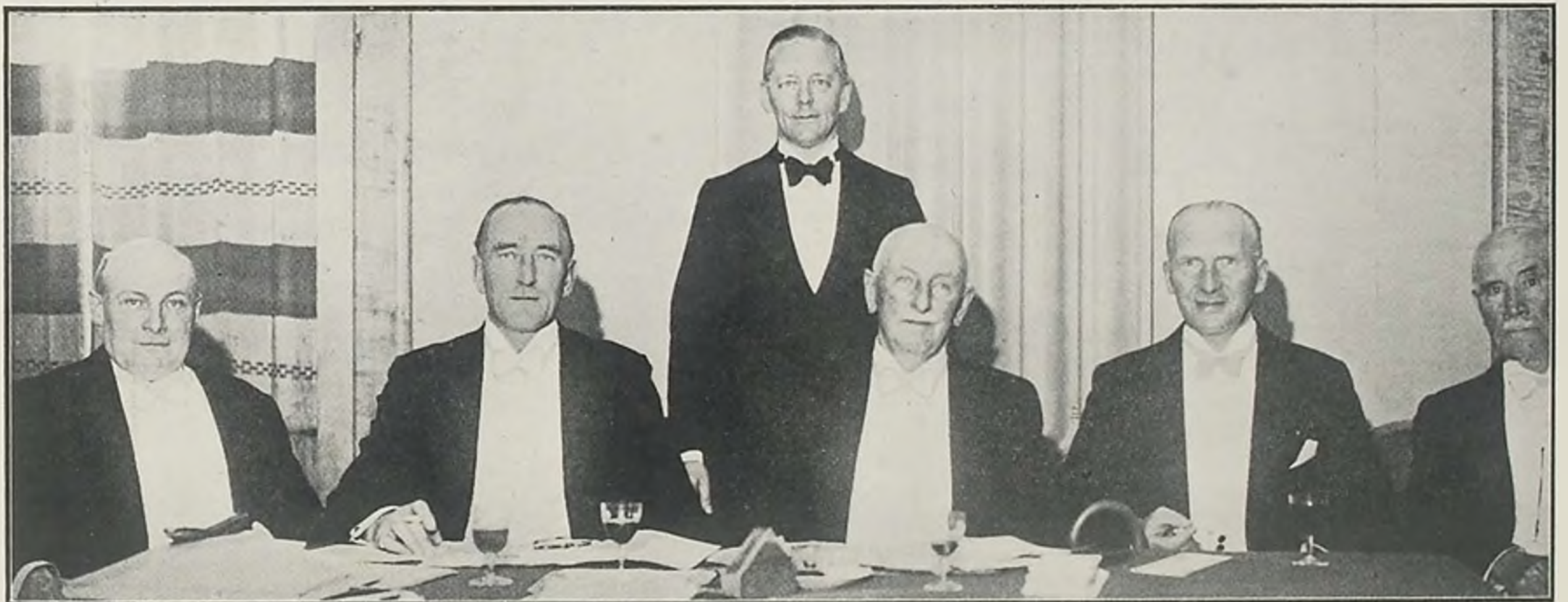


CHARLTON KINGS FLOWER SHOW AND MOTOR-CYCLE GYMKHANA

