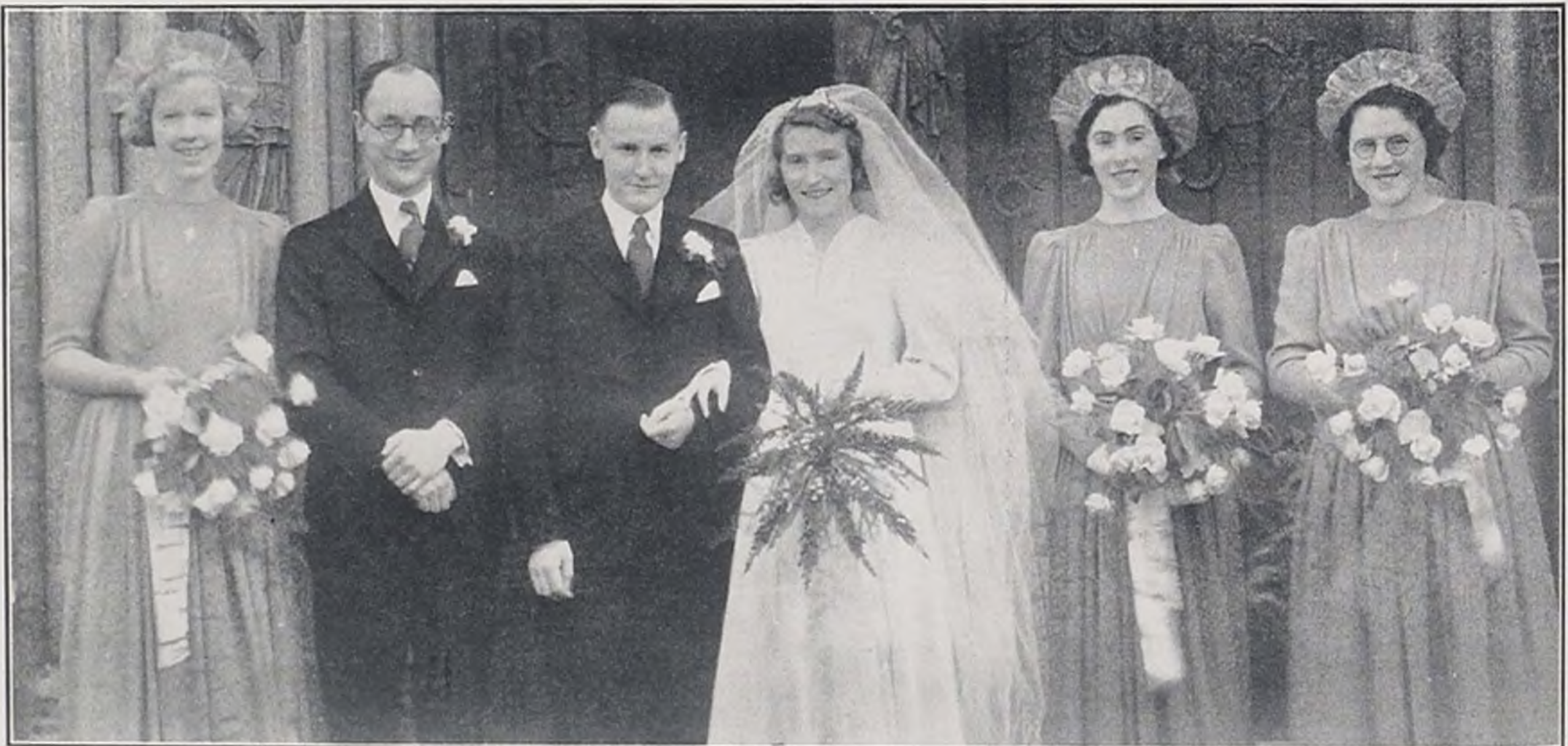

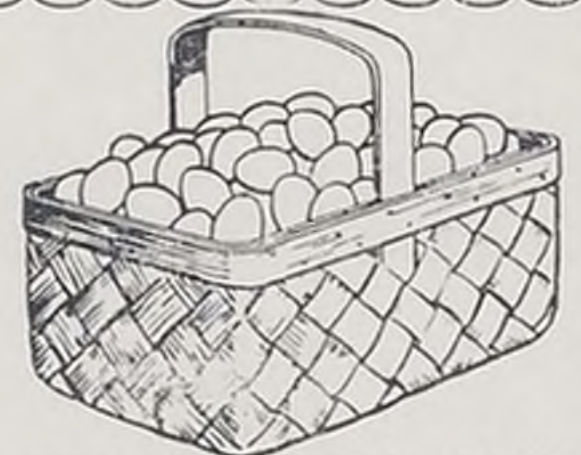

BREDON HILL PHOTOGRAPHED FROM CHELTENHAM

This notable example of high-power tele-photography is the work of Dr. W. H. Steavenson, the astronomer. It was taken from a house in the Christ Church district of Cheltenham, and shows the tower on Bredon Hill 11½ miles away, and the farm below it nearly 11 miles. A sprinkling of snow can be seen on the upper slopes. The scale of the photograph is equivalent to that given by a camera 41 feet long.

