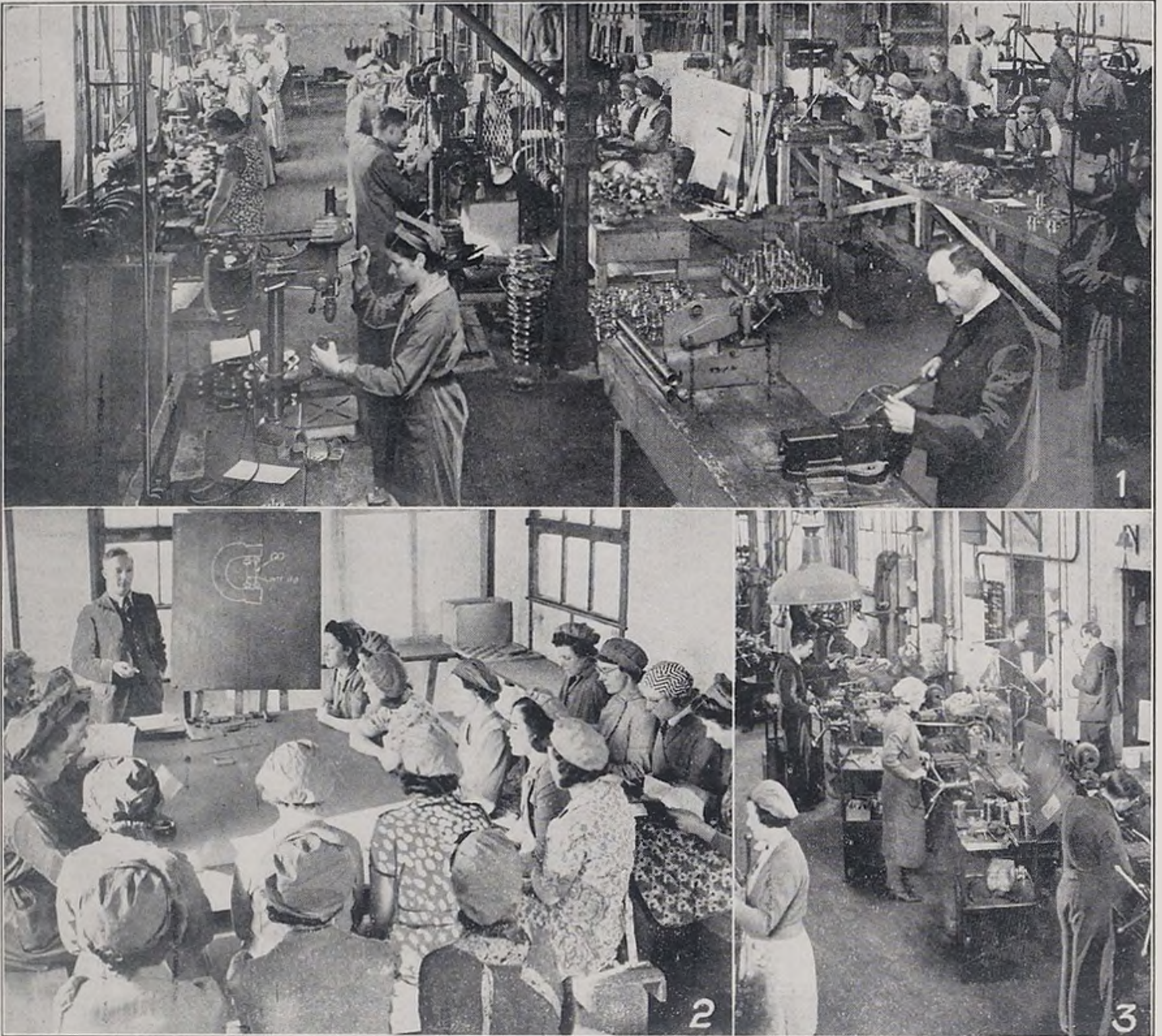

TEWKESBURY'S WAR WEAPONS WEEK

Saturday was the last day of Tewkesbury's War Weapons Week, and a combined display of mechanised war vehicles and military marching took place, a colonel taking the salute at the War Memorial. Tewkesbury's aim was to raise £40,000 in the week, but the total reached over £91,000.