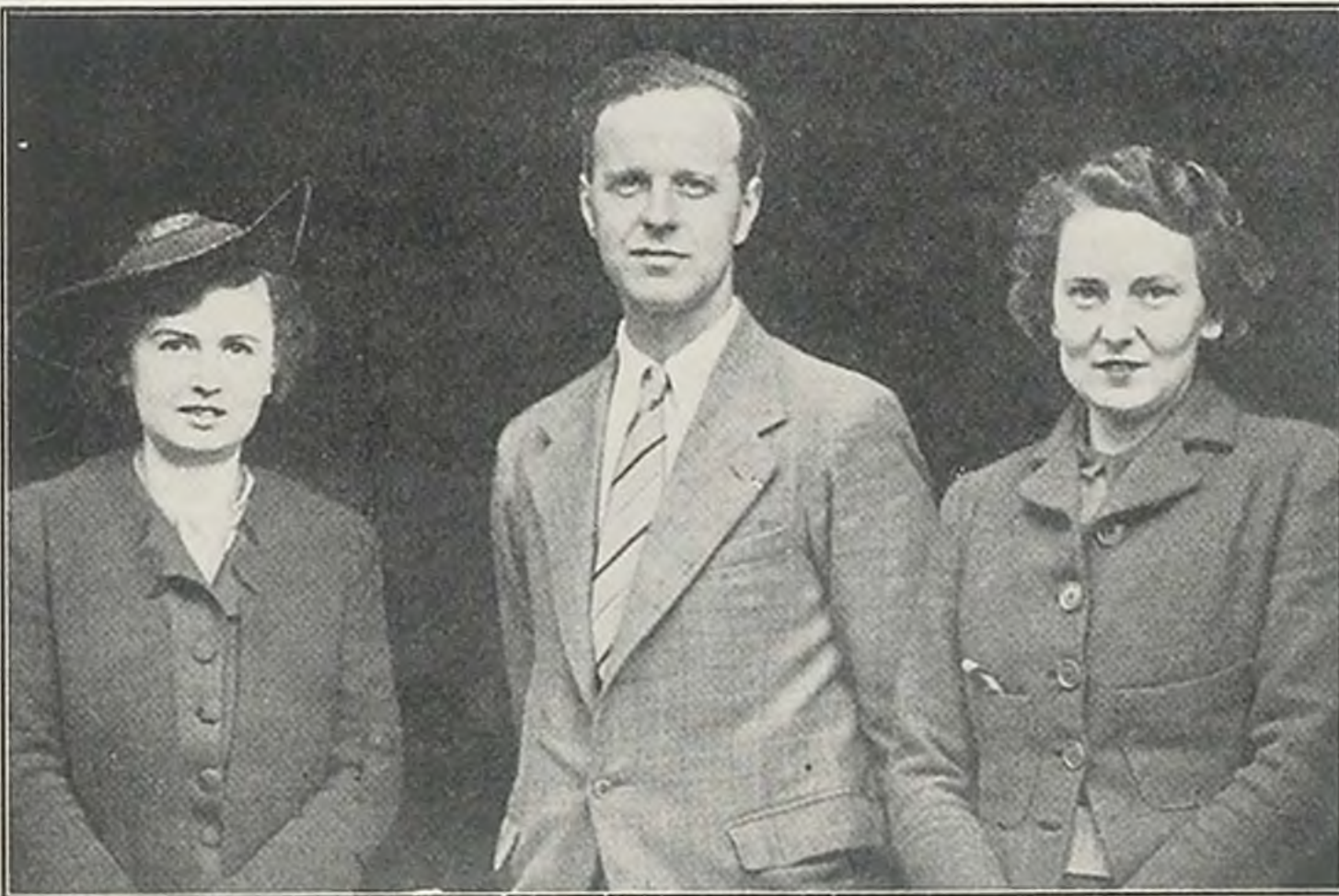

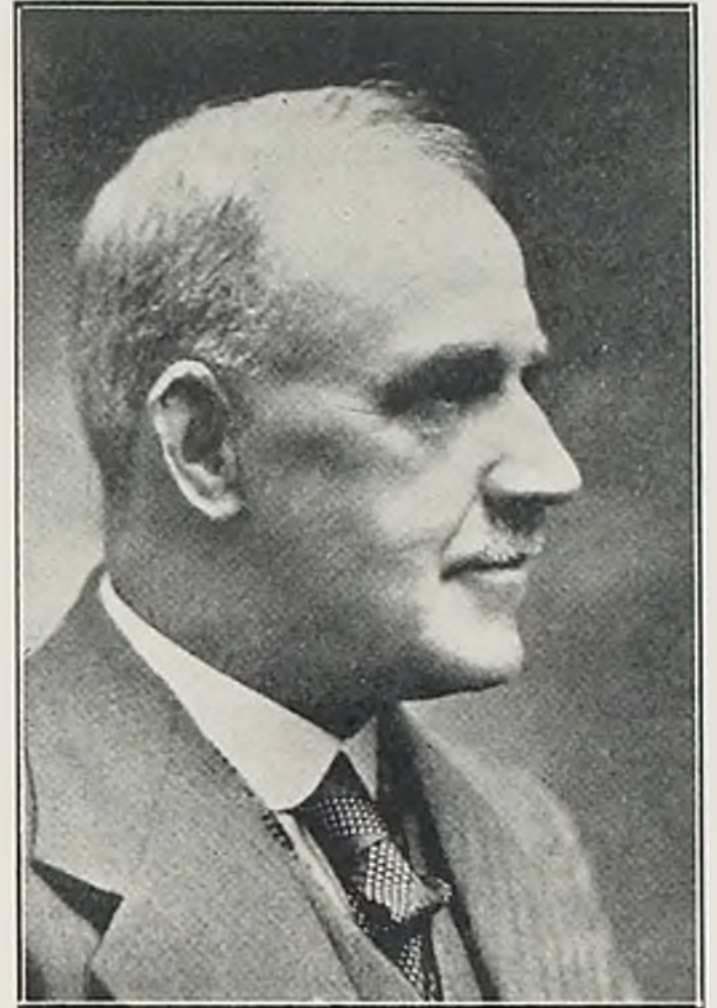