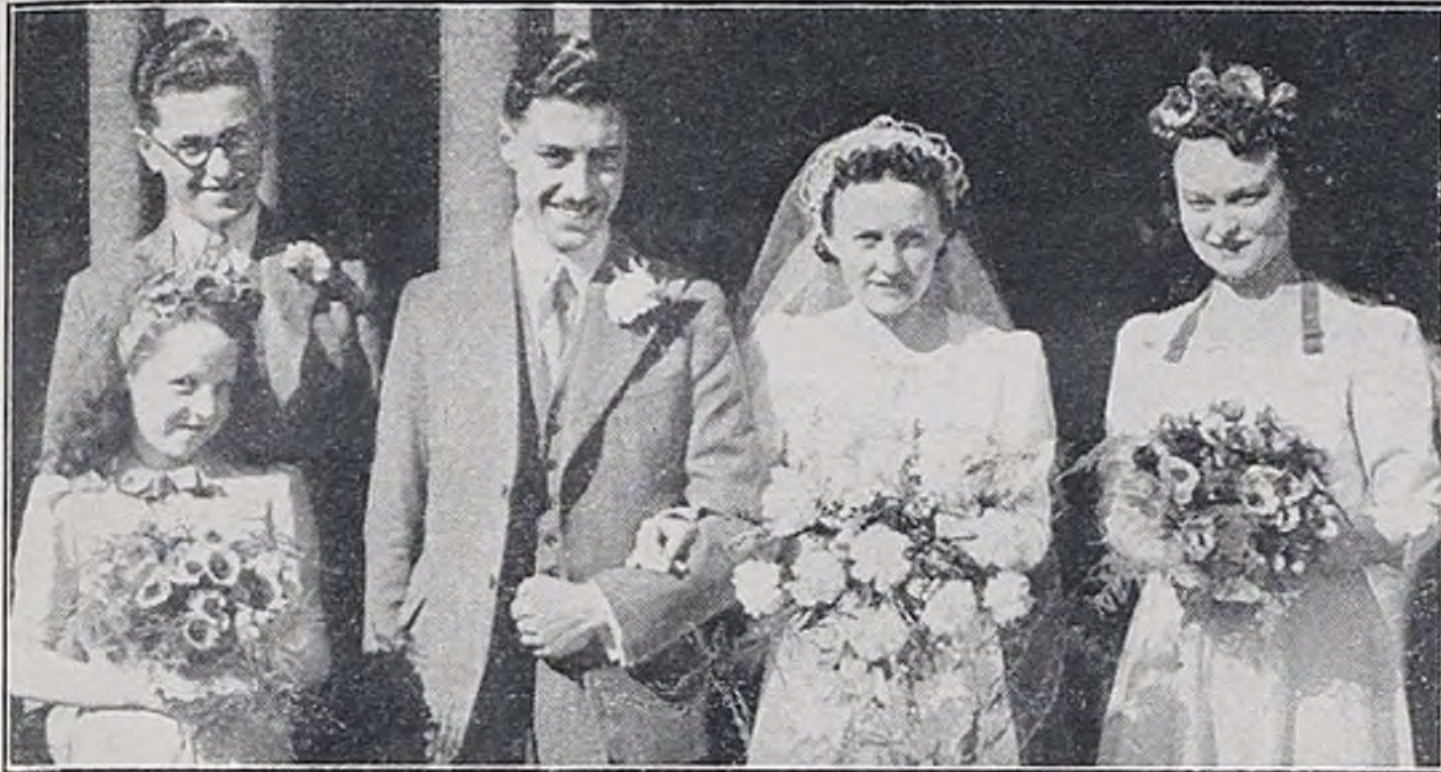

