PRINKNASH MONKS BUILDING THEIR OWN ABBEY CHURCH

when Cardinal Hinsley, Archbishop of Westminster, laid the foundation stone of the beautiful new Abbey Church at Prinknash Park on May 3, 1939, it was intended to go on with the building at once, but the outbreak of war caused a postponement. 