CHANGES AT CHELTENHAM SCHOOL OF ART

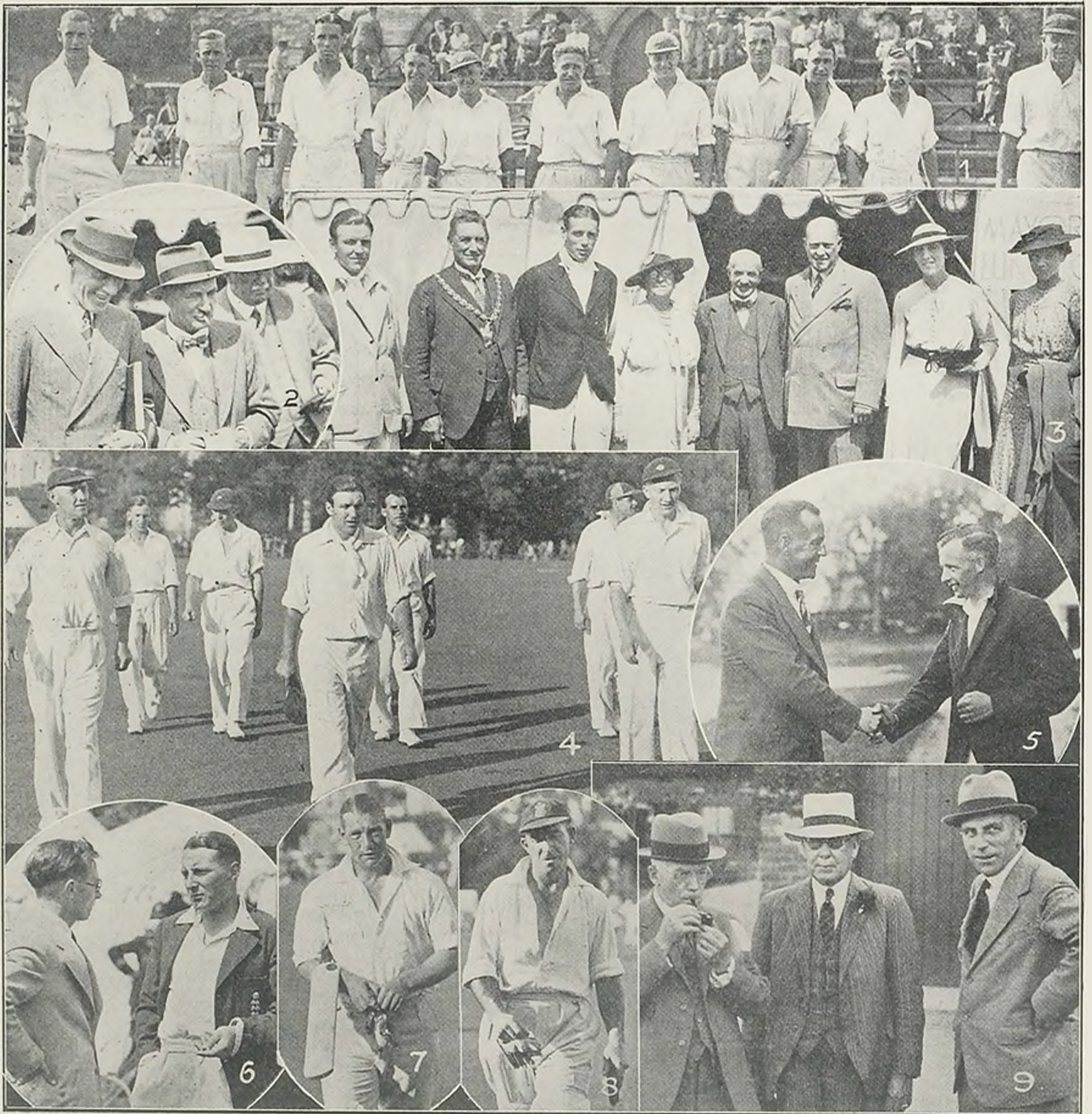