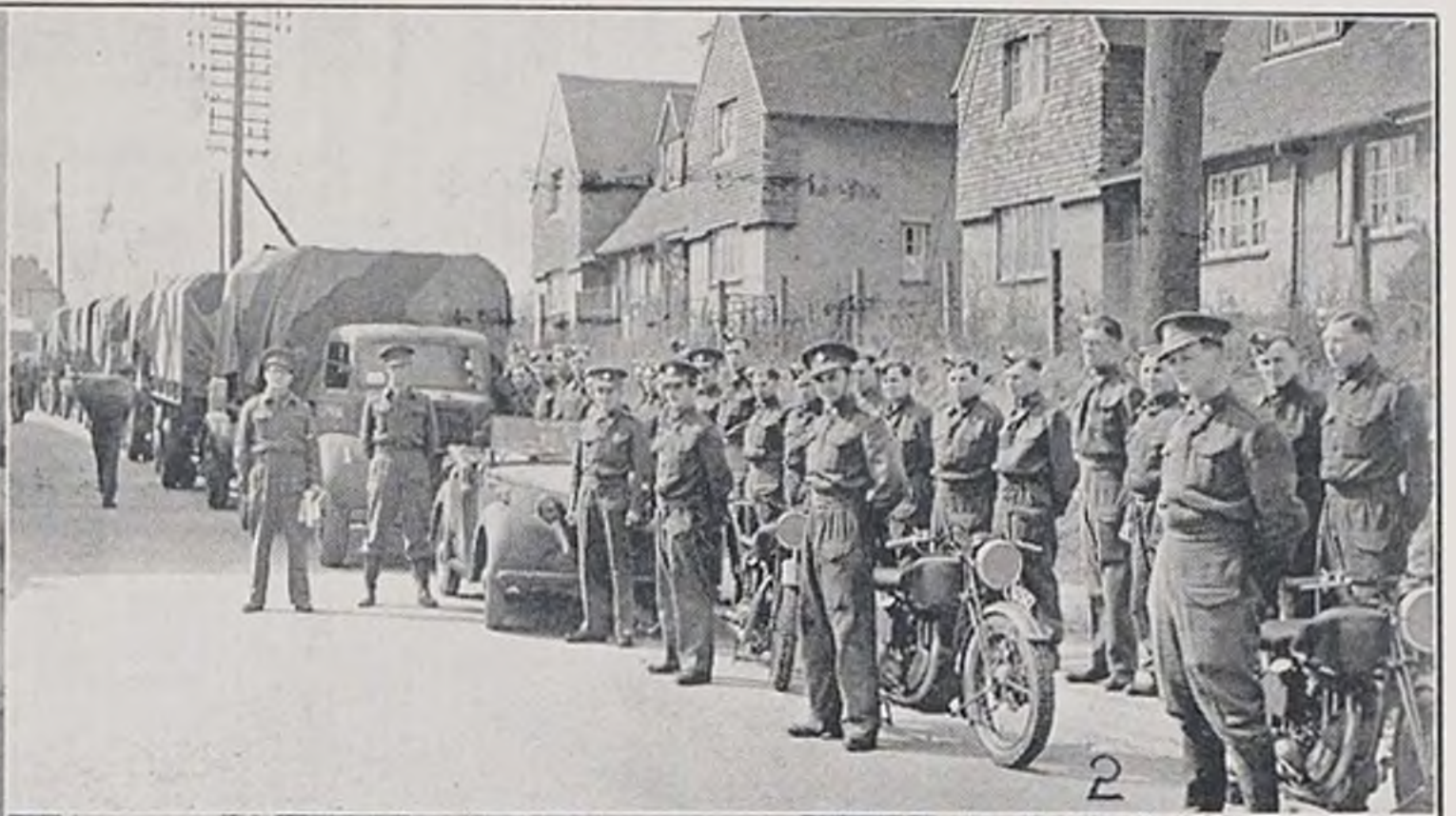