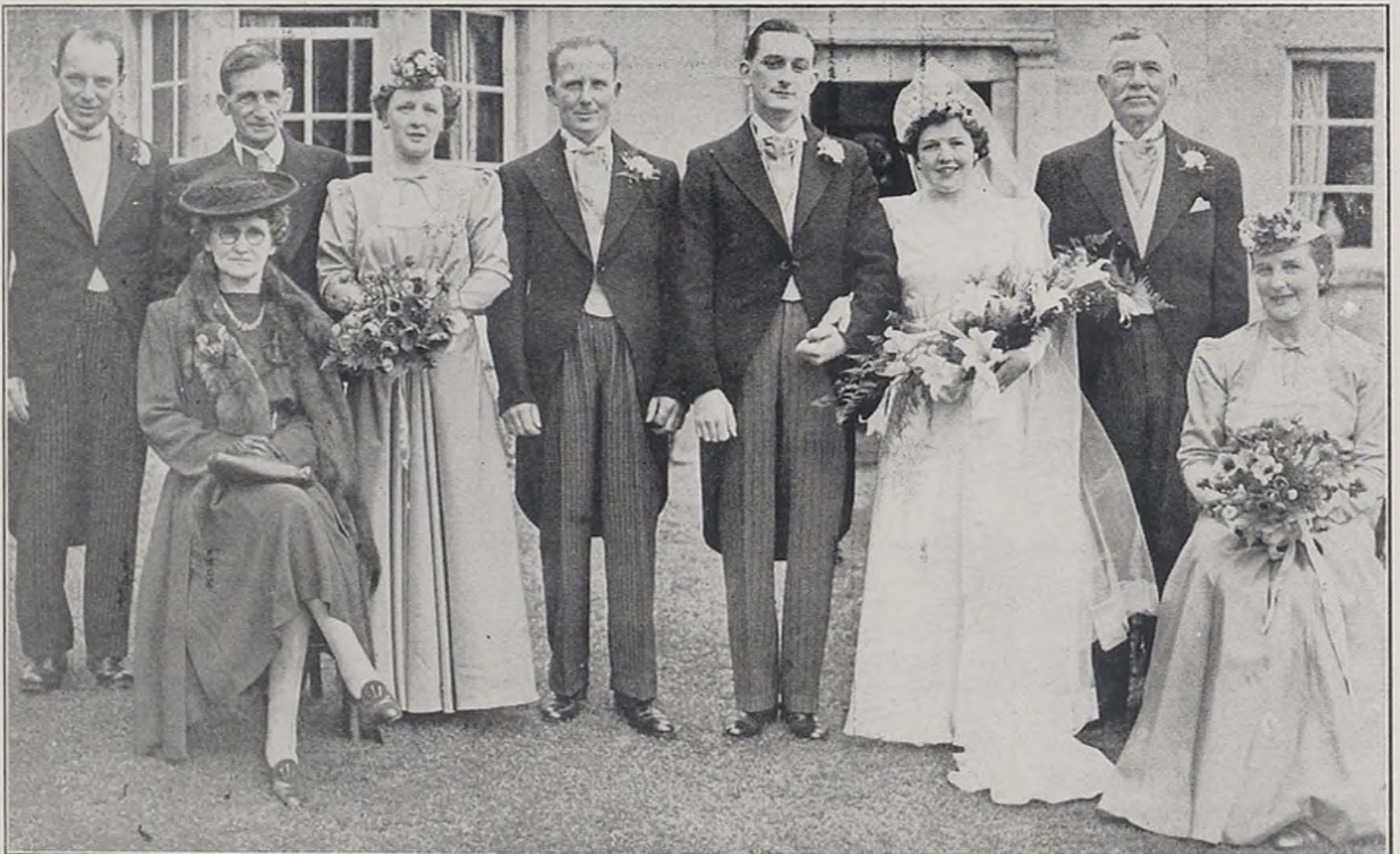