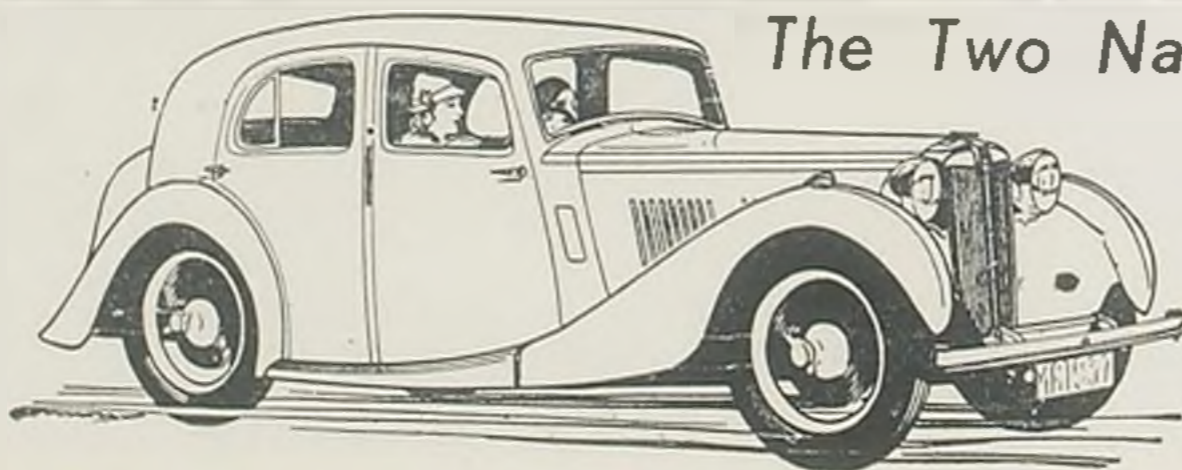

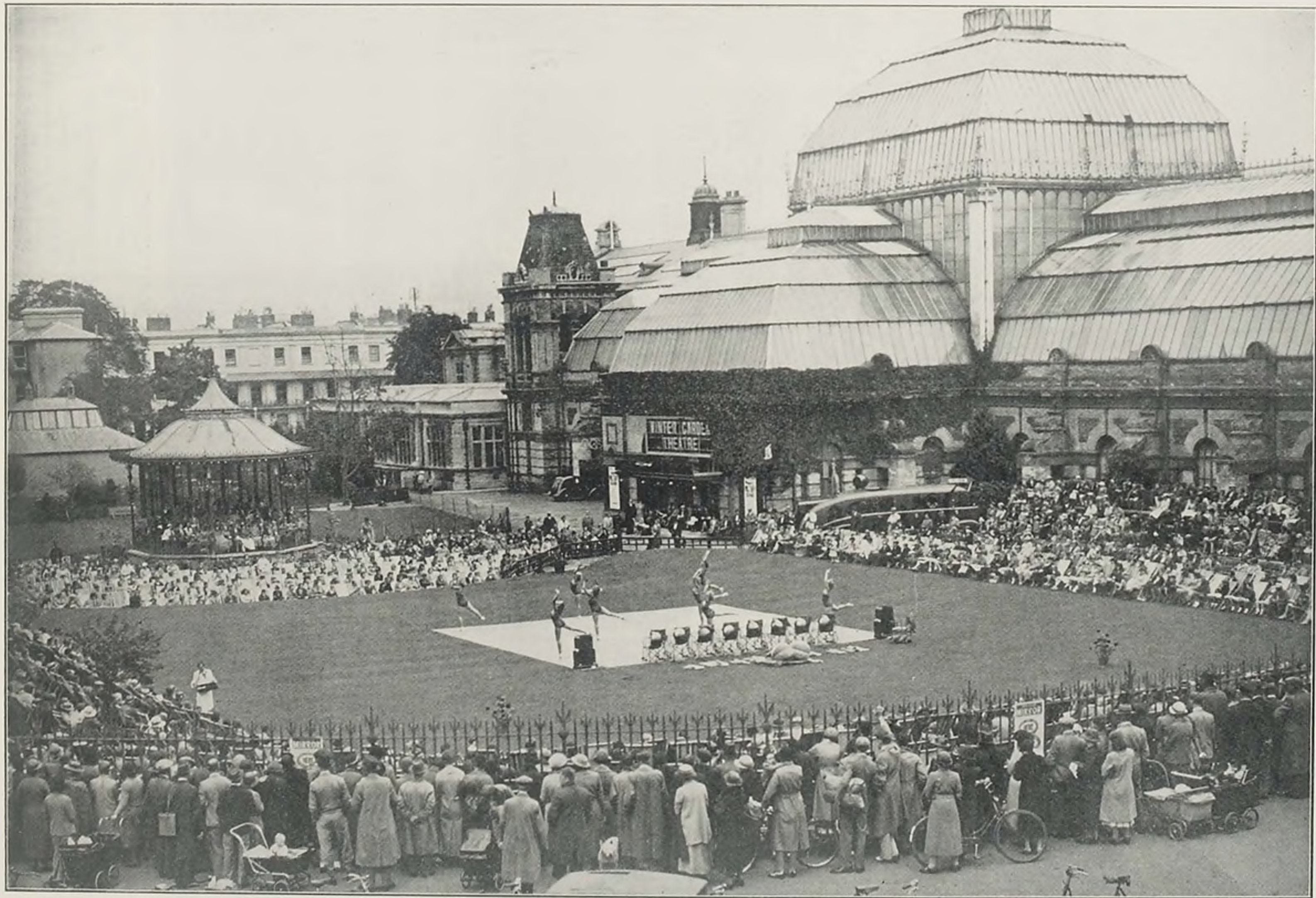