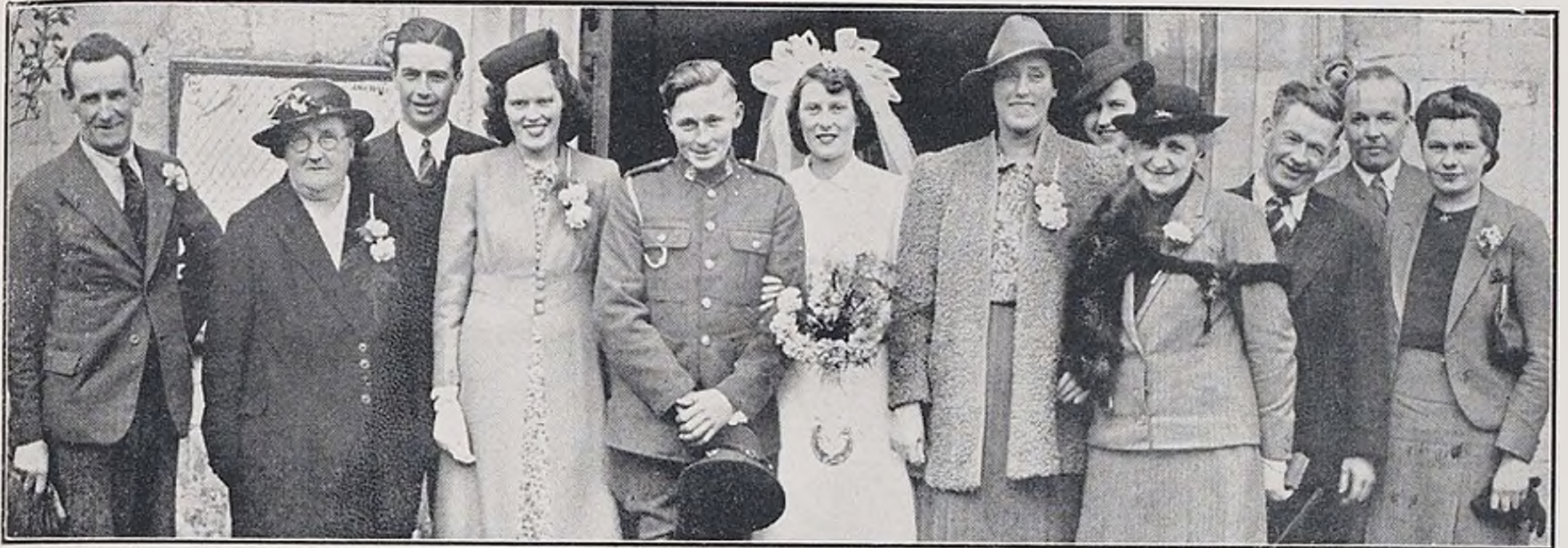

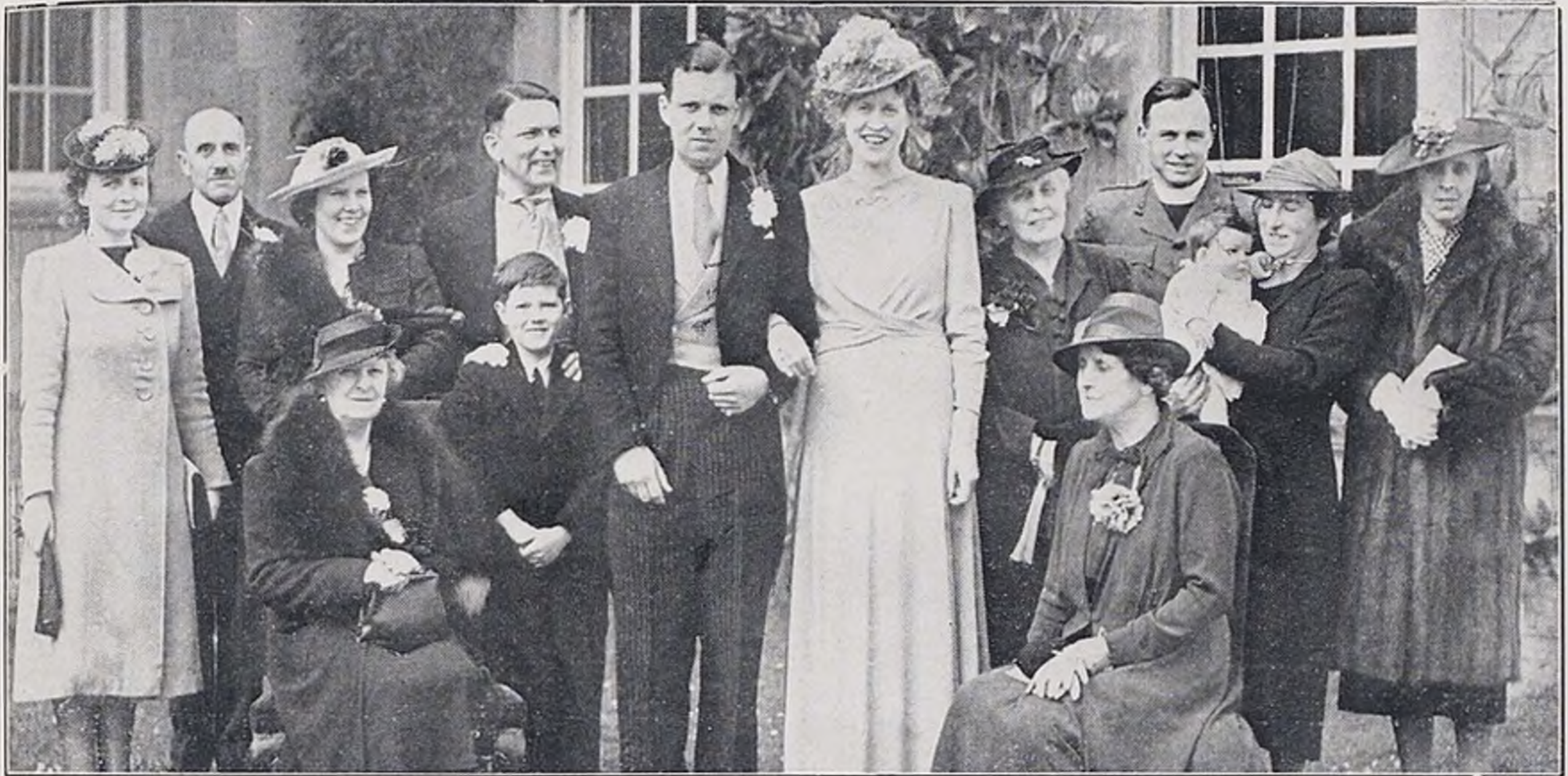

