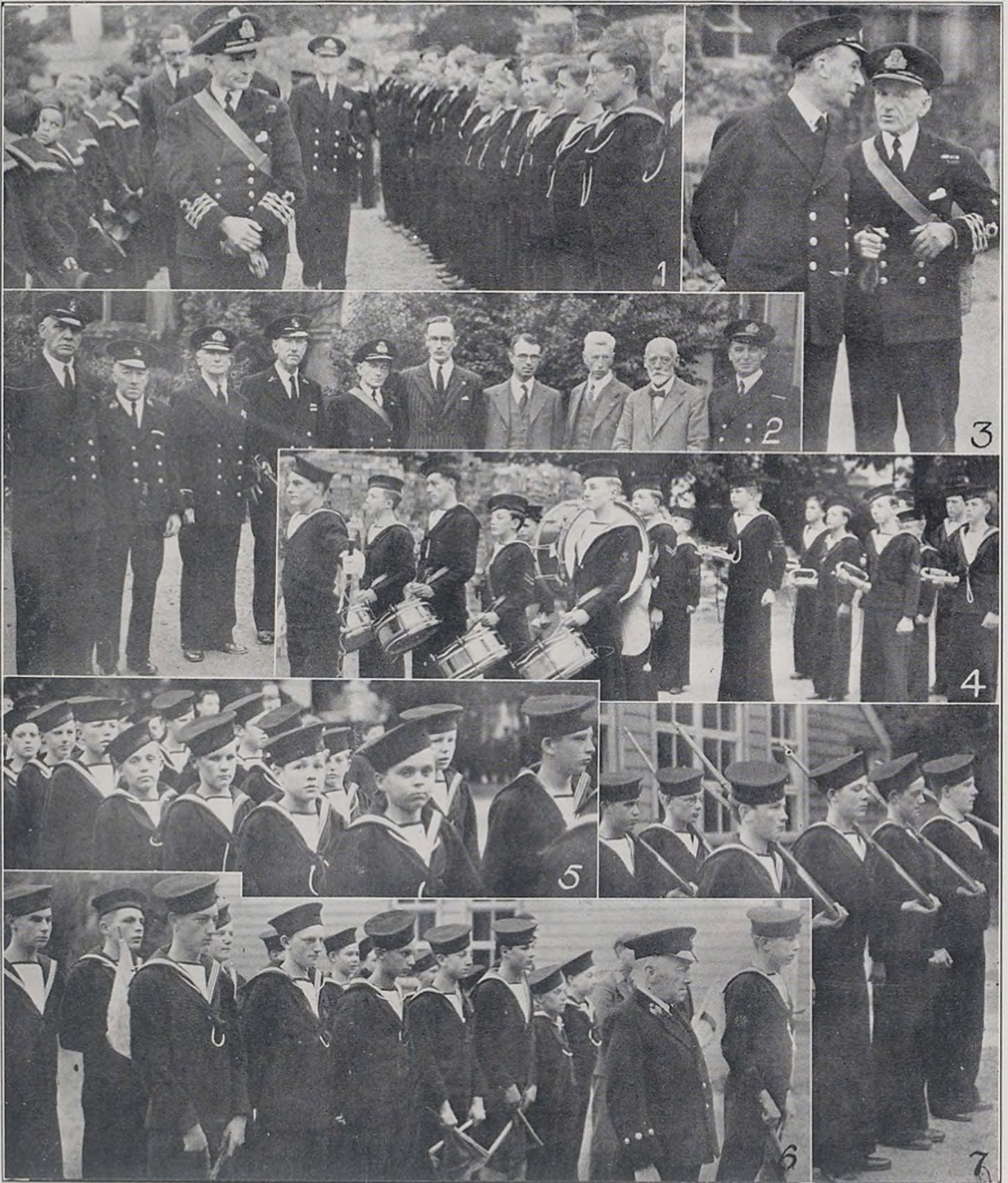

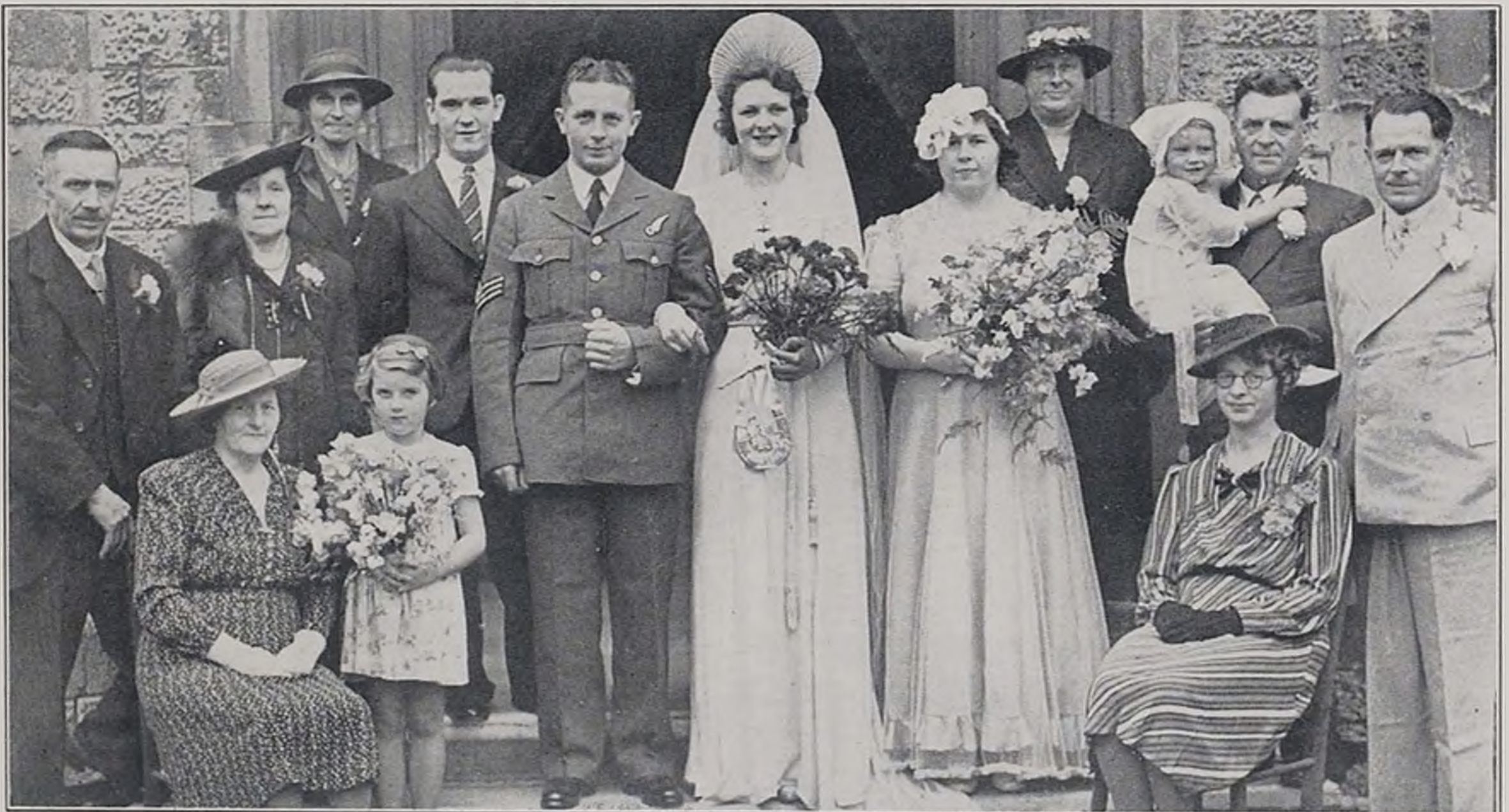

CUTTING, THRESHING AND BALING BY MODERN MACHINERY ON THE COTSWOLDS

Combined cutting, threshing and straw-baling machines are now hard at work on the Cotswolds reaping the bounteous harvest of wheat, barley, and oats that has rewarded the great work of the farmers in the national interest this year. Labour costs are greatly reduced, and the time required to dry the sheaves in the old-fashioned way is eliminated. The M.M. machines illustrated above have all been supplied by Mr. W. E. Hughes, Agricultural Engineer, of Andoversford, and are at work on the Cotswolds. The wheat or barley is cut and threshed at one operation, the grain taken to the dryer and weighed at the farm the same day as cut. The straw is picked up by a baler, which follows the combine, and made into bales.

- 1.—A 12ft. combine which reaps and threshes the corn and drops the straw behind. It is cutting a big field of barley on Mr. S. R. Perry's Farm.
- 2.—A straw baler at work in a wheat field.
- 3.—The baler at work, drops the bales properly wired.
- 4.—A baler following an 8ft. combine at Chedworth.
- 5.—Another baler with attached trailer which carries the bales.
- 6.—Picking up the sacks of grain to take to the dryer at the farm, which completes the operation.