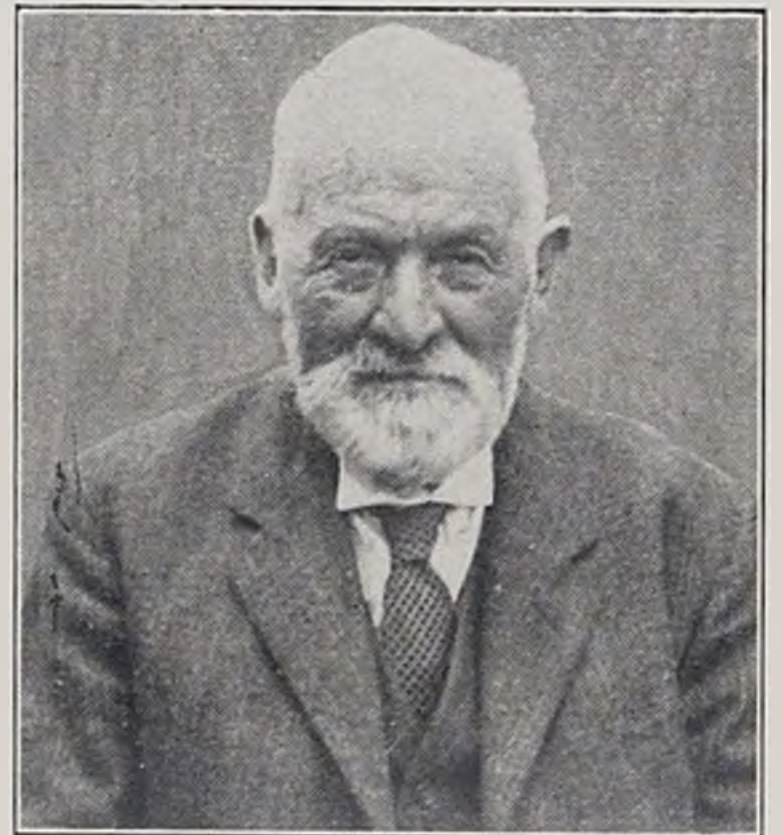

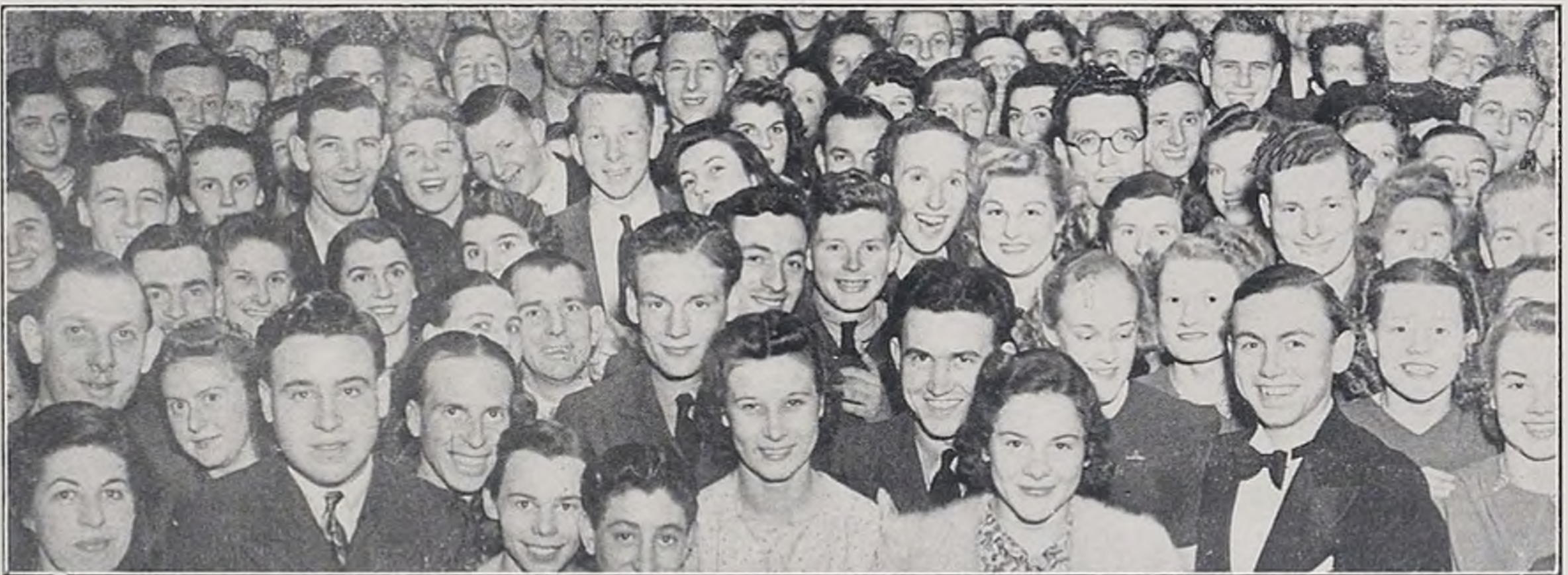