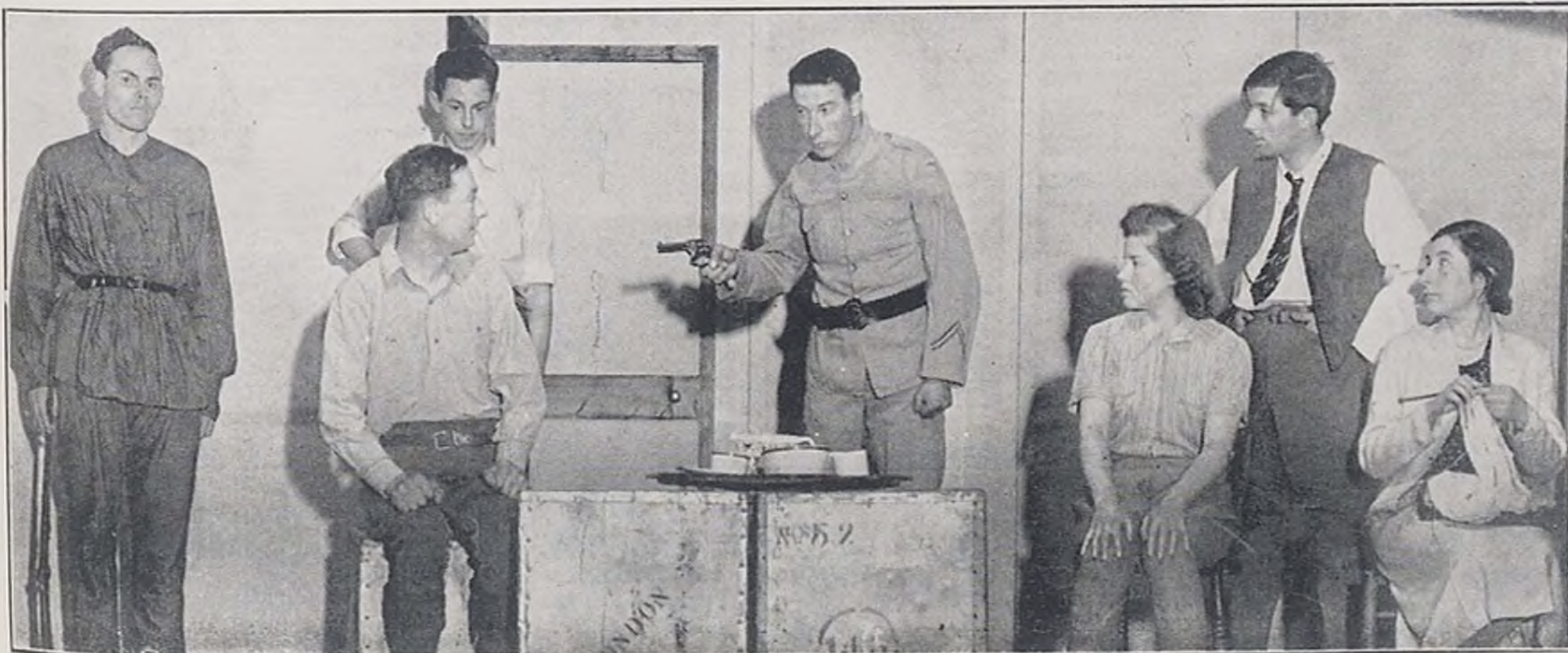

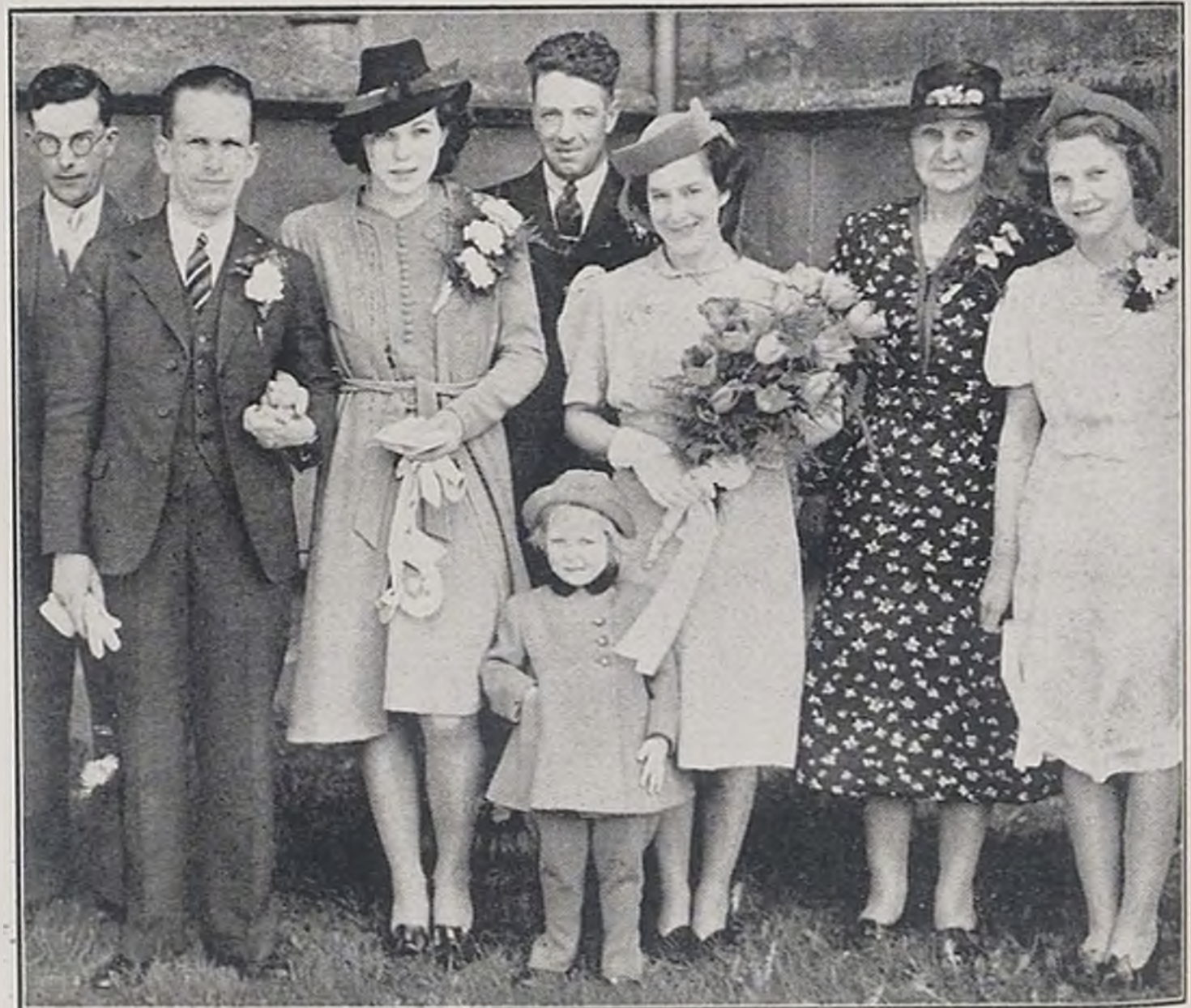
